Malin Mustangs Edge SHA, 18-12

Coach Bob Graham's Malin Mustangs roared back from a 12-6 halftime deficit to sweat down the Sacred Heart Trojans by a score of 18-12 Friday night at Gem Stadium.

The win was the second straight for the Mustangs and the fourth

defeat in six starts for coach Marv Delplanché's academy crew, which now occupies the cellar in the County B League standings. Both squads got off to a slow start and fought to a scoreless deadlock in the first quarter. But the Trojan offensive unit quickly warmed up and launched a ground offense that kept the Malin 11 puzzled until late in the second period.

Trojan Shan Britton started off the second quarter with a beautiful 50-yard run down the sidelines, only to have the play called back for a holding penalty. He came charging back, however, with a 55-yard run to set up the touchdown play when Keith Murray swept seven yards around the Malin end.

Malin countered with a TD when rugged quarterback Larry Rick grabbed the SHA kickoff and sped downfield 60 yards to the 15. In two plays Lee Bailey plunged over to break the ice for the Mustangs, and the battle was on.

Sacred Heart roared right back when Murray crossed into the end zone, this time on a 56-yard pass and run from teammate Mike Holland, giving the Trojans a 12-6 halftime edge.

Malin came back after the half-time intermission and split the game wide open as Bob Steyskal

recovered a blocked SHA punt and dashed off another 35 yards for the score. Marching downfield, Mustangs Bailey carried the ball all the way to the eight line in the fourth frame, and Malin wrapped up the game when Rick charged into the end zone to make it 18-12.

Sacred Heart rallied in the closing minutes of drives by Bill Jackson and Jerry DeNault who teamed up to penetrate deep into Mustang territory.

Rick broke up the drive on the 25 in the closing seconds when he intercepted Jackson's pass.

The Malin crew won the battle in the air as well as on the ground. Behind their big yardage

gainer, Bailey with 93 yards to his credit, they picked up 208 total yards rushing to 187 for the Trojans. SHA's top man was Jackson with 86. In the air, Malin attempted nine, completed four and had one intercepted for a total of 48 yards passing. Sacred Heart, on the other hand, completed one and had one intercepted for a 26-yard total in the air department.

"I'll have to admit we were puzzled by their offense the first half and we had a tough time diagnosing it. But when we finally did we were all right," remarked happy Mustang coach Bob Graham after the game.

Wherever you see Don Kasso, you'll usually see Terry Baker, also—either on or off the football field. They've become close friends, room together on all trips and in general hit it off more like pals than rivals for the No. 1 tailback spot on the OSC football team. Together, they form the best one-two tailback punch Oregon State has had in a long time.

Baker is rolling along at a much faster clip than did Joe Francis in his sophomore year. After four games, the ex-Jefferson of Portland star had piled up 427 yards in total offense. Francis, as a sophomore in 1955, gained 633 yards for the full season—nine games.

The state of Iowa hasn't seen the last of Oregon State football—not by a long shot. In 1962, for example, OSC opens against Iowa State at Corvallis, and the following week the Beavers journey back to Iowa City to take on the Hawkeyes of Iowa. The Beavers also have Iowa scheduled in 1963 and 1966.

Those who have watched sophomore Steve Pauli work out in the Coliseum (on his own) are convinced the ex-Beaverton all-star will eventually become one of Oregon State's standout basketball players—perhaps even as soon as this winter. Second Half Effort Pays Off 21-0 For Pels

SPRINGFIELD (Special)—A Kent Hunsaker broke his hand. A swarm of Springfield High grads in action against Grants Pass, Allen directed his mates to the 7-0 lead with 6:07 left in the third.

Allen, who moved into the QB down by the last Springfield defender as the halftime gun sound, booted the conversion to give KU a 7-0 lead with 6:07 left in the third.

Allen set up the next Pel count when he hit end Wayne Dennis with a 30-yard pass to the middle. McClure churned up the middle on successive three and five-yard gains for the score with 7:40 left in the fourth stanza.

On the ensuing Pel kickoff the Springfielders came entirely unstrung and quarterback Tom Finucane fell in his own end zone on a roll-out he was finally pulled

from the five for the six points. Out front 15-0, the Pels put the final trimmings on just six plays later. Haliback Dave Stippich skittered 21 yards on the free-kick runback, then plunged into paydirt on runs of four, two and one yards after Allen had connected on three quick aerials to end Allen Phillips, good for 39 yards.

From here on the second string offense took over and held the Miller in a series of plays that featured primarily penalty exchanges. The game ended with Springfield on the Pel 22.

Some of the sweet taste of the Pelicans' second 1960 victory was taken away when it was learned that Dennis, when he nailed the 30-yard pass, had re-broken his hand. The first injury had occurred in a practice prior to the opening game of the season. Friday night's bad break will sideline him for possibly another two months.

