Building Shows Gain

Building in the Pacific Northwest showed another gain in September to give the area a total dollar volume increase of 11 per cent over the same period in 1959 and dwelling dollar volume picked up two per cent over August of this year according to the statistical department of Equitable Savings and Loan Association.

Total dollar volume in the area's 65 key cities was \$38,666,952 during the past month as compared with \$34,848,145 in September, 1959. In the metropolitan markets Portland reported the largest percentage gain with a 65 per cent increase over last year. Tacoma has a six per cent gain for the same period and Spokane, while increasing 32 per cent over August, still trails last year by 12 per cent.

Dollar volume in the state of Washington accounted for over half the total of the entire Pacific Northwest. During September Washington's volume was \$21,756,534. Oregon had a total of \$9,511,152. British Columbia reported \$5,181,742 and Idaho recorded \$2,217,524 in total building volume.

Residential building presented somewhat of a different picture. All states in the Pacific Northwest are down compared to August of this year with the exception of Oregon, yet the decreases per state are so small that Oregon's 22 per cent gain in residential building was able to sustain a two per cent increase for the entire area over the previous month. Dwelling dollar volume for September in the 65 key cities was \$9,158,992 as compared to \$8,997,706 in August. Dwelling permits totaled 574 during the past month, as compared with 606 in the previous month.

Tractor-Loader Given Approval

DUNSMUIR — The city council approved purchase of a Michigan tractor-loader which is to be used for snow removal and other street work at the council meeting Wednesday night.

The purchase price including sales tax came to \$13,739.20 and councilmen approved a cash transaction which involved use of \$6,000 transferred from the traffic safety fund and \$8,163.76 overage after redemption of general improvement bonds. Councilman George Wendell, who presided as mayor in the absence of Mayor David McClintock, explained that the balance of \$404.50 available would be used to purchase a snow plow blade and snow chains.

The councilmen saw the machine demonstrated by a San Carlos firm on Friday morning.

City Attorney Told To Amend Dog Ordinance

DUNSMUIR — City Attorney Howard Jones was instructed by the city council at the Wednesday night meeting to amend the city's dog ordinance using the Mount Shasta dog ordinance as a model.

He was asked to have the final draft of the amended ordinance in the hands of the councilmen in advance of the next meeting to give them an opportunity to study it prior to its adoption.

Mount Shasta currently has a dog ordinance prohibiting dogs running at large but Jones in quoting it to the council said he had heard it was not being enforced.

The amendments to be adopted in Dunsmuir's ordinance are provisions that dogs at large are to be prohibited and violations be backed by penalties. Jones' suggestion that the wording "willfully or negligently" be included in the owner's responsibility clause and that the ordinance specify that dogs be tied or securely enclosed was approved.

Death Probes Being Made

YREKA—Coroner A. B. Cottar is conducting investigations into the death of Alfred Amos Albers, 36, Fort Jones, and John William Jerry both who died as a result of an auto accident near Fort Jones on October 12.

Investigation was also conducted into the death of Dwight Eugene Moody, 29, Arcata, who was killed when a deep trench caved in causing fatal injuries.

Another accidental death was investigated at McKinney Creek where 63-year-old Ernest C. Berry of Medford, Oregon, was involved in a logging accident and died en route to the Siskiyou County Hospital.

Jeep Posse Chief Named

YREKA — S. A. "Penn" Messner, Montague, was named commander of the Montague Jeep Unit of the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Jeep Posse at a meeting held Wednesday evening, October 19, at the sheriff's office.

The unit will assist the sheriff's office in search and rescue work, and also supplement civil defense operations. Plans were formulated for a training program and maneuvers. Commander Messner said the Montague Jeep Unit will wear orange uniforms in rescue work and while working in the forest, the color being selected for easy identification. The standard uniform will be khaki colored.

Lynn Roberts, director of civil defense in the Siskiyou area, was present at the Wednesday night meeting, and explained to the group what surplus properties would be available for their use.

It was also announced that the Sheriff's Posse Auxiliary would meet in the sheriff's office on Monday, October 24, at 7:30 p.m. Commander Harry Scammell of Yreka said this group will familiarize itself with communication procedures and the operation of vehicular emergency equipment. Anyone who is interested in joining is invited to attend.
