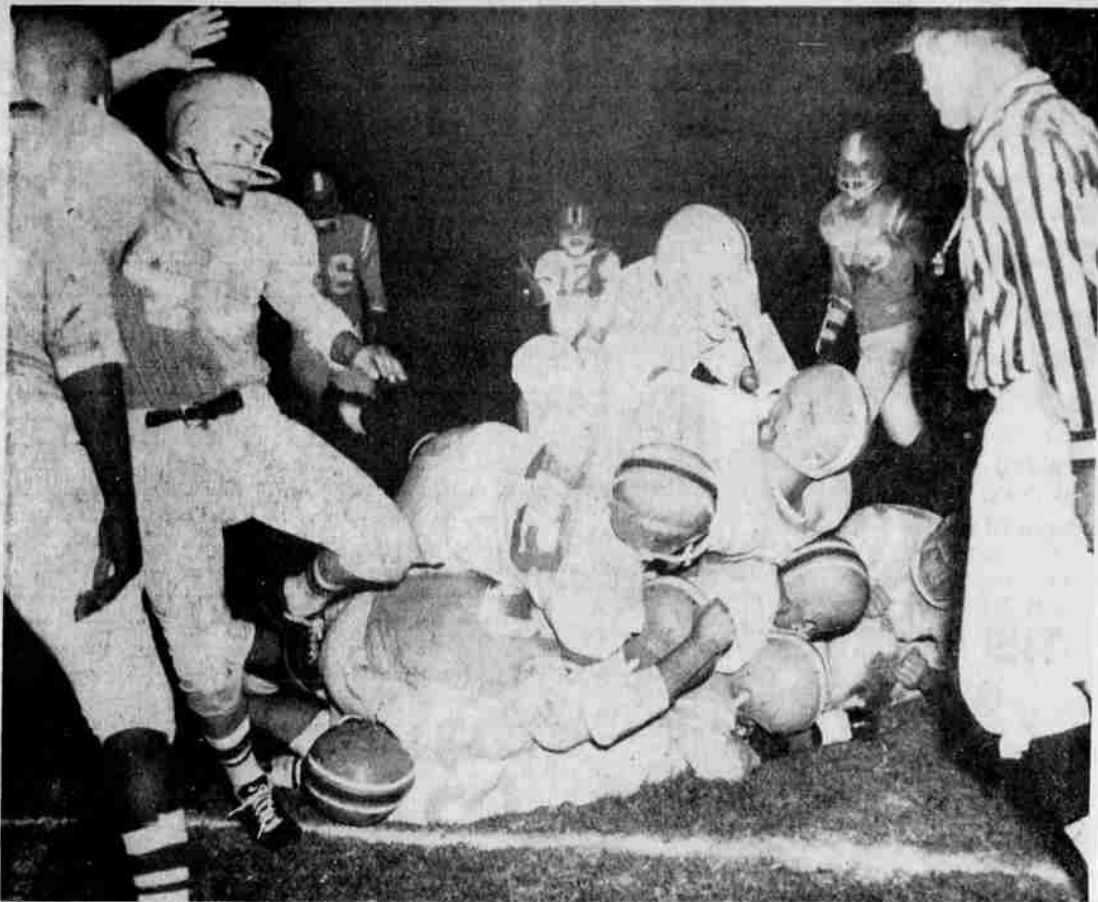


A Good Spot For Rubber Bones

Bevo Letup The Reason For Defeat

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State thought it had clinched a victory over Washington — and that was one of the reasons the Staters lost, coach Tommy Prothro said here Sunday.

"We played a fine football team. I think we ran out of gas," Prothro said of Oregon State's 30-29 loss Saturday to Washington's Rose Bowl champions.

"The boys had a good lead and got tired and just sort of felt like it would be all right and let up a little and couldn't come back when they had to."

"Once you let up it's hard to come back to the pitch you were at," Prothro said.

