

Hawkeyes Edge Purdue, Bid For Title

Iowa's first-ranked Hawkeyes remained undefeated Saturday by beating the determined Purdue Boilermakers 21-14.

In other Big Ten games, Ohio State whipped Wisconsin 34-7, and Minnesota blanked Michigan 10-0. Northwestern's Wildcats handed Notre Dame a 7-6 defeat.

Iowa Sputters, Wins
IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Iowa's passing attack sputtered but an 84-yard scoring run with a Purdue fumble by reserve center Dayton Perry paved the way to a 21-14 victory over the Boilermakers Saturday.

The homecoming triumph was the fifth straight for the Hawkeyes, ranked first in this week's Associated Press national football poll.

Purdue, rated 10th, almost overtook Iowa after trailing by three touchdowns midway in the third period.

Badgers Bewitched
COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Quarterback Tom Matte bewitched the Badgers with his running, passing and ball handling wizardry Saturday as Ohio State defeated Wisconsin's Big Ten champions 34-7.

A homecoming crowd of 83,246, fifth largest in Buckeye history, watched the Cleveland senior put on one of his greatest shows. He carried 17 times for 108 yards, completed 5 of 7 passes for 2 touchdowns and punted 5 times for a 37-yard average.

Gophers 'Amazing'
ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Sixth-ranked Minnesota smashed down fumbling Michigan Saturday 10-0, second-string fullback Jim Rogers accounting for every point in the amazing Gophers' fifth straight victory.

This is the Minnesota team the experts picked to finish near the bottom of the Big Ten heap, but five straight triumphs have given the Gophers their longest winning streak since 1941.

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—Northwestern scored in the first quarter and blew several other scoring opportunities Saturday, but squeaked out a 7-6 victory over a Notre Dame football team that

scored on a one-yard plunge in the second period, kicked the extra point, then booted a 22-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter.

A record crowd of 55,682 and a national television audience saw a Notre Dame bid late in the third quarter fall short.

Husky Pups Shade OSC Rooks, 7-6

CORVALLIS (AP)—The Washington Frosh shaded the Oregon State Rooks, 7-6, here Friday with an extra-point place-kick by Jim Mancuso from Tacoma the deciding margin.

It came after Mancuso had scored the game's first touchdown, on a 4-yard pass from quarterback Dennis Tyler, a former Pendleton High School star, in the third period.

Washington drove 59 yards in 17 plays for the score, the biggest gainer being a 20-yard pass from Tyler to Mancuso.

The Rooks, who had only 21 men in uniform, got the matching touchdown with four minutes left in the game but failed in a victory bid on a try for a two-point conversion.

Two passes by lefthanded tailback Rick Shields put Oregon State on the scoreboard. The first play, to wingback Leonard Whittle, gained 62 yards. Shields followed this with a 21-yarder into the end zone to end Herb Washburn of Portland.

Washington stopped Shields cold on an off-tackle try for the two-point.

Cleveland 10-Point Favorite To Whip Philadelphia Eagles

The Cleveland Browns, bidding for their once familiar role as kings of the National Football League, are 10-point favorites to beat the Philadelphia Eagles today and strengthen their hold on first place in the NFL's eastern division.

The Browns' chief rivals for the spot, the New York Giants, are idle in a six-game program which is not expected to do much shaking up of the standings.

The Baltimore Colts and Chicago Bears, tied for the western division lead with 3-1 records, are heavily favored to win their fourth game of the campaign.

The Colts, behind quarterback Johnny Unitas, are a 14-point choice over the Detroit Lions, who have shown a conspicuous absence of scoring punch. The Bears are figured to be a touchdown better than the Los Angeles Rams, who are working on a losing streak.

Grosz Tabbed By Casanova

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Oregon Coach Len Casanova termed his quarterback Dave Grosz "the most valuable man on the field today" after the Ducks walloped winless California 20-0 Saturday.

Although newsmen covering the game voted Cleveland Jones, 5-3, 148-pound halfback the outstanding back, and sophomore tackle Steve Barnett the best lineman, Casanova singled out Grosz.

"He does everything well — runs, passes, blocks and kicks," the coach said. "He called a fine game and his blocking was especially good."

