Klamath Hosts Tokyo Visitor

The Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Board played host during the week of October 10 to Agnes Lillian Huang of Tokyo.

This charming vivacious lady has three jobs incomparable to her diminutive stature. Her card bears the impressive titles of Chinese delegate to UN Children's Welfare Committee, member of the Republic of China Legislature and President of Children's Welfare Commission. Under her direction three branch offices in Hong Kong, Formosa and Tokyo care for over 30,000 children, many of whom are handicapped, and 7,000 disabled soldiers.

Four months each year she attends session of the legislature. Agnes Huang is in the United States through the Cooperative Community Recreation Exchange Project which is organized by the United States State Department and conducted by the International Recreation Association. Representatives from all parts of the world spend four months in this country to visit and study the recreational programs in various locations.

Before coming to Klamath Falls she visited Boston, Washington, D.C., Flint, Detroit, New York City and Canada. She will visit in San Francisco and Mexico before returning home.

She attended a White House conference for children and youth and the United Nations as representative for the Chinese Republic on welfare problems. In Washington she met with Eleanor Roosevelt, whom she admires greatly.

Particularly interested in methods of educating handicapped persons, she attended a summer workshop devoted to that subject at the University of New York. Agnes Huang made many friends during her visit to Klamath Falls. She was the house guest of the Stanley Millers and Martin Braumers during her stay.

All who met her listened with interest to her enthusiastic accounts of her experiences. Effective gestures aided her when words became difficult—she admitted to being able to read and write better than speak the English language.

She told of her Japanese mother who raised her family to be Roman Catholics in the family tradition of 100 years. She has not seen or heard of her family for 12 years when she was flown out of Peking during the war to safety on the last plane.

Knowledge gained in her United States visit she hopes will enable her to receive her PhD degree from the University of Japan upon her return home.
