Huskies Scramble To Win

PORTLAND (AP) — Washington, the Rose Bowl favorites, had to scramble from behind to edge Oregon State 30-29 in a spintangling battle between two West Coast football leaders here Saturday.

Quarterback Bob Hivner, replacing injured All-America Bob Schloredt, knotted the score with a touchdown from the one-yard line that climaxed a 64-yard drive with just two minutes and seven seconds remaining.

It was the running of fleet halfbacks George Fleming and Charlie Mitchell that saved the day for Washington. Fleming scored two touchdowns and Mitchell one.

OSC Leads

Oregon State got off to a 12-0 lead in the first quarter and had Washington in the hole throughout that period. In the second period Fleming and Mitchell finally got their chance.

First, Fleming ran 38 yards to a touchdown and then in later periods Mitchell scored on a 36-yard run and Fleming followed with several fine runs, climaxed by a 12-yard burst through tackle, cutting the margin to 29-23.

Both Mitchell and Fleming contributed sizable gains to Washington's final march. The big gains were a 22-yard dash by Fleming and 13-yard end sweep by Mitchell, putting the ball on the Oregon State three. It took Washington three plays from there to score against the stubborn Stars.

Huskies 5-1

Washington, which now has a 3-1 record, went into the game a six-point favorite, but Sophomore halfback Terry Baker of Oregon State almost pulled an upset all by himself.

Twice Washington fumbles allowed easy State scores. The first came in the opening minutes as Oregon State recovered a fumble on the Washington 13. In five plays, Baker was over for a touchdown. Baker next engineered a 52-yard drive late in the first period, and then, after Fleming had cut the count to 12-7, moved Oregon State 75 yards. He accounted for 64 yards himself and set up a 20-yard field goal by Amos Marsh.

A rarity in Prep football . . . the lad who can step up and boot the place kick for a three-point . . . Andy Knudsen at St. Helens has one, however. He's junior Jack Overstreet . . . has two to his credit so far this season, in addition to a 10-15 mark for point-after tries. Just to cap his performance, Overstreet returned a kickoff 75 yards for a touchdown against Oregon City last Friday. (Wonder if any college coaches know about him?) Hah!

U-Oregon notes . . . Oregon has been fortunate in the past dozen years in having four brilliant quarterbacks, and oddly enough three of them were relatively unsung as prep players. Norm Van Brocklin (now with the Chiefs) was the first.

Army Scores 54

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) — Army's first stringers scored every time they had the ball and the reserves did almost as well Saturday as the Cadets handed hapless Villanova its sixth straight football defeat 54-0.

The worst defeat inflicted by an Army team on Villanova was 83-0 back in 1944 when one of Army's great wartime teams humbled the Wildcats.

But Saturday's score could have been bigger. One Army touchdown was called back for a holding penalty and another time the Cadets fumbled after getting a first down on the Villanova one.

Duke Leads Atlantic

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Duke built up a two touchdown lead on sophomore halfback Mark Leggett's 70-yard end run and then repelled four deep fourth period penetrations to whip Clemson, 21-6, Saturday.

The victory solidified Duke's hold on first place in Atlantic Coast Conference standings.

Leggett turned a 14-6 Duke lead into a decisive 21-6 margin when he bolted around left end and outraced the Clemson defenders midway through the third quarter.

Duke is undefeated in four league games.

Illini Tom Thumb

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — John Easterbrook, Illinois' Tom Thumb quarterback, combined with giant end Ed O'Bradovich for a first quarter touchdown that keyed a 16-0 victory over Penn State Saturday.

All of the Illini's scoring was in the first quarter as they took advantage of a strong wind that faced Penn State's punter Charles Raisig.

Undefeated Teams Roll To Victory

Led by Iowa's top-ranked Hawkeyes — who almost didn't make it — all the major undefeated college football teams in the country rolled to victory Saturday as the second half of the season got underway.

Iowa, No. 1 team in the current Associated Press poll, downed 10th-ranked Purdue 21-14, with the Boilermakers threatening as the clock ran out.

Syracuse, Navy, Missouri, Minnesota and Baylor, rated Nos. 3 through 7 in the AP rankings, permitted their opponents a total of just eight points.

Bellino Rambles

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Halfback Joe Bellino, Navy's high-stepping All-America candidate, scored two touchdowns Saturday as the unbeaten-untied Middies coasted to a 27-0 victory over Pennsylvania before 26,123.

The running of Bellino and the passing of quarterback Hal Spooner featured the sixth straight victory of the season for the nation's fourth-ranked football team.

Navy took a 7-0 lead late in the first period on a 10-play, 61-yard march capped by Bellino's offense and the Bruins went on to defeat Texas A&M 14-0 Saturday.

Following this key play, Ronnie Goodwin scored Baylor's first touchdown on a three-yard sprint around end. Larry Corley kicked the extra point. Baylor made it 14-0 in the third quarter on a pass interception and a 36-yard touchdown run by fullback Robert Starr.

Ole Miss By 3

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Allen Green kicked a 39-yard field goal in the final play of the game Saturday night to give unbeaten Mississippi a 10-7 victory over Arkansas before 40,000 fans.

When the final play started there were only three seconds to go. Green calmly booted the field goal that gave Mississippi, the No. 2 team in the Associated Press poll, its sixth straight triumph as time ran out.

Tigers Stifle Cyclone

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — The Missouri Tigers spiced a powerful and methodical ground attack

champion which has been unimpressive in piling up four victories, clobbered West Virginia, 45-0. Navy shut out Penn 27-0; Missouri crushed Iowa State 34-8; Minnesota blanked Michigan, 10-0; and Baylor whitewashed Texas A&M, 14-0.

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WSU Shows Versatility In Slaughter

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Unleashing backs Keith Lincoln, Hugh Campbell and Jim Boylan in a versatile football ground attack, Washington State powered past College of Pacific 51-12 here Saturday.

Boylan scored twice and Campbell and Lincoln once each as the Cougars ran up their highest total since 1942.

And in the closing minutes when it appeared COP might score its third touchdown, Harold Haddock picked off a pass thrown by COP's Bob Gattiss and ran 91 yards for the Cougars' seventh touchdown. Just a short time earlier Campbell had grabbed off a Gattiss pass and gone 32 yards for a score.
