

OTI Owls Whip SOC In 21-19 Thriller

Oregon Tech's Dick Olivas, a 5-9 quarterback, leaped high in the air with a tackler hanging onto him and uncorked a 37-yard heave to Artes Palmero in the end zone to set up a spectacular 21-19 victory over the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders here Saturday night.

Palmero, whose sticky fingers had snagged a 43-yard toss from Roy Johnson to give the Techmen a one touchdown lead in the

second quarter, sorted Olivas' mighty throw out of a defense man's hands, juggled it a couple of times, then calmly settled down with the big six points.

Olivas then stepped up and booted his third consecutive try-for-point with just 4:33 left on the clock to put the finishing touches on the Owls' 1960 Homecoming triumph. The win is the fifth straight for the rugged Owl squad, and their eleventh straight conference victory.

After recapturing the lead from

the determined Red Raiders, the Owls found new strength and caused a pair of SOC fumbles that clamped the lid on the triumph.

On the last play of the game Owl center Don Anderson set the stage for the fans' celebration when he emerged from the huddle and turned a neat forward roll into his position over the ball.

Oregon Tech coach Rex Hunsaker could only shake his head and say, "Quote me as saying I've had it," as he accepted the

congratulations of a swarm of happy OTI alumni.

It wasn't too hard to understand what he meant, since his team had been pushed to the maximum the entire game.

The Raiders, who entered the contest also sporting an unbeaten conference mark to date, were sparked by halfbacks Eldon Francis and Doyle Branson, and quarterback-end Gordie Carrigan whose broken field running gave the Owl defenses fits all evening.

Fullback Bud Maupin was the

top turf-eater for the Owls. He gained 49 of the Techmen's 99 yards in 15 carries. Branson turned in a 43 yard touchdown dash and was always a threat on punt returns. Carrigan, however, stole the show when he skittered 79 yards on a punt return to set up the SOC go-ahead TD with 6:05 left in the third quarter. Owl tackle, 232 pound Jim Madden played amazing speed in catching the fleet Carrigan on the one-

yard line but the fired-up Raiders scored when quarterback Doug Olsen plunged over on the next play.

Madden, who figured on nearly every tackle for the Owls, was the top lineman in the battle but Wendell Winterbottom, Rog Hooper, Chuck Oleis and linebackers Dan Belunke and Johnson also came in for their share of the glory.

of times, was next with 33. However, the Owl passing attack, with Olivas and Johnson taking turns, was the big factor in the win. They combined to complete 13 of 26 attempts for a total of 243 yards. Johnson hit on seven of 12 heaves while Olivas connected on six of eight.

Palmero caught four, including his two six-pointers, for a total of 143 yards. Ardel Hamilton, who had one 65 yard TD reception called back, caught five for the other touchdown and a total of 64 yards. End Dennis Forster was on the receiving end of three for 28 yards, and Wilson pulled one down for six yards.

The Raiders took to the air 14 times and completed nine for 64 yards, with Olsen tossing all but one. End Howard Hartman pulled in five for 41 yards.

The Owls scored with 13:09 left in the half when Johnson connected with Palmero from the 43. Olivas booted the point-after, and the Owls led 7-0.

The Raiders made it 7-6 when Olsen hit Hartman from the four culminating a drive from the Tech 45.

Just three plays into the third quarter Branson skirted the left end and dodged a horde of tacklers to go 43 yards for a TD. Again the try for point failed and Raiders had a 12-7 bulge.

The Owls got the lead back within a minute, Olivas hit Forster for seven yards and Johnson followed up with his success to Hamilton from the 24.

From here on the battle raged primarily in Owl territory until Carrigan made his long run.

Schloredt Hurt As Huskies Squeeze By UCLANS, 10-8

SEATTLE (AP) — Taking over when All-America quarterback Bob Schloredt suffered a broken shoulder in the second quarter, Bob Hivner piloted the iron-muscled Huskies of Washington to a 10-8 football victory Saturday over the Bruins of UCLA in a Big Five Conference game.

An expected rainstorm deluged the area and the teams battled on a dry, sunlit field before a crowd of 54,500.

Neither team has been able to make headway in the defensive battle until Schloredt was hurt breaking up a UCLA pass late in the first half. He crashed into the intended receiver, and a moment later was taken out.

