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**Golf Season Over; Time To Clean Clubs**

Although some determined golfers insist the season's not over until the snow's too deep to see that little white ball, most enthusiasts are giving at least some thought now to putting away the clubs for another year.

If you're one of the many home-makers who've fallen victims to the golfing "bug," here are a few tips on getting the clubs ready for winter storage. After all, those clubs represent a sizable investment, and it's just good sense to protect them.

First order of business, of course, is a thorough cleaning. And while many golfers make it a habit to clean the clubs after each outing, a little extra care is called for at season's end.

Let's take the woods first. They should be cleaned thoroughly with soap and water. Use a brush to clean the face of the woods, removing any accumulated dirt and grass stains. Then, dry the clubs completely with absorbent towels. As extra protection, you may want to apply a coat of wax to the head of the club, polishing to a high gloss with paper toweling. Car wax or household furniture wax will do the job.

Irons should be cleaned with steel wool and soap and water, face and back, to prevent pitting. Again, be sure they're completely dried after cleaning.

To keep dust off the club heads during storage, wrap the heads in paper towels and secure to the shaft with a rubber band.

While you're at it, be sure to give your golf shoes a complete cleaning, too. They'll keep their shape over the winter months if you stuff tissues into the toes.

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
