

\$45,000 Available To Winners

A total of \$45,000 is available in awards to winners of the 1960 "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest which will be concluded with announcement of the national winner. The contest is sponsored jointly by the American Wool Council and the American National Wool Growers Association.

The contest is divided into three age groups including: beginners, 13 years; juniors, 14-16 years; and seniors, 18-22 years.

The garments entered must be of 100 per cent wool.

Judging of local entries will precede the style show in the city library auditorium, starting at 7 p.m. Wednesday, October 26. Mrs. Earl Mack, chairman, Mrs. John Vaughn and Mrs. Charles Thurman will judge the garments.

Entries must be taken to the Vaughn home, 5341 Bryant Avenue, not later than Monday, October 24, earlier if possible.

Mrs. John Hayden is chairman of the style show to which the public is invited. Winning entries in the three divisions will go to state competition at Portland November 12. Winners will be guests at the Imperial Hotel and will attend the famous "Holiday on Ice," breakfast at the Imperial and luncheon at Meier & Frank where they will model their entries for the judges. State winners go to the national.

Contestants will appear here November 5 at a Willard Hotel buffet dinner featuring lamb, sponsored by the Klamath County Farm Bureau. Speaker at the dinner will be George Markdian, San Francisco.

Mrs. Clint Lewis, Pendleton, state director of the Oregon "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest, will chair the state contest. Mrs. William Tubach, local co-chairman with Chairman Mrs. H. DeLamater, will chair the winners to Portland.

The national winner in the senior and junior divisions will receive a two-week, all expense designer's tour to New York, London, Paris, and Rome via Pan American Airways. Twenty state senior winners and 20 state junior winners will earn five-day trips to national finals in Denver, given by the F. W. Woolworth Co. and the women's auxiliary.

Scholarships will include a \$500 fashion award for the most fashionable garment in any class. Coats & Clark Inc.; \$500 tuition to a senior winner approved by the Board of Admissions of Colorado Woman's College; \$300 tuition for the junior winner at national level by Pendleton Woolen Mills; \$1,000 tuition to grand prize senior winner to college of choice, Woolite Inc.; and a \$1,000 tuition to college of her choice to the second place prize winner in the national by Woolite Inc.

Numerous other merchandise prizes and savings bonds will go to lesser winners.

Aid Sought For Ambulance

MALIN—Malin City Council met October 4, with Tulelake Mayor Tommy Slaughter, and Councilman John Quinn, Tulelake, directors of Malin Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of soliciting aid from the Malin area towards the purchase of a new ambulance to replace the one which was stolen and wrecked. The city council gave its approval to the project.

Ival Taylor, city recorder, was instructed to post notices of the coming city election, November 8, for election of three councilmen who will be elected for a four-year term each beginning January 1. Petitions have been circulated for Dan McCulliffe, George Bauer and George Pappie, their names have been properly certified by the city recorder to appear on the city of Malin ballot. Councilman Huffman did not desire to run for reelection.

Ten post signs were authorized to be installed at various intersections within the city limits. Cecil Jackson, councilman, and John Phillips gave a report of their trash and rubbish inspection of the city. Main objection was the location of trash barrels on the main streets, causing an unsightly appearance.

The purchase of three fire hose nozzles through Civil Defense for the fire department was authorized.

The regular council meeting will convene at 7:30 p.m. through the winter months as was authorized by an ordinance last year with the next regular meeting to be held November 1, 1960 and reconvene on November 8, to results thereof.

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Symposium To Be Held October 28

A medical symposium will be held in Klamath Falls on Friday, October 28, at the Willard Hotel.

The outgrowth of a group of seven doctors who organized the venture about a year ago, it will be called the Klamath Academy of Medicine and Science and will feature some outstanding medical men and other scientific individuals.

Doctors from Northern California and Southern Oregon areas have been invited to attend the day-long session.

Registration will start at the Willard Hotel at 1:30 p.m. October 28 and continue throughout the afternoon.

The program will open at 2 p.m. and will include such subjects as "Postoperative Electrolyte Problems," "Idiopathic Pulmonary Hypertension," and "Importance of Fluid Intake Patterns in Disease."

Guest speakers will be Dr. S. Gilbert Blount Jr., professor of medicine, head of the division of cardiology at the University of Colorado Medical Center, and Dr. Joseph H. Holmes, professor and head of the Laboratory Medicine and Clinical Pathology at the University of Colorado Medical Center.

A banquet at 8 p.m. will conclude the day's program.

Dr. Robert L. King, Seattle, will be moderator for the programs.

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
