

### 'Tom Sawyers' In Custody

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Three teen-agers who stole a boat Saturday to see the world were returned to harbor today in custody on a Coast Guard cutter. The would-be Tom Sawyers were met by their relieved but not-too-happy parents when they were brought by a harbor speed boat to the dock about 1 a.m. The parents and their wayward sons were given a room at the Harbor Department to chat briefly

before two juvenile officers whisked the boys to Juvenile Hall at nearby Santa Ana. "They ought to thank their lucky stars the Coast Guard caught up with them as soon as it did," said Dr. Marvin J. Reitz, father of one of the youths. "Sailing in the open ocean is dangerous."

### Jury Mulls Finch Case

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A jury began its first full day today deliberating on murder charges against Dr. R. Bernard Finch and his young paramour, Carole Trepp.

The state asked the jury of 11 men and one man hearing the trial to return a verdict of first degree murder against the lovers for the slaying of the wealthy surgeon's wife.

Each verdict carries with it a mandatory sentence of either life imprisonment or death in the gas chamber under California law.

The jury finally began its deliberations late Wednesday after listening to 99 witnesses in nearly 17 weeks of trial. After meeting for less than two hours, the jurors were locked up in hotel rooms for the night.

### Concil OKs Tax Revise

TULELE — An ordinance amending state sales tax law which will take effect on January 1, was passed unanimously by the Tulele City Council at their Oct. 17 meeting. This tax was passed recently by Siskiyou County and it is mandatory that incorporated cities in the county low within a 30-day period. ### Betrothal Revealed

LOS BANOS (UPI) — Vincent Lee Hillier, former husband of Iran's princess Fatimah Pahlavi, revealed Monday that he is engaged to marry Italian film actress Milly Vitale, 25.

The actress and her mother, Madame Ricardo Vitale, arrived at San Francisco Monday night for a visit here. Hillier, 35, greeted the lovely red-haired actress with a warm embrace as she stepped off the plane.

Hillier, a transportation and travel agency executive, was married in Rome 10 years ago to Princess Fatimah, sister of the Shah of Iran. He was the first American to marry royalty since Wallis Simpson wed the Duke of Windsor.

Some weeks after the civil ceremony they were remarried with Moslem rites.

Hillier said Monday he made an "honorary Moslem" then, but he said he did not think this would interfere with his marriage to Miss Vitale, a Catholic.

Hillier and the princess were divorced in July, 1959. The princess married General Mohammed Khatem of the Iranian air force last January.

Hillier has two sons by the Princess Fatimah—Prince Kayvan, 8, and Prince Darius, 3, who live with him nine months each year.

Miss Vitale and Hillier met three months ago at the Rome Opera, where her father is a leading official.

The actress and her mother are staying at the home of his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Leroy Hillier. When and where the marriage will take place has not yet been decided, he said.

### Attorney General Denies GOP Charge

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Attorney General Stanley A. Mosk Wednesday night denied Republican charges of "misuse of his office and of public funds" by mailing out campaign material for Sen. John F. Kennedy.

The charges were made here by Joseph Martin Jr., California GOP committeeman. Martin said Mosk mailed the material "in state envelopes, on state stationery, and presumably with the state paying the postage."

Mosk, in a statement telephoned from Los Angeles to San Francisco, said the material involved a subject which he considered "nonpartisan." He said it amounted to "about twice 120 letters at a total cost of \$9.80 in postage and 15 cents worth of stationery."

Martin included with his charges photostats of an envelope, a letter and a release he said were mailed out by the attorney general under official auspices.

The GOP committeeman called proposed White House conference on narcotics.

Regarding the telegram, Mosk's letter said, "I am hopeful Vice President Nixon will state he is similarly interested, although to date the Eisenhower-Nixon administration has ignored a congressional resolution, a dropped unanimously on April 4, 1960, calling for a White House conference on narcotics."

Martin said Mosk "certainly has a right to express his political opinions, but he should not conspire to use the facilities and authority of his state office for political purposes."

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