The shock of the loss seemed to spur the Huskies and they lined to their own 27 yard line in the UCLAN 19. George Fleming, Washington's kicking star, dropped back to the 28 and booted a perfect placement to give his team a 3-0 lead.

Carrying their momentum over into the second half, Washington

Beavers Ruin Idaho Homecoming, 28-8

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Led by do-everything southpaw sophomore Terry Baker, who passed and ran for 224 yards, Oregon State sped by Idaho 28-8 Saturday to run a football homecoming for the winless Vandals.

Baker, a 6-foot-3 tailback from Portland, passed for one touchdown, ran for another and added four extra points on a run and pass.

He also connected on a 50-yard pass during another Beaver drive and generally passed and ran the Vandals frantic.

Official statistics gave Baker 171 yards passing and 113 rushing for a single game total offense record for OSC. The previous Beaver high was 274 set by Joe Francis against Stanford.

Idaho could only register in the third quarter on a 62-yard drive which had Mike Sheeran doing most of the ball carrying and plunging the final three. Sid Vial passed to Reg Carolan for two extra points.

Oregon State's first touchdown came after an exchange of punts with the Beavers moving 89 yards in seven plays, most of it on the running and passing of Baker.

The sophomore continually outran Idaho tacklers and tumbled into the end zone after an 8-yard burst. He then turned the right end for two points to put OSC ahead 8-0 with 9 minutes of the game gone.

Baker had set up his own touchdown run with passes of 9 and 14 yards to John Kirby, a 200-pound sophomore fullback. Baker also touched off the drive when left end and outran a swarm of tacklers to move the ball 16 yards on the first play of the series.

A pair of passes from Baker to Amos Marsh covered most of the yardage in the Beavers' second touchdown drive. He threw one for 10 yards and then connected on a 50-yard pass play that carried from the OSC 25 to the Idaho 25. He was in open ground when he caught it on about the 37 and almost went all the way.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sophomore fullback Hal Tobin brought Southern California from behind with a 63-yard touchdown run and senior halfback Lynn Gaskill added a 42-yard gallop to ice it in the second half Saturday as the Trojans defeated scrappy California 27-10.

A crowd of 39,830 saw the teams in their first Big Five Conference clash, and few left Memorial Coliseum until Gaskill, on a pitchout, scooted down the sideline in front of the Trojan bench for his six points.

Southern Cal ended its scoring in the last two minutes when Skip Johnson intercepted a pass and ran untouched 23 yards for a touchdown.

The Golden Bears, who held the Trojans to a 7-7 tie at the half, took a momentary lead early in the third quarter on a 22-yard field goal by Jim Ferguson.

It was short-lived. The 201-pound Tobin broke through the Bear line, shook off Steve Bates, the last man with a chance at him, and rambled on for the most brilliant and longest run of this balmy afternoon.

California fought back and reached the Trojan 16 in the hectic fourth. The Bears were pushed back and Ferguson's try for a field goal from the 28 hit the goal post to the right.

Spartans Surprise Stanford

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—San Jose State's underdog Spartans buried Stanford's football hopes 34-20 Saturday with 176-pound fullback Johnny Johnson running over for four touchdowns.

The speedy 19-year-old sophomore from Port Arthur, Tex., tallied two first quarter scores on runs of 3 and 29 yards, then added another pair in the second half, both on 1-yard shots.

Only once before in the 17-game neighborhood rivalry has the Spartan scalped the Indian, but Coach Bob Titchenal's forces did it with a vengeance Saturday for their second victory in three games this season.

With three minutes left and San Jose leading 34-14, enthusiastic Spartan fans poured onto the field and had to be restrained behind the goal posts by Stanford student police with sporadic fist fights breaking out.

San Jose led 21-0 at the half after quarterback Mike Jones hit halfback Mack Burton on a 47-yard second quarter scoring pass and Ray Pena contributed his third of four conversions.

Without a victory in four games and facing perhaps its worst season ever, Stanford rallied in the third period marching 72 yards with Gil Dowd scoring from the 1. San Jose smeared his run for the 2-point conversion.

Bearcats Romp

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Undefeated Willamette University walloped College of Idaho 53-7 Saturday night in a Northwest Conference game.

It was the fifth straight win of the season for coach Ted Ogdahl's team, the third within the conference. It was no contest from the start, Willamette piling up 560 yards gained to 188 for the visitors, who were playing their first conference game of the season.
