Oriole Boss Selected AL Man Of Year

NEW YORK (UPI)—Paul Richards, whose Baltimore Orioles electrified the baseball world with a spectacular bid for the pennant, today was named the American League's "manager of the year" for 1960 by the United Press International.

Richards received 14 votes of a possible 24 from UPI's board of baseball experts, made up of writers in each of the eight American League cities.

Cookie Lavagetto, who led the Washington Senators to a fifth place finish, was runnerup to Richards in the balloting with seven votes, while Casey Stengel of the pennant-winning New York Yankees received three votes.

Under Richards' leadership, the Orioles wound up in second place with an 89-65 record for their highest finish since returning to the American League in 1954.

The 51-year-old Richards had the Orioles in first place as late as Sept. 9.

Richards, generally regarded the finest handler of pitchers in the game, has been managing in the majors 10 years. He piloted the Chicago White Sox from 1951 through 1954, leading them to fourth place on his first try and to third place on three other occasions.

He accepted the dual post of general manager and field manager of the Orioles on Sept. 14, 1954, and yielded the GM's job to Lee MacPhail prior to the start of the 1959 season. Under Richards' guidance, the Orioles jumped four notches—from sixth place to second—between the 1959 and 1960 campaigns.

Red Wings Nail Upset

The big, brawny Montreal Canadiens are human, after all, and the lowly Detroit Red Wings proved it.

The Wings dealt the defending Stanley Cup champions their first defeat of the National Hockey League season Sunday night, 6-4, and in the process left the Chicago Black Hawks the only undefeated team in the league.

The Black Hawks cut down the Boston Bruins, 5-2, but still are one point behind the Canadiens, who show a 4-1-2 record for 10 points. The Black Hawks have a 4-0-1 mark for 9 points.

In the other game, the Toronto Maple Leafs clubbed the New York Rangers, 7-2. The defeat was the Rangers' fourth in a row and it was the Leafs' first victory of the season.

Detroit's triumph over the Canadiens was the first victory of the season for the Wings and they made life miserable for goalie Jacques Plante.

The Wings beat the world champions at their own game—rushing pell-mell down the ice and firing at the net from all angles. Gordie Howe, Alex Delvecchio, Warren Godfrey, Ken Lumme, Murray Oliver, and Norm Ullmann scored for Detroit.

The 116 wins piled up by the 1906 Chicago Cubs stand as a National League record. The Cubs finished 20 games ahead of the runner-up Giants that year.

Oregon Tech came from behind for a 21-19 victory over Southern Oregon College Saturday and widened its lead in the Oregon Collegiate Conference football race.

Portland State, after two losses, got into the win column with a 14-6 triumph over Oregon College.

In the game at Klamath Falls, Southern Oregon was ahead, 19-14, in the final period when it lost the ball on a fumble. A few plays later a 37-yard pass play from Dick Olivias to Arties Palmer gave Tech the winning touchdown.

Freshman halfback speedster Billy White's 61-yard touchdown dash sparked Portland State to its triumph.

Eastern Oregon, the other conference team, traveled out of the state and absorbed a 52-0 defeat by Yakima Junior College.

Bob Hivner Back At QB; Makes Good

SEATTLE (AP)—This, you might say, is where Bob Hivner came in.

The slim, 175-pounder was back at the No. 1 quarterback position Monday when Washington, 10-9 victors Saturday in a bruising game with UCLA, began preparations for this week's brush with Oregon State in Portland.

Hivner was the Huskies' varsity quarterback at the start of the 1959 season, but a broken finger in the opening game benched him. He never got his job back from Bob Schloredt, who took the team to the Rose Bowl and was named All-America quarterback.

Saturday against UCLA Schloredt returned the favor, unintentionally. In a collision with a UCLA pass receiver he suffered a broken collar bone and is out for the season.

Hivner did not fumble the opportunity. He piloted Washington to a first-half field goal and a second-half touchdown that added up to the Huskies' fourth triumph in five games and the Bruins' first defeat in three.

UCLA held a fat statistical edge, 21 first downs to Washington's 12 and 358 net yards to 192. But Bruin coach Bill Barnes had the explanation when he said after the game that "probably Washington was giving us yardage up the middle."

Until the final quarter the Bruins never developed a serious threat.

UC Rally Ignited By Spark

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—The extra spark that ignited Oregon for two touchdowns in the final quarter and a 21-2 victory over Washington State, according to Oregon Coach Len Casanova, "the kind you like to see."

Casanova had some good words for quarterback Dave Grosz and added criticism.

His major pique was that Oregon played only one-half a game. "Our second and third quarters were not good," he pointed out.

Casanova looked toward next Saturday's clash with California at Berkeley and said the fumbles must cease. Oregon dropped the ball seven times. Washington State got three of those.

John Robinson in his scouting report on California's 27-10 loss to Southern California described the Bears' game as a good one. A week ago Washington State and California fought to a 21-21 tie.

He reported they moved the ball well and passed well. "They dropped a lot of passes, but you can't depend on that," Casanova added to that.

Casanova described the day against WSU as an odd one for Grosz, but the 41-yard touchdown pass made up for that.

A broken wrist suffered in the summer has slowed Grosz. The Saturday game was the first in which he played more than a few plays on defense.

"He's even asking to play defense now so I think he has got that out of his mind," Casanova said of the Kent, Wash., back. "I think it bothered him mentally before."
