

WBA Rally Held In Dunsmuir

Campsites Discussed

DUNSMUIR — Campsite improvements in the past five years and campsite prospects for the future were discussed on Thursday by John Watt, district ranger, Shasta Trinity National Forest, at the Mount Shasta Chamber of Commerce meeting.

Additional campsite and campsite improvements in southern Siskiyou County are currently dependent upon budget allotments, Watt said. He said the bulk of the Shasta-Trinity campsite work in the last two years has been at Shasta Lake where the demand appeared to be the greatest.

He felt the completed work there plus the opening of the Trinity Dam recreational areas this next year should allow some shifts in funds to other areas.

The Gumbot Lake area offers the greatest potential development close to Mount Shasta, Watt said.

In response to a charge that campsite development all over the area would in turn relieve pressure on Shasta Lake sites, Watt reminded those present of federal participation in the Everett Memorial Highway. "We can't complain too much," he said.

Plans for the Gumbot Lake layout have been complete since 1956, Watts said, and await financing. Barney Hoffman, chamber president, asked if campsites could be established at chamber expense and turned over to the forest service for maintenance. Watt said he would find out.

Watt told of progress from 1955 when \$45 was allowed for campground maintenance in the district to the present budget of \$2,000 plus personnel for garbage collection and other maintenance. He said there are now 40 units in five locations in the Sacramento district.

Fifty camp units plus trailer units are planned at Panther Meadows on Mt. Shasta. These are slated to be developed on a concession basis by the Ski Bowl Corporation when bowl development warrants expansion.

Watt praised the Mount Shasta Rod and Gun Club campsite project at Castle Lake. He felt the major problems would be maintenance and replacement. Forest service plans include improvements on the Castle Lake Road, Watt assured the chamber. He hoped this project could be undertaken next year.

Student Court Cracks Down On Violators

MOUNT SHASTA — Dennis Cross, president of the Mount Shasta High School student body, has issued a notice that violations of a few students in car racing had brought a crackdown on offenders.

A student court will mete out punishment to all who violate any of the provisions. Car driving students will have to obtain a permit from the school office to bring a car to school. They must also agree to abide by the rules which cover such privilege and which will be printed on the back of the car permit.

The student court will be made up of five student council members, and a jury will be selected from reliable students with mature judgment.

Those who are found guilty will be dealt with according to the offense committed. Punishment will run from being compelled to make a five-minute talk before their English class to being banned from bringing cars to school.

The student body president points out that violations by a few might bring about a total ban on cars. This would be punishing many innocent students because of a guilty few.

Burglaries Reported By Sheriff

YREKA — Sheriff A. B. Coltar's office reported several burglaries which have occurred in the Tulelake area. Among the burglaries reported were the following:

William H. Shedd, contractor, reported that several hundred gallons of gasoline, diesel fuel, solvent and other oils and supplies were stolen from the operation in the Southwest Sump area, 12 miles southwest of Tulelake.

Dean C. Hoelck of North Hollywood reported that approximately two cases of shotgun shells were stolen from his station wagon which he had left parked on the last dike of Tule Lake, near the hiring line located in the League of Nations about four miles south of Tulelake.

Leo K. Brandt of Redwood City reported 14 boxes of shotgun shells and three quarts of liquor were stolen from his pickup camper. Brandt told deputies someone had first tried to enter through the doors and finally smashed windows to gain entrance. The camper was parked east of the lake about five miles south of Tulelake.

Pair Nabbed Garden Club Slates Trip For Fire

NAPA (UPI)—A housewife and a teen-aged boy, both of Napa, were arrested Thursday, in connection with a brush and grass fire that caused more than \$800,000 damage north of here last weekend.

Arrested were Mrs. Curtis Foxberg, wife of a Napa businessman, and Ronald E. Nicholas, 18. Both were released without bail.

Mrs. Foxberg was accused of burning trash without a permit and failing to control the fire. Nicholas was charged with driving a truck into an emergency area without permission.

Maximum penalty on the charges is six months imprisonment or \$500 fine.

Arresting officers said a trash fire in the backyard of Mrs. Foxberg's Soda Canyon home got out of control and was whipped through the canyon by high winds. It burned 24 hours, blackened 4,000 acres, and destroyed 12 homes and about 30 other buildings.