Oregon State scored the first touchdown and then led all the way to the game's final minutes. Then Washington burst over for a touchdown that tied the score 20-20, and halfback George Fleming kicked the extra point that won it for the Huskies.

"I was bitterly disappointed," Prothro said.

The victory gave Washington a 5-1 record. Oregon State now is 4-2, and next Saturday meets winless California here.

"When you have a game like that you can look at 20 or 30 plays that could have been turning points," Prothro said.

Long runs up the middle hurt the Staters, Prothro said. One was a 38-yard dash for a touchdown by halfback Fleming. Charlie Mitchell twisted his way 36 yards for another score.

Sophomore Terry Baker started for the Staters at quarterback in place of the injured Don Kasso and for the second week in a row set an Oregon State yardage record.

The southpaw scored two touchdowns, completed 16 of 25 passes for 215 yards and picked up 87 more yards running.

"He played the greatest game at tailback for us that I've ever seen a tailback play," Prothro said.

"It was the toughest game for us to lose," he said, but added that Oregon State's toughest game in losing to Iowa, last week ranked the No. 1 team in the nation.

Oregon State has played six games this season — and all six have been on the road. That has taken a lot out of the team, he said, and added: "Monday's work-out will be a light one."

The Oregon State-Washington game was played before 36,833 persons in Multnomah Stadium in Portland. That was just 52 short of the stadium attendance record set at a game between Oregon State and Southern California in 1957.

The most seriously injured Oregon State player was halfback Art Gilmore. He suffered a twisted knee late in the game, and Prothro said "he certainly is out for Saturday."

Ducks Prep For Battle With Husky

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon turns today from a record performance against California to the task of preparing for a Saturday football game with powerful Washington.

"Washington is a real well-rounded club," Oregon coach Len Casanova said Sunday after his team returned from Berkeley and a 20-0 triumph over California.

"They have depth, experience and a fine defensive team. They'll be the toughest we've met so far this season," Washington Saturday edged Oregon State 30-29.

Washington and Oregon now have identical 5-1 season records — the best of any major college teams on the coast. Last season, Oregon lost only 13-12 to a Washington squad that later went on to win in the Rose Bowl.

Things are different now, though, Casanova said. "We have a green bunch of kids this year. There are only three starters from last year."

One of those starters, quarterback Dave Grosz, was a key to Oregon's victory Saturday, and of him Casanova said:

"The most valuable man on the field. He does everything well, runs, passes, blocks and kicks. He is a definite candidate for All-America."

Oregon Saturday rolled up 502 yards for the greatest offensive performance in the school's history. The previous high was 498 against Idaho last year.

Grosz engineered all three Oregon touchdowns. He threw one touchdown pass of eight yards to halfback Cleveland Jones. Then the 5-3 Jones threw one, again for eight yards, to Jerry Tarr. Oregon's other score came on a one-yard plunge by reserve Jim Josephson.

Jones also did well running, picking up 87 yards on 16 carries. His running mate at halfback, Dave Grayson, did even better — 121 yards on 15 tries.

There were two things that Casanova said he was displeased about. "We've been fumbling too much." Oregon lost the ball five times on bobbles, Casanova added. "I don't know what you can do about that."

The other thing, he said, was the number of injuries suffered by Oregon players. "We're hurting from a physical standpoint."

End Kent Petersen has suffered a bone chip in his ankle, Casanova said, and tackles Ron Anderson and Riley Mattson suffered injuries that might keep them out of the Washington game.

The California game drew a crowd of 36,000. It was California's fourth defeat in five games. In the other game, the Bears tied Washington State.

Green Bay, Chicago Share Western Lead; Houston, Denver Pace American Elevens

Baltimore, 49ers Crushed; LA Rams, Bears In Deadlock

A month ago who would have imagined:

That the Baltimore Colts would be in third place with two losses in the National Football League's Western Conference while the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Bears would be tied for the lead.

