Modoc Women Topic For AAUW Speaker

Newspaper accounts of the time provide the only unsalted reports available on Modoc Wars, according to Mrs. L. H. Stone who spoke at a luncheon meeting of the American Association of University Women October 15 at the Willard Hotel.

"The lot of Modoc women was a hard one: they were responsible for most of the work, bore children and could be bought and sold at will. Because of this," Mrs. Stone explained, "many of them were glad to marry even 'low class' white men."

"These women were torn between two loyalties—to the Indians who were their own people and to the whites who were their husbands," Mrs. Stone said. "The white husbands of these Modocs were commonly known as 'squaw men' and their encouragement of the Modocs, direct or indirect, did much to bring on the Modoc War."

Newspapers of the times mentioned a number of outstanding Modoc women besides the well known Winema, according to Mrs. Stone. She named such personalities as "Long Legs" and "One Eyed Dixie," who served as messengers; Princess Mary, sister of Captain Jack; Modoc Sally and Wild Girl, about whom little is known; and Matilda Whittle, wife of a ferry boat operator.

Mrs. Stone co-authored "Our Great Northwest" and has been primarily responsible for the Klamath Falls Oregon Historical Reference Library. She was introduced by Mrs. Glenn C. Miller, program chairman.

Table arrangements of fall flowers in tulle baskets woven by Klamath Indians and flanked with gourds decorated the room. Members and their guests will see movies taken by Victor O'Neill and Dr. Ralph Stearns and a display of latest model Winchester rifles at the next general meeting November 17 at 7 p.m. at the Willard Hotel. Headquarter your tag file in an unused soap suds, a desk drawer, or a large kraft envelope where it can always be quickly available.
