Jayvees Trim Trojans, 22-12, In Tuesday Modoc Field Test

A squad of determined Klamath Union Jayvees found its way back into the win column by holding down a Sacred Heart second half surge on Modoc Field Tuesday evening to chalk up a 22-12

victory. The win was the 29th consecutive victory for Klamath Union over the Trojans in the history of the rivalry between the two schools.

KU, minus big gun Ron Hitchcock and others due to injuries, roared off to a flying start be-

hind Gordy Malcomb. Malcomb immediately hit Bill Bianchi and Rich Horn for a total of 75 yards passing to set up the first touchdown when Bud Thompson recovered a stray ball in the end zone with the game only minutes old.

After finally stopping Sacred Heart's fleet-footed Mike Holland, who literally picked out every hole in the KU line and bombed his way through the Whitebirds marched downfield and scored number two as Malcomb plunged over from two yards out to gain a 13-0 halftime margin.

However, the fighting Trojans were not ready to play dead. After the intermission they came back to battle the Pelicans all the way.

Coach Marv Delplante's club marched downfield to the five, only to be stopped in their tracks by a tremendous goal line stand made by the Klamath defensive linemen Jim Kurth, LeRoy Paulson, Larry Meime, and Bob Barnett. But they quickly grabbed the ball back and punched across a TD when Holland smashed over from the three — and the race was on.

The Trojans racked up a crucial after Shan Britton moved the ball downfield 60 yards on a brilliant run and Bill Jackson dashed over the line from the 10-yard line.

Klamath's terrible trio, Wolter, Thompson, and "Bronco" Bianchi, combined forces as Klamath quickly gained possession of the ball and refused to give it up as the remaining minutes ticked away.

With Wolter's hard tackling and blocking, coupled with some smart ball handling by Thompson, Bianchi charged through a hole in the right side of the SHA line with 2:44 left to clinch the game.

Horn caught Malcomb's blocked boot for the extra point and rammed into the end zone to complete the KU scoring.

Jayvee Coach Wade Patterson happily commented following the game, "The spark returned and we were able to move the ball when we had to." He singled out the offensive play of Ruger, Don Christ, Ken Puckett, Bruce Campbell, Thurston Henzel, Brian Routh and Darrel Metcalf for praise.

Yank Front Office May Be Revamped

NEW YORK (AP) — Informed office would be Jack White, the present general manager of the Richmond farm in the International League, and Arthur (Red) Patterson, currently publicity director of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Bob Finkel, the club's able public relations director and a big favorite with newspapermen, will remain. Patterson, Finkel's predecessor with the Yankees, will assist White, who has been tabbed as the future big boss of the Yankees. Hamey's contract has another year to run.

Stengel bowed out and Weiss will follow because Topping and Webb agreed "there should be an age limit." In the future the club will not employ a manager after he's 65.

Stengel, chagrined and bitter over his dismissal, intimated he would be amenable to an offer to manage elsewhere.

Casey Worn, Discarded Legend

NEW YORK (UPI) — They all the line:

"I was told that my services would not be desired any longer."

He rammed on and he answered a host of questions and it became obvious that Casey might have been permitted to stay on as a figurehead manager.

"If I had stayed, I'd have wanted a two-year contract," he said. "I wanted to stay managing. But I told them if I wouldn't have 100 per cent control I wouldn't stay. They wanted me out for a new and younger system. That's the best excuse they have."

The voice dripped with acid. "Was I fired? I'll draw you a picture. They wanted to make changes. They knew my work was fairly good. They were satisfied with the return financially. But I don't own the club. Maybe I'd have had the same feeling as Topping if I owned the club."

Has No Plans
Where does he go from here, this 70-year-old man who has spent his life in baseball?

"I have no plans," Casey grunted. "But Mrs. Stengel thinks I'm a good manager. Certainly I've lasted longer with her than I did with the Yankees."

Would he consider managing the embryo New York team in the National League?

"I never talk about a job until it's offered to me," he shot back. Then his voice softened as he reminisced about those 12 years just behind him.

"It was amazing to win in 1949," he said. "The club was on the way down. That Joe DiMaggio was one of the greatest players I ever saw. Don't think I don't remember 'em all... Reynolds and Raschi and Lopat... that Mantle, who might be the best of 'em all... Ford's pitching... and Skowron playing with a bad back."

Likes '53 Team
"Which was the best team? It's hard to say," he pondered. "But

in 1953 when we won five straight world championships, we must have been pretty good. This team right now can get back on the ball. It's just got to get keyed up."

You remembered how they called him a clown when he was signed as the Yankee manager 12 years ago. But the chipper, bantering man who then was 58 now was a worn, discarded legend at 70.

His ties with the Yankees vanish on Oct. 31. That's Halloween. The gargoyles grin he wore as he walked out was, somehow, very fitting.

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Bucs, Braves Nail 4 All-Star Berths

NEW YORK (UPI) — The world champion Pittsburgh Pirates and the Milwaukee Braves placed four players each on the 1960 National League All-Star team named today by the United Press International.

Second baseman Bill Mazeroski, shortstop Dick Groat, outfielder Roberto Clemente and pitcher Vern Law were the Pirates honored while catcher Del Crandall, third baseman Ed Matthews, outfielder Hank Aaron and pitcher Warren Spahn were the Braves selected on the squad of eight regulars and two pitchers.

First baseman Norm Larker of the Los Angeles Dodgers and center fielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants were the other players picked by the UPI's 24-man board of experts composed of three writers or radio broadcasters from each city in the league.

The closest race was at shortstop where Groat, who won the NL batting crown with a .325 mark, beat out Chicago Cub shortstop Ernie Banks by a 13-11 vote. The vote also was close at first base where Larker, who finished second to Groat in the batting race, beat out Joe Adcock of the Braves, 12 votes to 9.

Aaron and Mays were unanimous choices for outfield positions and Mazeroski, the Pirates' World Series hero, received all but one vote in the balloting for second baseman.

The only pitchers besides Law and Spahn to receive votes were Ernie Broglin, who won 21 games, and Lindy McDaniel, star relief hurler, both of the St. Louis Cardinals.

As a manager, he took Durham to a second place finish in the Carolina League in 1956; his Birmingham team finished sixth in the Southern Association in 1957; he won pennants with Lancaster of the Eastern League in 1958 and Knoxville of the South Atlantic League in 1959, and directed Victoria to a tie for third in the Texas League this past season. He managed in Venezuela last winter.

Peaky, 41, is a native of Portland, Ore., but now makes his home in Lynn, Mass. His appointment was the first made by Neil Mahoney, new director of the Red Sox farm system.

"I think he'll make a fine manager," said Mahoney in Seattle, where he is looking over the Seattle operation.
