KU Pelicans Stress Defensive Moves

LaVerne Set To Disrupt Owl String

The LaVerne College Leopards, a light, fast Los Angeles eleven, are the next obstacle in the path of the Oregon Tech Owls. The Southlanders figure to try and toss a monkey wrench into the Tech plans for an unbeaten season.

The two clubs tangle Saturday night at 8 o'clock on Modoc Field. The Leopards are led by quarterback Artie Keough, a 150-pounder, who "throws well when our players are well." Keough is the younger brother of Marty Keough, of Red Sox baseball fame.

The LaVerne line averages about 192 while the backfield is a speedy 164.

One dark spot on the Leopard is the fact that injuries have weakened their offense, necessarily calling up a pair of reserve halfbacks. At the fullback post is freshman Ron Thomas, a 180-pounder who reportedly likes tight going.

According to Leopard coach Rowland Ortmyer, who is in his 11th year at the LaVerne helm, the team uses very few substitutes and never substitutes on a wholesale basis. He welcomed 30 players at the start of the season but expects to travel with a squad of 35.

On the Owls campus the Techmen, who have little knowledge of the weekend foe, are preparing an offense that contains as much passing as it does ground work.

According to Owl statistics quarterback Dick Olivas has connected on 29 of 65 tries for a total of 431 yards while Roy Johnson has hit 4 for 24 and 285 yards. Johnson's average per pass is 20.3 yards.

End Artie Hamilton has received 16 passes for a total of 215 yards while Artie Palmore, who has nailed 10, has amassed 283 yards. Dennis Farster has completed 14 for 185.

Fullback Bud Maupin leads the ground gainers with a total of 289 yards but halfback Charlie Wilson is tops per carry with an average of 7.48.

MEDFORD (Special)—Coaches and principals representing Southern Oregon Conference schools emphatically opposed moving the state A1 basketball tournament from Eugene to Portland at their fall meeting here over the weekend.

Secretary Lee Ragsdale was directed to send a letter to the Oregon School Activities Association stating the Southern Oregon Conference's position on the proposed move. SOC president Lester Harris said the students attending the tourney would be too difficult to control in a big city like Portland.

The conference also decided to schedule all athletic events for the coming year at the spring meeting in May. Harris will name a committee to draw up tentative schedules.

In other action the group: Limited each school to seven entries in the district cross country meet to be held in Ashland October 26.

A Klamath Union frosh squad that couldn't seem to generate an offense against Medford two weeks ago bounced back and picked up its first victory of the 1960 season on Wright Field last Saturday afternoon when they smashed the visiting Ashland Grizzlies 33 to 0.

Saturday they get a chance to make it two in a row when they play host to the Baby Comets from Central Point at 1:30 p.m. on Modoc Field.

Coach DeLance Duncan's young Pelicans, held scoreless in the first quarter by Ashland, easily rolled up a 14-0 halftime margin in the second frame, as Rich Bath plunged over from the one and teammate Daryl Mitchell scored on a brilliant 80-yard punt return.

The frosh 11 came out ready to go after the halftime intermission and added three more big TDs. Mitchell bombed through the Ashland line early in the third quarter and sped 40 yards for the score. Vern Petrick swept around the ends to add the extra point.

Klamath iced the game in the fourth quarter when Chuck Mills hauled in a pass from John Parisotto and dashed 80 yards for the touchdown.

Mills crossed into the end zone for the final time, again on a aerial shot from Parisotto, this time from 10 yards out. Petrick converted for the point.

KU Expects Stiff Test With Millers

"Any team that can hold South Eugene to just seven points deserves a lot of consideration," commented Klamath Union football coach Bob Williams, referring to the Springfield Millers, the Pel's Friday night non-conference foe.

"We know they have a good passing attack so tonight we'll get down to some brass tacks on pass defense," he added in his remarks to the Pelican-Booster Club this morning.

Monday and Tuesday the Pelican varsity gridders drilled hard on overall defensive tactics, utilizing the particular defense they intend to use against the Springfielders.

The Millers, somewhat weakened this season by the fact that the Springfield school system was split up with the opening of new Thurston High, were stopped 7-0 by the South Eugene Axemen last Friday.

Although the score was close the Millers were far short on the statistic side of the ledger. They collected only three first downs while the Axemen racked up 12. South Eugene counted 125 yards on the ground and allowed the Millers only 12. In the air they were outlasted 82 yards to 26. The deepest penetration they could make into Eugene territory was the 30-yard strike.

The Pelicans are shaking off the memory of the 49-6 dumping at Medford last Friday and show no signs of giving up or considering the season over, said Williams. "We've got three games to go and we can end up with a pretty fair season—but we've got to go all out."

