

Detroit Lions Plan No Drastic Change

DETROIT (AP) — "We can't afford to get panicky," said George Wilson. "We're not going to make any radical changes just because people are yelling at us for losing."

The Detroit Lions' coach has blamed his team's three losses on first, a superior team, second, poor officiating, and third, ineffective quarterbacking.

Wilson announced he will stick with the same lineup, including Jim Ninkowski at quarterback. The alternatives at quarterback are Earl Morrill and rookie Warren Rabb.

Wilson and his staff are on the spot after winning only seven of 27 National Football League games since the Lions won everything in Wilson's first season as coach.

But all of them got a vote of confidence Monday from President-General Manager Edwin J. Anderson.

"I haven't given up on the coaching staff," Anderson told the Lions' Fan Club weekly luncheon. "And I haven't given up on our players. We're going to win some games."

Anderson said he is inclined to shrug off the first three losses as "part of the breaks of the game."

Titan Boss Warns AFL To Come Fast

NEW YORK (UPI) — Slingin' Sammy Baugh, one of the immortals of the professional National Football League, warned his former playmates today not to be too prosaic about the new American Football League.

"We are two years ahead of schedule," said the slender, hawk-faced coach of the New York Titans, "and two years from now we'll be in a class with anybody."

Baugh, a long-lasting rapier in a game meant for machetes, has what sound to be valid reasons. "I thought it would take us two more years to get as good as we are right now," he said bluntly. "No, we're not as good as the best three or four teams in the National League. But you'd be surprised at how good a game we'd give the lower clubs."

New Talent Quest Jars ML Rosters

Major league baseball clubs are clearing their rosters for new talents and that meant a trip back to the minors today for such familiar names as Albie Pearson, Don Ferrarese and Al Worthington among others.

The pint-sized, 25-year-old Pearson, who was the American League's rookie of the year with Washington in 1958, was one of four players released outright to Rochester of the International League Tuesday by the Baltimore Orioles.

Catcher Valmy Thomas and outfielders Al Nagel and Fred Valentine were assigned to Rochester along with the five-foot-five, 140-pound Pearson, who had batted .244 in 48 games for Baltimore last season.

Buy Four Players

The Orioles purchased four players from Vancouver of the Pacific Coast League. They were third baseman Don Ross, left-handed pitcher Ron Moeller, catcher Frank Zupo and outfielder Chuck Hinton, who led the Class C California State League last season when he batted .369 for Stockton.

In Chicago, owner Bill Veeck said the White Sox may not be better next year but promised "they'll be different."

The White Sox promptly backed up Veeck's words by assigning pitchers Jake Striker, Frank Barnes, Ferrarese and Worthington to San Diego of the Pacific Coast League. At the same time, the White Sox added two players to their roster from Lincoln, Neb., in the Class B Three-L League. The two men were outfielder Dean Look, former Michigan State quarterback, and right-handed pitcher Alan Brice.

A's Are Busy

The Kansas City Athletics put in a real busy day, swapping catchers with the Cincinnati Reds, sending four players to the minors and purchasing the contracts of eight minor league players.

Kansas City sent catcher Danny Kravitz to Cincinnati for Dutch Dotterer, then assigned Marty Kutyna, Leo Kiely and Ray Jablonski to Sacramento of the Pacific Coast League, and optioned Jim Delsing to Shreveport of the Southern Association.

Purchased by the A's were pitchers Bob Hartman, Bob Flynn, Joe Petrovich and Ken Sanders; infielder Ron Overcash; Art Shult to Houston of the American Association on an outright basis and released veteran infielder Grady Hatton and catcher Elvin Tappe. The Cubs also purchased pitcher Walter Bales and outfielder Lewis Bishop from Houston.

Five For Five

Milwaukee purchased five minor league players and sent five others to Louisville of the American Association.

Placed on the Braves' roster were catcher Merritt Ranew, outfielder Wayne McDonald and pitchers Paul Roof, Bob Boltz and Cecil Butler. The five men assigned to Louisville were shortstop Carl Derr and pitchers Clair Hickman, Vic Rehm, Winston Brown and Tony Diaz.

Cincinnati bought pitchers Bob Moorhead and Harvey Alex while assigning pitchers Dave Stenhouse and Mike Cuellar to Jersey City of the International League. The Reds also purchased infielder Tom Harper from Indianapolis of the American Association.

The Cleveland Indians purchased outfielder Jim King from Toronto, where he was voted the International League's most valuable player this year after hitting .290, driving in 85 runs and hitting 24 homers.

Better Attraction

As for the future, the 16-year passing star of the Washington Redskins feels that the new league is in a more solid position to attract graduating college stars.

"It's simply that they'll have a better chance to make it in our league than they will in the National League," he explained. "It's the same as in baseball. A rookie has a tough time pushing out those for five-year men."

"The National League hates to cut the new men because it feels it's making a mistake," he added. "Yet, it has to go with the veterans who may have two or three years left. We'll get those kind of kids — and in two or three years they'll be better players than the National League veterans. That's why we'll catch up so fast."

Next year, asserted the keen-eyed Baugh, the American League will be better overall because each team will have a nucleus with which to start. Meanwhile he is enjoying his job as the coach of a pro team after laboring in the collegiate vineyards as the touchdown tutor at Hardin Simmons.

Small Schools Hurt

The outspoken Baugh looks back on his tenure at the Texas college with a certain amount of repugnance.

"We played a lot of teams that were out of our class," he grated. "If we finished within three touchdowns of them we did a great job but it was an injustice to the boys. It wasn't good for them to have to bat their heads up against teams like Arkansas, Baylor, Mississippi, LSU, Georgia and Auburn."

"But it's a dollar problem with the small colleges," shrugged the former TCU star. "There's nothing they can do about it because those kind of games drew crowds and paid the bill. The big college teams get all the material they want, but it's tough on those little fellows."

Which is why Baugh prefers pro coaching.

"In the pro game you've always got a chance because the material is more even," he said. "That makes for better and more interesting football. And you'd better keep an eye on this league of ours because it's coming, and coming fast."

Canadiens Pace NHL

MONTREAL (UPI) — Dickie Moore and Bernie Geoffrion, star Montreal wingmen who each registered hat tricks in the Oct. 15 game against the New York Rangers, are pacing the National Hockey League scoring race.

According to statistics released today, Moore has nine goals and five assists for 14 points while Geoffrion has totaled seven goals and three assists for 10 points.

Five players are tied with nine points each. They are Andy Bathgate of the New York Rangers, Norm Ullman of Detroit, and Henri Richard, Bill Hicke and Jean Beliveau, all of Montreal.

Bobby Hull of Chicago, Detroit's Gordie Howe and Marcel Bonin of the Canadiens are tied with eight points.
