US Reports Fewer Polio Cases
 WASHINGTON (AP) — There were fewer new poliomyelitis and paralytic cases again last week. Public Health Service spokesman said today it appears the 1960 peak was reached during September.
 In all, 131 new polio cases were reported last week, 101 of them paralytic. This compared with 179 cases, including 121 paralytic, in the preceding week ended Oct. 1. The 1960 weekly high for paralytic cases was 131 in the week ended Sept. 24. The high for all kinds of cases was 218 in the week ended Sept. 3.

Sea Search Cancelled

EUREKA (UPI) — The Coast Guard has cancelled a search for three men aboard the raft "Leaky Tiki" which has not been seen since it left Washington State last Friday on a proposed voyage to Australia with three men aboard.
 A Coast Guard spokesman said the operation was called off because it found no sign that the raft was in distress.
 Reports that the raft was sighted off the Northern California coast Wednesday were erroneous, according to the spokesman.
 The "Leaky Tiki" is made of two 24-foot pontoons decked over and carrying a cabin. It also carries a radio transmitter, a motor and sail, plus an outboard motor.
 The missing adventurers are Charles Aylen, 36; Donald Trawitzki, 35, and Jerry Ball, 26, all of Puyallup, Wash. They began their voyage at Neah Bay, Wash., and planned to sail to Australia via Santa Cruz, Mexico.

New Tax Law Seen As Model For Nation

SALEM (AP) — The Legislature's Interim Tax Committee filed its report Friday and said it would make Oregon's income tax law a model for the nation.
 The report, first to be filed by any interim committee this year, would reduce income tax receipts 10 per cent, and levy a cigarette tax of three cents a package. All income tax deductions would be removed.
 The committee also recommends repeal of the personal property tax on inventories, and substitution of a business receipts tax. It said this would encourage business and industry to locate in Oregon.
 Other proposals would encourage timber owners to hold their trees until they mature, give property tax relief for needy aged persons, and make adjustments in taxes on farms in urban areas.
 Proposals will be submitted to the Legislature, which meets in January.