The Pelican offense carved out a total of 207 yards on the ground plus the 78 in the air. The KU defense allowed the Millers only 48 on the sod and a miserly 36 via the airlines.

Miller QB Finucane tried 18 tosses and hit on five. Junior haliback Don Manilla was the leading Miller ground-gainer with a total of 39 yards.

Pelicans Lewis and Stippich garnered gains of 29 and 22 yards respectively.

Coaches Bob Williams, Al Keck and Jack Petersen were noticeably enthused over the Pel showing against the struggling Millers, praising both the play of the line and backfield.

The next stop for the KU club is their own homecoming—next Friday when they play host to the Central Point Crater Comets here in the final Southern Oregon Conference game of the season.

Miners Overpower Panthers, 47-13

YREKA (Special)—The Yreka Miners, paced by speedy halfbacks Dan (Butch) McCarthy and John Ellis, buried the invading Chilquino Panthers under a 33-point second quarter avalanche and went on to defeat the out-manned Oregonians 47-13 here Friday night.

McCarthy scored four first half touchdowns while Ellis scored one on a 66-yard punt return and picked up 86 yards on six carries

when Norman Jackson threw an incomplete pass on fourth down. McCarthy scored on a four-yard end run. The key play of the drive was a 45-yard pass in the second quarter. Taking from Ellis to end Jackson Lawe, over on their own 13, the Miners

Chilquino took to the air to try to get back in the ball game and their passes backfired. McCarthy intercepted Mike Ochoa's jump pass on the Panther 35 and went all the way for a TD. He repeated the trick moments later and was hauled down on the 11.

McCarthy finally put that one over from the two. That made the score 27-7 with 7:37 to go in the half. The Miners weren't through.

Ellis and McCarthy dropped back to receive Sylvan Crume's punt. They crossed on the Miner 34-yard line and that's the last anyone saw of Ellis as he was spirited down the sideline by a host of blockers for a touchdown. McCarthy, not to be outdone, powered left tackle for six more points following another interception, this one by Lawe.

The Panthers hit the scoreboard as the first half gun sounded. Jackson and Nygren spearheaded a drive to the Yreka 10-yard line, from where Ochoa threw a bulseye to end Ed Case and the half ended with the Panthers on the short end of a 40-6 score.

Gordon Kuist's Panthers came clanking back in the second half. They allowed one more TD and then slammed the door. Miner quarterback Dick Kinney lofted a pass to Lawe in the end zone and the California eleven had their final total of 47.

The Panthers then mounted a passing attack of their own. Jackson and Nygren collaborated on a 66-yard pass play which took the Panthers deep into enemy territory. The Miners held but Chilquino continued to apply pressure. In the last four minutes of the ball game, Jackson engineered a 46-yard TD drive. He turned in a nice run and completed three passes in the drive, the final one going nine yards to Crume in the end zone. Ochoa threw to Case for the conversion and that wrapped up the scoring—47-13.

Chilquino returns to County B League competition next weekend against Bonanza while Yreka opens its Siskiyou County League season by hosting Weed. Weed won an earlier practice game this year 14-12 and Bice said his charges hope for revenge.

The Miners marched 60 yards in eight plays to score after receiving the kickoff. John Meamere, a hefty 180-pound fullback, plunged the final yard to pay dirt. Center Bob Laustalot booted the first of five successful punts to make the score 7-0.

The Panthers threatened after Benny Nygren recovered McCarthy's fumble on the Miner 26-yard line. The rally died, however,

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'Surprises' Cloud A-1 Issue; Benson Upsets Madison, 6-0

Several surprise results Friday night left in deeper doubt the outcome of Oregon class A-1 high school district football races.

Benson, the No. 8 team in the Associated Press poll, upset Madison, No. 2, which had been in first place in the Portland high school league, 6-0.

Fifth-ranked Jefferson rebounded from a defeat by Grant last week by downing Lincoln, 19-6. Grant, No. 9, beat Franklin, 27-14.

The results left Benson atop the league standings with a 6-0 record. Madison and Jefferson tied for second at 6-1-0 and Grant third with 5-2-0. The Portland schools have two more rounds of play, which goes home with a 47-6 defeat. Grant, Benson, No. 10 and tied Marshallfield, No. 3, 6-0, and South with Medford for first place in the Eugene, No. 7, walloped sixth-rated North Bend, 20-0, in Mid-

South. North Salem beat Albany, 17-7. Bend now is alone in first place 4-1-0.

Eugene, with a 4-0-0 league mark, took over first place with North Bend, Marshallfield and Roseburg, each with one loss, still in contention.

David Douglas, No. 4 in the poll, and unranked Central Catholic continued in a tie for leadership of the Portland Metropolitan League with 6-1-0 records. David Douglas beat Sunset of Beaverton, 28-12, and Central Catholic turned back Centennial of Gresham, 19-0.

Right behind the leaders is Milwaukie, 5-1-1, after a 41-0 rout of Gresham.
