

Transfusions Surgeons Revamp Theories

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The American College of Surgeons, meeting here, Friday was graphically revamping its ideas about blood transfusions.

For one thing, the surgeons were advised to give elements of blood to patients rather than whole blood.

For another, they were told that too many physicians waste donated blood by administering too much — and that this sometimes injures the patients fatally.

Earlier the surgeons had been informed that a method of converting conventionally preserved blood eliminates the need for less than one-day-old blood in heart-lung machine operations. This will avoid hundreds of thousands of telephone calls required to round up 29 volunteer pints for each.

Naval Capt. Lewis L. Haynes, Chelsea, Mass., said new equipment makes it possible to fractionate blood — take it apart — and preserve it at least five years by freezing. At present, blood is kept only 21 days.

Fits Needs of Patient

This means, he said, that doctors can and should administer elements of blood, rather than whole blood, to fit the needs of the patient. In the new method, blood can be stored as red cells, white cells, platelets, plasma, and its various components.

Dr. Robert S. Myers, assistant director of the American College of Surgeons, asserted that physicians were giving blood transfusions automatically and unnecessarily. He noted that in 55 percent of 4,225 transfusions in 89 hospitals, only one pint was given the patient.

Many Suffer Reactions

But normal adults can lose well over one pint without danger, he said. However, 19 out of each 1,000 persons receiving the transfusions suffer bad reactions, such as hepatitis, overloaded hearts, and air bubbles in the blood.

Therefore, Myers reasoned that much blood can be saved and that needless danger to some patients can be avoided.

Dr. James V. Maloney Jr. of the University of California at Los Angeles had reported that addition of heparin to ordinary bank blood made possible a great saving of blood and effort in heart-lung machine operations. Bank blood is toxic in such operations.

Hospitals have been making an average of 150 telephone calls per operation to obtain the necessary 20 donor pints needed to be on hand each time. This has caused hundreds of thousands of such calls across the nation each year, he said.

Candidate For US Senate Advocates Eliminating Social Security For Persons Under 40

CORVALLIS (AP)—Elmo Smith, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, has advocated eliminating social security for persons under 40.

Smith appeared with nearly all major candidates for office in Oregon Thursday night at a Benton County political fair.

Smith also said he would have only those over 40 pay social security when they lack private insurance to assure that they don't become public charges in their old age.

Maurine Neuberger, Smith's Democratic Party opponent in the Senate race, was not at the fair.

Secretary of State Howell Applegate Jr., the Republican, and state Sen. Monroe Sweetland, the Democrat seeking the office of secretary of state, sparred about the board of control.

Sweetland called the board a buck passing agency that prevents

the people from pinning responsibility for top state actions.

Applying said the board provided for a wider range of experience in dealing with state problems.

The board is composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. Its primary function is the administration of state institutions.

The candidates for state treasurer, Republican Howard Belton and Democrat Ward Cook, discussed a state bond commission. Cook said he voted to abolish it and did not favor having it again.

Belton said he had no objection to its reestablishment.

State Sen. Carl Francis, a Republican, attacked the record of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

Rep. Walter Norblad, running for reelection in the 1st District, said he was at odds with Vice President Richard M. Nixon on

methods of handling labor disputes. Both are Republicans.

Norblad said he favored compulsory arbitration, while Nixon has said he is opposed to it.

Mary Owens, the Democratic candidate in the district, celebrated his 25th birthday at the fair.

The two congressional candidates took opposing views on sending technical advisers to other nations.

Owens advocated sending the experts to Japan and even to Russia. He said having U. S. technicians in other nations would bring cultural advantages to this nation.

Norblad opposed sending technicians to Japan, which he called a competing industrial country. He said he also opposed aid to European nations that have rebuilt their economies since World War II.

Man Cited For Murder

TACOMA (AP) — Roger Vukovich, an only child who lived in a world of strange portrait paintings and supernatural readings, was charged in justice court here Friday with the first-degree murder of his 57-year-old widowed mother.

Vukovich observed his 20th birthday in a city jail cell Friday. Detective Capt. Robert J. Drost said Vukovich signed a confession Thursday that he had killed his mother, Mrs. Selma Vukovich, after unsuccessfully trying to hire out the slaying to his only close friend for a reported \$1,000. The friend shrugged the offer off as a joke.

The attempted hiring out of the slaying paved the way for the confession and filing of a first-degree murder charge by Prosecutor John G. McCutcheon before Justice Elizabeth Shackelford. Vukovich was ordered held without bail.

Drost said Vukovich confessed he struck his sleeping mother on the skull with the blunt end of a shingle hatchet, carried her from her bed, and shoved her down a steep flight of basement stairs.

When arrested, Vukovich had in his possession a paperback book, "Mediums and Survival."

He told in his signed statement that he had just finished a chapter involving the question, "Can mortals make contact after death?" This was the experiment he hoped to make after his mother's death, Vukovich said in his statement.