That the Cleveland Browns would rest in third place in the Eastern Conference after opening the season with a 41-24 thumping of the Philadelphia Eagles.

Yet this is the story today after the Colts Sunday went down to their second loss, 30-17, to the Detroit Lions, winless in three previous starts.

The Packers, who beat the Colts two weeks ago, crushed San Francisco 41-14, while the Bears were held to a 24-14 tie by Los Angeles.

The deadlock broke a 12-game losing streak for the Rams; Philadelphia's Bobby Walston kicked a field goal in the final 15 seconds to upset Cleveland 31-29 and avenge that opening day trouncing. The victory moved the Eagles (4-1) into the second place in the East, behind idle New York, which has three wins and a tie.

Elsewhere, St. Louis handed Dallas its fifth loss in as many games, 12-10, while Washington and Pittsburgh played to a 27-27 tie.

Lions 30, Colts 17

The second of Jim Martin's three field goals — a 51-yarder that hit the crossbar and bounced over — broke a 17-17 tie for the Lions after Baltimore quarterback Johnny Unitas had thrown scoring

passes to Ray Berry and Jim Mutscheller. His TD toss per game streak went to 42 regular season games.

However, Dick (Night Train) Lane wrapped things up for Detroit when he intercepted a Unitas pass and ran 80 yards for a touchdown.

Packers 41, 49ers 14

The Packers unlimbered a good passing attack to go with the running of Paul Hornung and Jim Taylor. Quarterback Lamar McHan completed 11 of 24 for 183 of their 206 passing yards, while Hornung and Taylor combined for 170 of 249 rushing. Hornung also scored twice and kicked two field goals and five extra points. Y. A. Little passed for both 49er scores.

Bears, Rams Tied

Chicago quarterback Zeke Bratkowski turned from goat to hero in a few moments when he tossed a 29-yard scoring pass to Angelo Coia for the tie after Ed Meador had intercepted one of his tosses and ran 25 yards to give the Rams a 24-17 lead. Bratkowski also hit Coia with a 15-yard TD toss and Willie Dewell with a 14-yarder.

Eagles 31, Browns 29

Walston's 38-yard field goal was set up by a pass interference call and climaxed a brilliant second half offensive show by the Eagles. Norm Van Brocklin rattled the Browns defenses with passes, throwing 57 yards to Tommy McDonald and 8 to Bill Barnes for scores. He hit Walston with a 49-yarder for a TD the first time Philadelphia had the ball. Jimmy Brown ran 71 yards for a Cleveland touchdown and gained 167 yards over all. But the Eagles held halfback Bobby Mitchell to 35 in 14 tries.

SL 12, Cowboys 10

Gerry Perry's 18-yard field goal in the last 43 seconds after L. G. Dupre fumbled on the Dallas 39 beat the Cowboys. Dupre's TD had put them ahead 10-9 earlier in the period.

Steelers, Skins Draw

The Redskins also needed a last minute field goal — 43 yards by Bob Khayat — to tie the Pittsburgh, Bert Rechichar's 44-yard effort with 12 seconds to go bounced off the cross bar after the Steelers had been penalized five yards for delay of the game.

KU-Crater Tickets Ready

Klamath Union High School alumni may purchase reserved seat tickets to the Pelican Homecoming at the Chamber of Commerce now, it was reported this morning by Jim Johnson, KU athletic director.

Thursday night at the usual site on Oregon Avenue the Pels will be feted at the big homecoming bonfire and rally during which the homecoming queen will be announced. Friday afternoon the KUHS students will gather on Modoc Field for a pep rally prior to a parade in downtown KF.

Castoff Quarterback Hits New Highs, Sparks Oilers

Veteran George Blanda, a 32-year-old castoff with a decade of pro experience, is powering the Houston Oilers to the Eastern Division title in the American Football League while establishing a batch of impressive individual marks.

