

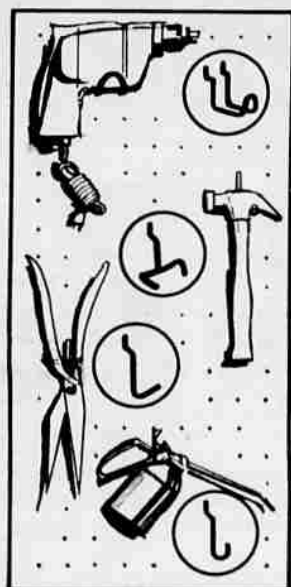

Lumberjack Cookies

TO PREPARE: 15 MIN.

TO BAKE: ABOUT 10 MIN.

(allow time for chilling dough)

2 cups sifted flour	1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/2 teaspoon baking soda	1/2 cup butter
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon	1/2 cup dark molasses
	1 egg, well beaten

1. Sift the first five ingredients together; set aside.
2. Cream butter until softened. Add sugar gradually, creaming until fluffy after each addition. Gradually blend in molasses. Add egg in thirds, beating well after each addition.
3. Blending well after each addition, add the dry ingredients in fourths to creamed mixture. Chill dough thoroughly.
4. Form chilled dough into balls, using about 2 teaspoons of dough for each. Roll in sugar to coat and transfer to greased cookie sheets.
5. Bake at 350°F about 10 min. Remove to cooling racks.
