No Grazing Allowed

YREKA—Even though the season is over, land in the conservation reserve program may not be used for grazing so long as the land retirement contract remains in effect, said Roger W. Block of the Siskiyou County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee office today in a reminder to farmers.

For conservation reserve contracts which expire in 1960, the prohibition on grazing continues until December 31, Block said. For contracts with additional years to run, the farmer is obligated to withhold the land from crops or grazing to refrain from breaking out new land until the contract expires.

Block said that 1960 annual payments are being made to conservation reserve participants now that performance has been checked to determine that contract requirements have been complied with during the past year. There are 80 contracts in effect in Siskiyou County this year covering a total of 17,500 acres of cropland.

Snow Shovel Is Expected By Dunsmuir

DUNSMUIR — A tractor-shovel suitable for snow removal and other city street work is expected in Dunsmuir this week, according to John Petty, superintendent of public works.

Approval for the purchase of this piece of equipment was made at the last city council meeting. The machine, also known as a front-end loader, will cost about \$15,000.

Before the sale is completed, Petty and members of the city council will inspect the machine.

Construction Figures Given

MONTAGUE—Since the first of January, up to and including July 31, 1960, the city of Montague has issued permits for new construction amounting to \$73,550, and another \$4,140 in permits for remodeling of homes and buildings.

Siskiyou Stone, Incorporated, received a permit for construction of a building worth \$17,000. Arcata Lumber Service, Incorporated, has constructed another new shed for lumber storage.

Wesley Graves has constructed four new homes in the city worth an estimated \$10,000.

The T. James Ready home, recently completed, cost approximately \$13,000, while several smaller homes were built averaging between \$3,500 to \$5,000 in value.

Other construction and remodeling jobs included garages, carports, storage sheds and additions to homes.

Huge Skull Identified As Musk Ox

ALTURAS—A huge skull found in a gravel pit on the Harvey Darst ranch near Lake City has recently been identified as that of a musk ox, according to Norman Nichols, Modoc County farm adviser.

The University of California, where the head was identified, is very interested in finding more such specimens.

Due to fragmentary condition of the semi-petrified head they were unable to determine its age.

The skull was unearthed some 18 years ago and has been "kicking around the place ever since."

The musk ox once roamed in large numbers throughout the American Arctic Coast and the Northwest Territories of Canada.

At present there are only about 1,000 of these animals left in North America. Twenty years ago some of these animals were taken to Alaska and eventually placed on Nunivak Island. Today, there are slightly more than 100 of these left in Alaska.