Casanova rejoined his Oregon club only Saturday morning. His wife died last Sunday night, and he turned the job of preparing for Saturday's game over to assistants Jack Roach and Jerry Frei.

The Green Bay Packers are favored by nine points over the San Francisco 49ers at Milwaukee; the St. Louis Cardinals are 10 over the Dallas Cowboys; and the Pittsburgh Steelers are 3 1/2 over the Redskins at Washington.

Bid Refusal Miffs NFL Franchisers

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—The owners of Houston's new National League baseball franchise, miffed by a refusal of an offer of \$382,500 for the city's American Association club, said today that if their offer is not accepted within 10 days they'll simply wait and draft the territory.

George Kirksey, executive secretary of the Houston Sports Association, made the offer to Buffalo president William Hopkins Friday. Hopkins refused the offer and said the asking price for the club was \$600,000.

"We made this offer (to buy the Buffs) despite advice of our friends in baseball," Kirksey said. "One National League owner told us to trim our offer in half and we would be closer to a more realistic figure."

"The Houston American Association team is worthless as a business investment," he added.

Kirksey said his group would like to operate the American Association franchise in 1961—but if necessary will purchase another AAA club and then draft the Houston territory in October, 1961, under existing baseball rules.

He called the offer "the most generous ever made for a defunct minor league club in the history of baseball" and pointed out it was more than three and a half times the amount paid for the club when it was purchased from the St. Louis Cardinals in 1958.

He also said it was the largest offer made for a minor league club of any kind during the past decade.

Using pure power the Eagles counted the winning touchdown when halfback Mike Palm blistered off tackle into the end zone with 4:00 minutes left in the game.

The Hornets, who battled the Eagles on even terms for the major part of the Little Rogue League action, took the lead in

the fourth stanza when they received on their own 35 and went the distance.

A 45 yard pass from quarterback Gary Beber to end Bob Chapman, moved the Hornets to the Eagle three with 3:00 gone in the fourth. Halfback Larry Lugo, the standout half-carrier for the Hornets, picked up a big two and Beber sneaked over from the one with the six-pointer. Chuck Blofsky ran the conversion point.

Disgruntled coach Weber, in summing up the test, said, "It was a tough ball game and our kids went all out. They always play their best in the tough ones. We don't have to be ashamed because this one was real tough. They put forth a real team effort but it just wasn't enough."

He added, "Passing is our game and I think we have a growl coming in so far as pass interference is concerned. Many times on the long pass our ends, Cal Casebier and Chapman, were victims of a shove. Even when we did connect our receivers had three or four Eagles hanging on. There could have been flags on many of these."

Weber has, many times, referred to ends Casebier and Chapman as probably two of the most capable in the area.

The next Henley chance for revenge comes Friday when they return to the valley for a tilt with the Rogue River Chiefs. Their season finale will be played against the Mustangs at Malin.

The Houston Oilers will try to cement their hold on the American Football League's Eastern Division lead today in their game with the hard-pressing Titans in New York.

The game in New York prom-

ises to produce an interesting battle between two of the new circuit's most effective throwers, Al Dorow of the Titans and George Blanda of the Oilers.

Blanda got the better of Dorow in a preseason skirmish, won by Houston 30-14, and in a 27-21 regular season meeting.

In league play, Dorow has completed 41 of 93 passes, eight for touchdowns, for the fourth best percentage in the circuit. Blanda in playing one less game than his Titan rival, has hit on 42 of 90 passes, five for touchdowns. Dorow, however, is also among the top runners in the league.

The Titans are rated as slight favorites. Houston has a 4-1 record and New York is 4-2.

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Houk Ties Can To Lopat; Detroit Post Considered

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ed Lopat, released as coach of the New York Yankees, today made the Detroit Tigers' managerial vacancy his No. 1 job-hunting objective.

Lopat, a key pitcher in the Yankees' five consecutive world championships from 1949 through 1953, was released Friday in a move that confirmed new manager Ralph Houk's intention of running the pitching staff himself.

The 42-year-old Lopat, who once also was considered a possible successor to Casey Stengel, said

he was "a little surprised" at his dismissal, but expressed no bitterness toward Houk or the Yankees.

"I enjoyed my years as a player and coach with the Yankees," he said at his home in Westwood, N.J. "There are no hard feelings. In baseball you've got to expect these things to happen."
