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Leaders Get Squeamish

Hawkeyes, 'Ole Miss' Find Going Rough; More Coming

Uneasy is the head that wears the crown and if Iowa and Mississippi weren't squeamish today as they surveyed the college football scene from the throne they have short memories.

Both the powerful Hawkeyes, No. 1 in the current Associated Press poll, and Ole Miss, No. 2, figure things can't get any tougher after last Saturday's spine-chilling victories.

Iowa beat Purdue, 21-14, with third stringer Dayton Perry providing the winning margin by running 84 yards with an intercepted pass and the Boilermakers threatening to tie it as the clock ran out.

Mississippi eked out a 10-7 decision over Arkansas with Allen Green playing Frank Merriwell by kicking a disputed 39-yard field goal on the last play. In fact, he kicked it twice. The first time referee Thomas Bell called time and the play was run over. Green never had kicked a field goal before.

So now Iowa shows a 5-0 record and Mississippi 6-0 with trouble ahead for both.

Iowa has an unenviable task during the next three weeks. This week the Hawkeyes play Kansas (beaten only by Syracuse). The following week they play Minnesota (undefeated-untied) in the game that could decide the Big Ten title. The next week, they play Ohio State, beaten only by Purdue.

The Rebels have a date this week with defense-minded Louisiana State, which has given up just 24 points in five games, take a breather against Chattanooga, then face rampaging Tennessee.

which has given up just two touchdowns in its five victories. That one could decide the Southeastern Conference championship.

This was the second cliff-hanger in a row for Iowa. The previous week the Hawkeyes got past Wisconsin in the last 32 seconds.

Green's last-gasp field goal touched off a dispute. Arkansas coach Frank Broyles complained that the kick was wide. Almost 24 hours later, he apologized for criticizing referee Bell publicly, but still maintained the kick was wide.

If Iowa or Mississippi should falter, defending national champion Syracuse and Navy—which are waging their own private battle for Eastern honors—are waiting in the wings.

Oregon Tech needs only a victory over third-place Oregon College Saturday to win the Oregon Collegiate Conference football championship.

Oregon Tech, 3-0 in conference play, could end no less than second even with a loss.

Southern Oregon brought its record to 2-1 Saturday with an overwhelming 32-13 victory over Oregon College.

Doug Olsen, former North Eugene prep ace, completed 10 of 20 passes for 235 yards and two touchdowns for Southern Oregon. Portland State and Eastern Oregon, fought to a 6-6 tie at Portland.

Although outgained 362 to 86, Eastern three times stopped Portland inside the five.

End Dennis Bagnall's theft of a PSC pass gave his team a third period score. Portland State evened it in the final period.

OTT, in a non-conference game, whipped LaVerne of California 35-14 at Klamath Falls.

Giants Win One

TOKYO (AP)—The San Francisco Giants finally played a winning game today, beating the Japanese All-Stars 1-0 after having lost the first two starts on their 16-game Japan tour.

Syracuse, voted most likely to succeed itself in the pre-season AP poll, tumbled to third place after four unimpressive victories. But the Orange blasted West Virginia, 45-0. Saturday in their first really big display of power.

Navy, No. 4, blanked Penn. 27-0. Neither West Virginia nor Penn. were rated threats. This week Navy meets Notre Dame and Syracuse plays Pitt.

Missouri, No. 5, swamped Iowa State, 34-8, for its sixth victory and is smelling the sweet scent of the Big Eight title. Oklahoma has held it a dozen years, but the Sooners are a shell of their old selves.

Minnesota, No. 6, should have no great problem with Kansas State after beating Michigan, 10-0. Baylor, surprise power of the Southwest Conference, has a league game with Texas Christian. Baylor swept to its fifth triumph, a 14-0 decision over Texas A & M Saturday. TCU won't be easy.

Washington, eighth-ranked team in the country, plays Oregon which is fresh from a 20-0 shutout over California. Washington barely got by Oregon State, 30-29.

Ohio State, which hasn't abandoned hopes of winning the Big Ten title, has a date with once-beaten Michigan State. The Buckeyes, rated No. 9, clobbered Wisconsin Saturday, 34-7.

