Campaign Said 'Cautious'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The presidential candidates are making this the most cautious campaign in recent history.

They might have started a fire long ago if there weren't some sensitive things they had to worry about.

Take Sen. John F. Kennedy, who criticizes America's defenses, says it has lost prestige, and is lagging economically.

All these are criticisms of President Eisenhower's two administrations. But Kennedy is careful not to tear into Eisenhower personally.

Asked why, Kennedy said he has great respect for the President and that his criticisms are after all aimed at his administration.

But there's a sound reason why the senator is laying off the President himself. It might cost him votes because Eisenhower is still so highly popular--so much so that he could probably beat either Kennedy or Vice President Richard M. Nixon if he were running against them right now.

Nixon has some problems of his own to worry about--more than Kennedy, perhaps--and certainly enough to keep him from pulling out all the stops.

In the first place, there are more registered Democrats than Republicans.

He has to hold the Republicans but can't win with them alone. He has to appeal to independents and some Democrats too.

He has obviously criticized the administration on some things, but very obliquely. He has praised its record highly but at the same time says a record is something not to stand on but to build on.

He has two things to worry about inside his own party, which may explain why he sounds less liberal than Kennedy but not so conservative as Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, the darling of

the party's extreme right wing. Nixon can't afford to sound too conservative without antagonizing liberal Republicans. And he can't sound too liberal without inducing the Goldwater platoon, who wouldn't vote for a Democrat, to stay home election day.

So Nixon and Kennedy have to tip-toe a bit while giving the appearance of running to a fire. If anything, Nixon has to be more cautious than Kennedy.

His dilemma showed up sharply when his vice presidential running mate, Henry Cabot Lodge, got loose in Harlem and sounded off on the subject of Negroes.

He said it would be a "wonderful thing to have a qualified Negro in the Cabinet."

This might have appeal for Northern Negroes but hardly for white Southerners at a time when Nixon is hoping the Democratic platform, with its very liberal civil rights plank, might drive Southern states into his camp.

Although Nixon himself has been pretty forthright both in the South and in the North in saying improvement in civil rights is necessary, he tried to sidestep Lodge's exuberance.

He thought it important enough to issue a statement saying his Cabinet selections would depend on a man's ability and not on his race or creed.

Both Nixon and Kennedy are anxious for that Southern vote. Nixon has sent Lodge into Dixie, besides going there himself. Kennedy has gone there, too, and has sent his running mate, Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, barnstorming the Southern acres.

If there's one slogan the candidates in this campaign carry around in their heads at all time and in all places it probably would be this one: caution.

New Show Sparkles

NEW YORK (AP)—"Tenderloin" is a new Broadway musical frolic blending those favorite box-office hues, purple passion and rosy nostalgia.

All about the wicked, wicked ways of Little Old New York when grandpa was a tot, the show arrived Monday night on the stage of the 46th Street Theater.

It has zip, sparkle, and most of all an infectious score filled with new melodies of Gay '90s vintage to set listeners humming and chuckling.

The performance, led by star Maurice Evans and newcomer Ron Hunsman, has the polish expected from director George Abbott, engaged here on his 96th White Way production.

Evans lets the orchestra provide the melody when he lines out lyrics, moves with stylish aplomb through his role of a sin-busting clergyman who is determined to close up the fancy houses of vice.

Hunsman, a handsome, lusty-voiced baritone from Rockford, Ill., who arrived on Broadway just last season, enacts the brash lad who double-deals his way through cleanup of the juicy "tenderloin" district.

In the feminine division, Eileen Rodgers stands out with ringing vocal vigor as one of the damaged damsels; Wynn Miller is able as the social heiress; and Margery Gray does a comic turn of addled singing.

Among the songs, produced by the team of Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick, special cheers belong to "Little Old New York," "Artificial Flowers," "The Picture of Happiness" and "My Miss Mary."