The former Chicago Bears' quarterback tossed four touchdown passes, scored once on a short plunge and kicked six conversions as the Oilers blasted New York 42-28 Sunday for a 5-1 record and a game and a half edge over the Titans in the Eastern race.

With eight games to go in the AFL's first season, Blanda has a solid hold on the scoring lead with 69 points on 4 touchdowns, 8 field goals and 21 consecutive PATs. He also has pitched 11 scoring aeriels to tie for the top spot in that department.

Blanda threw touchdown tosses of 8, 11 and 12 yards to Bill Groman and flipped a four-yarder to Charlie Hennigan in an aerial donnybrook before an estimated 21,000 fans, who saw New York quarterback Al Dorow and Dick Jamieson seriously injured.

Dorow, who suffered chest injuries in the first period, tore a

ligament in his right knee when he was hurt again in the final period and likely is lost for the remainder of the season. Jamieson will be sidelined indefinitely with a slight shoulder separation.

Meanwhile, the Western Division-leading Denver Broncos came from behind and defeated the Boston Patriots 31-24 to take a one-game lead over idle Los Angeles. The Buffalo Bills overwhelmed the Oakland Raiders 38-9 in the other scheduled game.

Oilers 42, Titans 28

The Titans took an early lead when Dorow hit Art Powell with a five-yard touchdown pass, but Ken Hall ran the kickoff back 104 yards to tie and Blanda took over in the second period with a pair of scoring strikes to Groman. Blanda completed 18 of 34 passes for 287 yards in a two-team passing barrage that saw the Titans attempt 44.

Denver 31, Boston 24

Trailing 24-0 in the third period, the Broncos (4-2) pulled ahead with 8:13 to play when Lionel Taylor took an eight-yard touchdown pass from Frank Tripucka. Tripucka also connected with a 21-yard TD toss to Al Carmichael and a 19-yard scoring flip to Bill Jessup within a two-minute span during the comeback. But Sonzin passed for three Patriot (2-4) touchdowns.

Bufs 38, Raiders 9

Johnny Green tossed 23, 32 and 38-yard scoring passes to Wray Carlton as the Bills (2-4) shocked the Raiders (3-4). The lone Oakland touchdown came on Jetstream Smith's one-yard plunge.

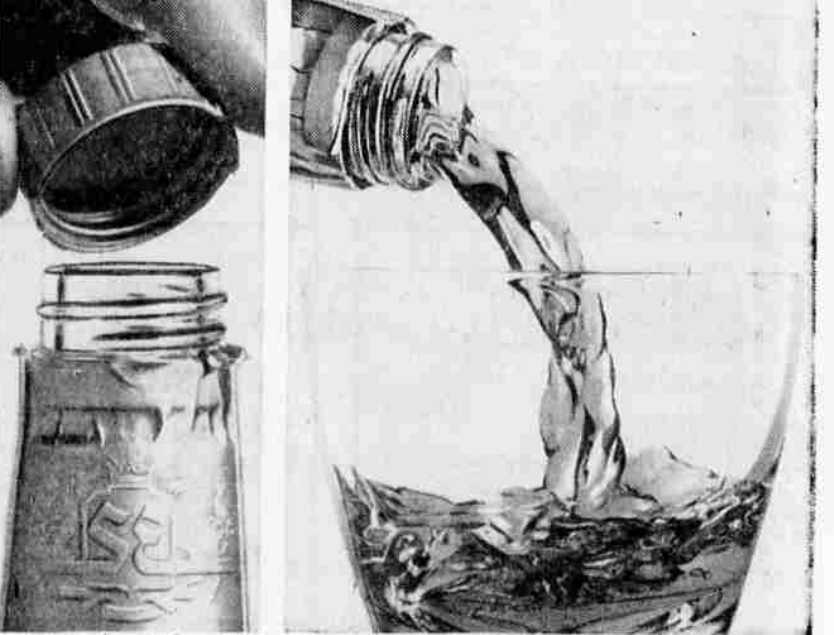