In the three games to go, the Pel must do without the services of halfback Earl Brinson, as well, probably, as Kent Hunsaker. Brinson, who was injured in the season opener with Boise, is still limping with a bad knee. Hunsaker, who suffered a broken hand against Grants Pass, may, with luck, return before the end of the season, but it is not possible for him to be ready this week.

Sherm Allen will continue in the quarterback slot in Hunsaker's absence. Statistically Allen has a better passing average than Hunsaker. He has completed seven of 23 tries for a mark of 20.3 yards per loss. Hunsaker has a 16-44 mark for 18.8 but in addition he ranks as the number two ground gainer on the club with a total of 182. Fullback Larry McClure is number one on the ground with 368, a 4.23 average.

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AP Chooses Bashful Boy For Honor

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Willburn Hollis is a shy 19-year-old who quarterbacked the Iowa football team.

"He's a real bashful boy," says Coach Forest Evashevski. "So when the 200-pound junior said quietly in the Hawkeyes huddle last Saturday: 'Guys, it's gotta be right this time,' his teammates knew he meant it."

They gave him great protection as he tossed a 34-yard touchdown pass which gave Iowa a 28-21 victory over Wisconsin and boosted the Hawks into the top spot in the Associated Press football poll.

That pass and two scoring runs against Wisconsin earned Hollis the AP back of the week honors. When told of the honor, Hollis said "I'm glad" in the same calm manner he displayed after an offside penalty against Iowa nullified his 29-yard touchdown pass the play before his successful pitch.

"I knew we could score, even after that first touchdown pass was called back," Hollis related. "We still had four downs and one minute to go — and a minute is a long time."

The Negro orphan from Boys Town, Neb., has played a key role in the Hawks' first four victories, scoring five touchdowns and passing for three others.

Texas Tech Boy Picked

E. J. (The Beast) Holub, hunking Texas Tech center and line-backer with the agility of a half-back, today was named Associated Press Lineman of the Week for his outstanding play against Baylor last Saturday.

Holub, 22, a senior who stands 6-4 and weighs 217, was all but a one-man gang despite his club's 14-7 loss to the nation's seventh-ranked college football team.

A second-team AP All America last season and a standout both on offense and defense for three years, Holub made 15 unassisted tackles, helped on eight others, recovered a fumble and blocked a pass in what Southwest observers tabbed "his finest game of an exceptional career."

"He stopped more than one play that was going for a touchdown," said Baylor coach John Bridgers.

"It was his finest game of the year. He's an All American if I ever saw one," said Tech coach DeWitt Weaver.

Holub was a high school hero at Lubbock High School as a tackle before enrolling at Tech.

First-ranked Minnesota and eighth-ranked Purdue are both underdogs — Minnesota by 14 points to Michigan and Purdue by seven points to Iowa, the nation's No. 1 team.

Second-ranked Mississippi is a nine-point choice over Arkansas, fourth-ranked Navy is 21 points over Pennsylvania, sixth-ranked Missouri is 14 points over Iowa State and seventh-ranked Baylor is 15 points over Texas A. & M.

Third-ranked Syracuse and ninth-ranked Washington are such heavy favorites over West Virginia and Oregon State that New York odds-makers refuse to quote a line.

San Jose St. Coach Cited
SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—He coaches pro-type football at an amateur-type college. He recruits some of his football players from the track and field team.

And he claims he's "lucky" to have playing for him the "world's smallest fullback."

He's Bob (Titch) Titchenal, head coach of San Jose State College, named by United Press International today as college football's "coach of the week."

Titchenal's crew, a two-touchdown underdog, wrecked Stanford, 34-20, Saturday — and the Spartan rooters were so happy about it all that they engaged in a 45-minute free-for-all riot with the "enemies" from Stanford.

While the coach didn't approve of the riot, he thinks spirit is important in any good athletic team. And he thinks style is just as important.

"I believe in suiting the style of play to the type of players," says Titchenal, 43, a tall, blond collar-ad type who played pro football for the Washington Redskins, San Francisco Forty Niners and Los Angeles Dons. "This year I happen to have a lot of speed, so we are using the pro-type spread T-formation."

The "speed" includes such men as Willie Williams, a 9.5 sprinter; Mack Burton, 9.6; and Johnny Johnson, the mid-sized full-back, who rambles the length of the field in 10 seconds flat. Also on the squad, as one of the fleet halfbacks, is Phil Clifton, a fine hurdler.

SEKS TITLE FIGHT
LONDON (UPI)—Terry Downes, middleweight champion of the British Isles, appealed today to Secretary John B. Franko of the United States Navy to help him get a shot at the world title.
