The visit was her first to her former home in 32 years since the Ogle family left Nebraska.

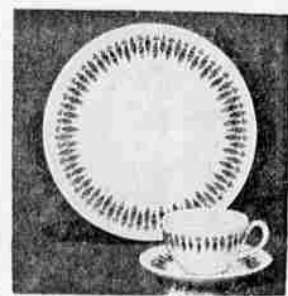
Her former home was in good condition and still occupied, she said. She visited with her former school teacher there.