Once-tied Tennessee made a bid to crash the top 10 by crushing Chattanooga, 35-0. Utah State and New Mexico State with six victories each, along with Yale and Rutgers with five apiece, are the only other major unbeaten-untied teams.

Briton Nails Double Win In PGP Races

FT. ORD, Calif. (AP)—Stirling Moss, known as a colorful race driver and a hard hand on machinery, proved just the opposite in winning double victories in the two-hour, 200-mile 200,000 Pacific Grand Prix.

Moss, roaring down the straightaway at 120 miles an hour, pushed his temperamental Lotus MK XIX Monte Carlo quickly in front Sunday in each of the 100-mile runs on the 1.9-mile Laguna Seca course and 87.3 mph. In the second.

Moss sped one lap during the second heat in 1 minute 17.2 seconds, lapping one-tenth of a second off a course record he set Friday in qualifying on the nine-turn asphalt run.

Moss, won easily over his old adversary, Australian Jack Brabham, who drove a 2.5 liter Cooper Monaco. Brabham finished 16th in the first 100 miles after a blow-out. In the second heat he was 18th because of hydraulic trouble.

Augie Pabst of Milwaukee finished second in the second heat, 39 seconds behind in his power-luff American-built Scarab. Bill Krause of Long Beach was third in a Birdcage Maserati.

For the first 13 Olympics of record, the competition consisted of a single race of 200 yards. The first victor in 776 B.C. was Coroebus of Elis, a cook.

Linfield had a slight edge in rushing but Willamette held Linfield's ace passer, Bill Parrish, to four completions. The winners intercepted four passes.

Lewis and Clark, led by quarterback Royce McDaniell and halfback Gary Grill, edged College of Idaho, 21-14. McDaniell passed 30 yards to end Dick Miller for one touchdown and plunged one-yard to the winning 6-point. Grill opened the scoring with a 24-yard scamper.

Quarterback Bob Light, No. 2 among the nation's small college passers, pitched Pacific to its triumph over Whitman, completing 12 of 21 heaves for 160 yards. Robin Beck, Whitman's ace passer, almost matched him, hitting 11 of 21 tries for 143 yards.

Bob Wendel caught 9 of Light's passes for 96 yards. One went 8 yards for a touchdown.

Modern Field Goal Trend The Fault Of Lou The Toe

NEW YORK (UPI)—Don't lay the blame on Mame, boys. Go back 10 years and put it on a placid pachyderm named Lou Groza.

Groza there in 1950 the pro football guys were accustomed to running the ball, heaving it and then punting it out of bounds in the coffin corner.

But, thanks to Lou the Toe, now when you put "em anywhere in the vicinity of midfield some gent is going to step forward and boot it through the crossbars for a fat three-point field goal.

Take a look at the pro action Sunday: Gerry Perry footed one from 18 yards out with 43 seconds to play to give St. Louis a 12-10 win over Dallas.

Bobby Walston kicked one from the 38 with 10 seconds to play to award Philadelphia a 31-29 upset of the Cleveland Browns.

Bob Khatay booted it 44 yards in the last 44 seconds to provide Washington a 27-27 deadlock with Pittsburgh.

And Jim Martin put his brogan to the ball twice for 51- and 32-yard field goals which actually provided the winning points as Detroit upset the Baltimore Colts, 30 to 17.

And Many More

There was, throughout the pro picture, a great deal more three-pointing with the pedal digits. Like Sam Baker kicking three in a losing cause for the Browns. But the great number of games being won by precise toe action hammers home the point as to how the pros have put the foot back into football.

There was a time when some teams never tried a field goal all season. Back in 1934 they pinned the nickname of "Automatic Jack" on Jack Manders because he kicked the "amazing" number of 10 field goals in an entire season.

It was Groza and his forward thinking coach, Paul Brown of the Cleveland Browns, who changed the pro outlook by realizing the advantage of striking for three points instead of giving up the ball with a payless punt.

You have to give an assist to Ben Agajanian, who booted 15 field goals for Los Angeles in 1947. But the Dons were in the ill-fated All-American Conference and, when it died, so did its records.

So the credit goes to Groza for his 13 successful boots in 1950 which proved to the surviving National League that the field goal was a potent weapon. Groza went
