MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover today quoted estimates that between 70 and 80 per cent of the Iron Curtain diplomatic representatives in this country have "some type of espionage assignment."

Radar Men To Bone Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy has ordered special training courses to sharpen the perception of radar men aboard "electronic intelligence" ships and planes.

The radar men are being taught to quickly distinguish between radar beams from unfriendly and friendly transmitters.

Such quick distinction is necessary in deciding whether a plane or ship has come under the radar search of a Communist, Allied or U.S. transmitter—and whether counter-radar equipment should be opened up to frustrate the searchers.

The recognition program includes sound tapes, slides and narratives to make a radar man familiar with what radar pings from friendly and unfriendly sources will sound and look like on his equipment.

Traffic Arrests On Juveniles Show Decrease

Juvenile traffic arrests showed a marked decrease in September, the traffic office of the juvenile department reported today.

The office said 29 arrests were made in the month, down from 33 arrests in August. Total arrests for the year, through September, were 351.

Of the September arrests, seven were for having no operator's license and seven were for speeding.

September violations were rather evenly spread through age groups. Eight were of drivers 17½ to 18, seven were of drivers 16 to 16½, six were in the 16½-17 age group, and five were in the 17-17½ age group.

Arrests in September involved 22 boys and six girls (one driver was cited for two violations).

Less Expensive Refiner Seen By Reich Scientist

BONN, Germany (AP)—A lead-the force of electrically produced thermal energy. This must be repeated many times to produce U235 rich enough to be used as fuel in nuclear weapons.

The West German government a few days ago moved to hang the secret label on the patent for the gas centrifuge method of refining uranium developed by Prof. Wilhelm Groth.

Groth, 56, director of physical chemistry at Bonn University said in an interview that it will take at least a year, probably two, "before the instrument is developed enough to be used for commercial purposes."

Cost for installation: about 10,000 marks (\$2,380).

The greatest money saving the centrifuge method has over the accepted diffusion procedure now used in the United States, Soviet Union and Britain lies in the installation of the device, Groth said.

The centrifuge is used to separate uranium 235 from the heavier isotope U238. U238 is used as fuel in nuclear reactors.

Both methods begin after the uranium ore has been reduced to gas. In the centrifuge method the gas is whirled about at enormous speeds, isolating the richer U235 much as wheat is isolated from chaff.

In the diffusion method, the gas is pressed through tiny holes by
