In Same Area Government Agencies Plan 2 County Roads

in Medford. "We have to take that into consideration."

"I don't think there is any particular conflict," he said. "Highway 99 and Highway 97 parallel each other, and nobody seems to mind."

One road is being developed jointly by Klamath County and the U.S. Forest Service. The county portion leaves Route 66 half a mile east of Keno and passes the east side of Galtman Lake to reach Clover Creek Guard Station. The Forest Service will construct the road from the guard station up Spencer Creek, by the east side of Buck Lake to the Dead Indian two miles east of the Jackson County line. Length: 21 miles.

The other road, planned by the BLM, leaves Route 66 six miles west of Keno, runs along Clover Creek to the south side of Buck Lake, then swings westward through Howard Prairie to reach the Dead Indian seven miles west of the Jackson County line. Length: 23 miles.

The roads would serve separate timber areas south of the Dead Indian Road, near Clover Creek Guard Station, where they would be only two miles apart, the BLM will build a connecting link.

The BLM has been planning its road for several years, and is farthest along with construction. It attempted to construct the road through a timber sales contract, in which an operator agrees to build an access road and the road cost is deducted from the cost of the timber he buys. Hostetter said. However, the BLM rejected bids it received last June because road costs were too high. It advertised for bids to clear the right of way only.

The Manley Logging Company of Medford now is completing removal of 7.4 million board feet from the BLM right of way. Hostetter said, and should be finished in a few weeks.

Representatives of the Bureau of Public Roads, the federal agency charged with construction, were to inspect the right of way Friday. They will estimate costs and will advertise for construction bids. When grading begins depends upon the weather and the contractor, Hostetter said. Possibly a good deal of grading could be started this year. The BLM hopes to have grading complete next summer.

Negotiations

The county is negotiating for right of way clearance on its portion of the Spencer Creek Road now.

"We hope to begin construction this winter, and have the road cleared and graded by the end of summer," County Engineer Jack Kalinski said.

The Forest Service has completed engineering field work and expects to design its portion of the Spencer Creek Road, and make cost estimates, this winter.

Douglas Shaw, assistant ranger for the Klamath ranger district here, said a timber sales contract would be let for bid "when egress (for timber) is assured by either the county or the BLM road." The contract probably would be for 10 million board feet of timber, Shaw said.

Estimates Incomplete

Cost estimates are either premature or incomplete. The county estimate, for work with its own crews, is about \$20,000 per mile for its 11-mile section of the Spencer Creek Road, or a total of \$220,000. The Forest Service estimates between \$20,000 and \$25,000 a mile, Shaw said, or from \$200,000 to \$250,000 for its 10-mile portion. Part of the cost, Shaw said, would be paid from appropriated funds, rather than through timber sales contracts.

The BLM cost estimate depends upon findings of the Bureau of Public Roads inspectors Friday.

All sources agree timber access roads into the area below Lake of the Woods are needed.

"We can get from 60 to 80 million board feet a year," Walker said. "And we need it. I heard four mills are going to close (here) between now and November 15."

Reduced Hauling Costs

Walker said hauling costs would be reduced from \$1.40 to \$1.60 per 1,000 board feet, and also be said logs brought down the Spencer Creek Road could be floated in the Klamath River at Keno "to keep them off the highway."

Hostetter said the BLM road would serve many purposes. He added: "There are trails and cowpaths everywhere, but they are substandard and hardly usable. Getting principal roads will put some strength and permanence into the road system."

Shaw said the Lake of the Woods Highway was unsuitable for logging, and another road was needed.

"Eagle Ridge is murder on logging trucks," he said, "and Lakeshore Drive just isn't safe."

But whether two roads are needed is another question. One source said loggers wouldn't use the lower portion of the BLM road anyway, because it joins Route 66 in a valley. "They'd have to go uphill in either direction, Medford or Klamath Falls."

Walker said he, Klamath County loggers, the BLM, the Forest Service, Sen. Claire Engle (D-Calif.) and others talked about the BLM road at a meeting in San Francisco last spring.

"We thought we had them talked out of it," he said.

Added County Commissioner Frank Ganong, "They were pretty bitter about our challenging their road."
