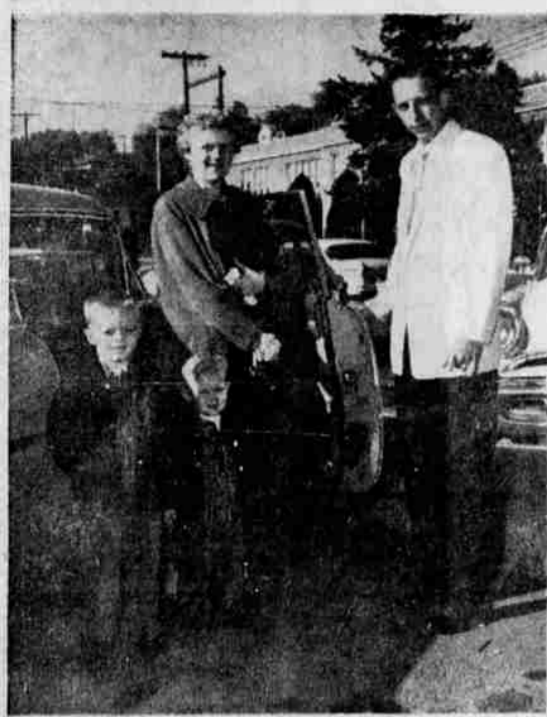

## Unitarian Church School Adopts Young Asian Girl

Ock Ja, 11-year-old Korean girl, has been financially "adopted" by members of the Unitarian Church School of the Klamath Unitarian Fellowship of Klamath Falls. The adoption is through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc. with headquarters in New York City.

This plan has rehabilitated more than 75,000 children on a personal basis since its founding in 1937, and is now helping 19,000 South Korea, France, Vietnam and Hong Kong. Over the past 23 years more than 600,000 individuals and groups in America have helped needy children overseas through this plan.

There is no legal responsibility. The Foster Parent promises to contribute \$15 monthly for at least one year. Of this amount the child receives \$8 each month in a cash grant. The remainder is used for periodic food and new clothing packages, translations of letters, medical services and education. Because each child is treated as an individual, any special needs of the child or his family are taken care of by plan from its general fund.
