

Wise Hostess Plans For Holiday Guests

Company coming for Thanks-giving?

It's a wise hostess who plans ahead for holiday guests so that the visit will be enjoyable for all. Your thoughtfulness can be reflected in the arrangements you make for the guest room. Here are a few "things to do" that will make your company feel welcome.

Give the room a thorough cleaning. Do it. Make the bed with your prettiest linens and bedspread. Clear drawer and closet space well in advance of your guests' arrival. This will enable them to get unpacked without hesitation about where to put things.

Supply your guest room with copies of current magazines and a book or two for nighttime reading. And, be sure the reading lamp is in good working order.

If you have a bedside dispenser, it should be well supplied with tissues for your guests' convenience. If not, place a full package on the night stand.

Stationery, a pen or two and a supply of stamps will make it easy for your guests to write to friends at home.

Even the most thorough packers occasionally miss an essential or two, so have new toothbrushes, razor blades, a clothes brush and a small workbox with needles, thread, scissors and thimbles of two sizes on hand.

A night light is helpful, and an

extra blanket will be appreciated. Then, for the final "welcome" touches, put fresh flowers or an attractive plant; a bowl of fruit; and a small dish of assorted candies in the room.

MONTAGUE — More than 100 women garden club members of Cascade District 8-B comprised of 13 Northern California counties were guests of Town and Country Garden Club of Burney September 15 for an all-day meeting at Hat Creek Grange Hall.

Mrs. Lynn Carter of Red Bluff, district director, conducted the session.

The invocation was "Help to Save the Good Earth for Those Living Things That Have No Voice and for Generations Yet Unborn."

The morning session consisted of reports of chairmen of each club present. Rita Prather reported on Shasta Valley Garden Club activities.

Henrietta Terwilliger, past president of the Shasta Valley Garden Club, was named chairman of the Bird Committee for District 8-B. She was also appointed to the district Nominating Committee for 1960-61.

It was pointed out that garden club objectives should be based on the theme "Keep America Beautiful," with projects aimed at this goal.

In keeping with the theme is civic beautification. One of the worst offenders against national beauty is the "litterbug," described by members as a "trash thrower, who goes merrily litter-bugging his way while taxpayers' money is spent cleaning up after him."

Several other projects were discussed. They included wayside rests for travelers and Blue Star

Memorial markers, with Mrs. W. W. Tipton of Redding as state chairman of this project.

Another project is Elvenia Schlosser Redwood Memorial, which consists of members' contributions used to preserve the giant redwoods of California, in memory of the first California Garden Clubs, Incorporated, president.

"Penny Pines Plantation" is designed to raise money with penny contributions from members, and money derived from this is used to reforest burned over areas.

Several acres have already been planted in cooperation with the forest service.

Garden clubs throughout the areas work in cooperation with city and county planning commissions in an all out effort to preserve the beauty the state now has, and to create more beauty.

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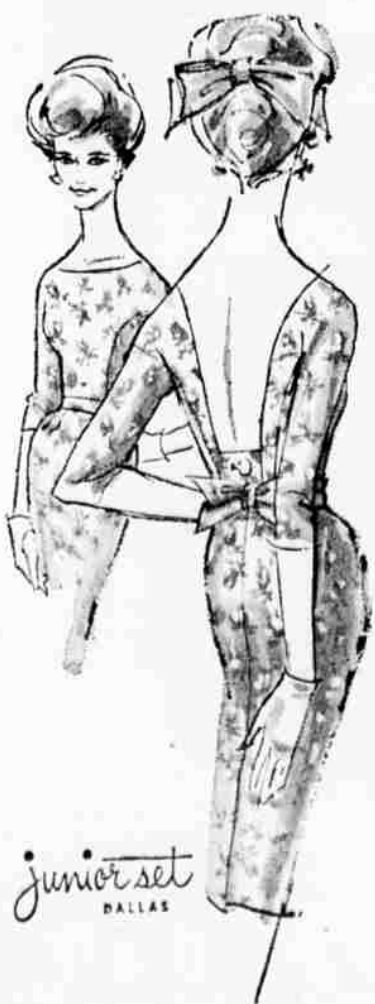
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