The warrant charged that Nicholas drove a pickup truck through the fire without permission. A blanket on the truck caught fire and later blew off, spreading the blaze.

Deserter Gives Views

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet news agency Tass said today Bruce F. Davies, 24, Los Angeles, deserted the U.S. Army in Germany two months ago because he "doubted the sincerity" of America's leaders.

Tass, quoting an alleged statement from Davies, said he began to doubt the sincerity of American leadership about two years ago. It said the soldier fled to East Germany Aug. 19 after serving four years and nine months in the Army.

"The U2 and RB47 espionage flights, the atomic rearmament of West Germany, the sabotage of the Paris summit meeting," Davies was quoted as saying.

In Washington, the Army had no immediate comment except to say that a Pfc. Bruce Davis, son of Mrs. Dorothy Talbert of Scottsdale, Ariz., has been reported absent without leave since Aug. 19. Davies was a member of a combat support company attached to the 7th Infantry Division.

"The Army reported his last name as Davis instead of Davies as reported by Tass, and also listed his home address as Scottsdale instead of Los Angeles."

50-Man Posse Ends Search For Fugitive

ROUGH AND READY (UPI)—A 50-man posse ended its 36-hour search for a fugitive Thursday night when the hungry robber walked out of the Nevada County brushland and surrendered without a fuss.

Officers said that Robert Cal Adams, 24, a construction worker from Portland, admitted Wednesday's robbery of the Mid-Valley Savings and Loan Association office in Marysville, 28 miles away.

Adams took to the brush near here Wednesday afternoon after abandoning a car in a dead-end road. The search party included deputies from Nevada and Yuba counties, FBI agents, a helicopter and a bloodhound.

Under Sheriff Frank Gallino made the capture after motorists on Route 26 alerted officers to Adams' hitchhiking attempts, about three miles from where his car was abandoned.

Gallino said that Adams had \$1,151 in his possession along with two .22 caliber pistols.

Permission Granted

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The California Division of Corporations Thursday granted Kimberly-Clark Corp. permission to purchase the Ralph L. Smith Co., a Northern California timber and sawmill firm.

The \$30 million transaction calls for the exchange of 381,294 shares of Kimberly-Clark stock for 84,743 shares of the Smith firm.

Kimberly-Clark plans to build a pulp mill on Smith property near Anderson in Shasta County.

Vision Of Child Discussed

DUNSMUIR — The concern of the parent, the teacher and the professional people should be with the child's vision rather than his sight, Dr. H. A. Meredith said at the Dunsmuir Elementary FTA meeting recently.

He defined vision as the ability to see plus the mental reaction. He said the eye is not a camera but a nerve organism and that vision does not take place in the eye but involves the total child.

Meredith, a Dunsmuir optometrist, explained to the PTA members the complex steps that prepare the child for reading from the time of his birth to age 5, 6 or 7. He said reading is one of the most complex tasks that man undertakes and that some 6-year-olds are not physically ready for the reading task.

He recommended periodic eye checks as just as important as physical and dental checkups. He said diagnosis of eye deficiencies are important because a child should not be asked to perform beyond his ability. In response to a question from the audience he stated color blindness is one of the least understood visual defects. He said there is no cure for color blindness but its recognition is important.

Beekeeper Given Fine Of \$250

DORRIS—Isaac Leonard Skidmore, a beekeeper of Mount Hebron, appeared before Judge Les Chase in Dorris Judicial District Court Monday charged with illegal possession of a female deer. He was fined \$250 or 50 days.

His hunting license and deer tags were confiscated. Marland Francis Kusiek of Mount Hebron was arrested on the same charge and fined \$200 or 40 days.

Authorities report the doe was shot by Skidmore Sunday morning near the Mount Hebron garage pit. He cut the deer's throat, then slit its stomach to prevent swelling. He hid the doe in the brush and went to his neighbor, Kusiek, to solicit his help and the use of his car. After dark, the two men drove out to the cache and loaded the doe into Kusiek's car.

Earlier, Bob Lucas had heard of the doe shooting and with Constable Archie Brimmers of Dorris, was waiting at the scene of the killing. Just after the deer was loaded, they stepped out and made the arrest. Both men were admitted to the county jail in Yreka in lieu of their fines.
