STOCKS WALL STREET

NEW YORK (UPD) — Stocks closed with some substantial losses today in a session featuring a whirlwind recovery that headed off a seeming rout.

The heavy volume, the most in about a month, caused a late tape on a number of occasions. A 4-minute behind ticker finally caught up to show stock declined about half as much as the lows of the day.

Polaroid finished about 7 points lower, Texas Instruments over 8, NAFT 3, IBM 4, Beckman 2 1/2, Havg 4, American Shipbuilding 6, Magma Copper 1 1/2 and American Home Products around 5.

Grand Jury Files List

George Washington Krohn, 33, was indicted by the Klamath County Grand Jury Friday afternoon in connection with the shooting of Elks Club bartender, Carl B. Young, on the night of October 13. Krohn was charged with assault with intent to kill.

The grand jury returned seven true bills and three not-true bills in its session Friday. True bills returned: Assault with a dangerous weapon—William Kirk, 31, and Leroy Kirk, 28, both of Chiloquin, accused of assaulting a cousin, Donald Kirk, with an arrowhead, a gun and a pistol after a family argument August 12.

Concealing stolen property—Ralph Huit, 30, Beatty, accused of the theft of seven rifles, two shotguns and a radio from Morgan Gadowa of Beatty July 6. Burglary in a dwelling—Ensley Studdard, 32, Jacksonville, Alabama, accused of stealing perfume and jewelry from the home of Gary Dearing, 2820 Alantom Drive, on September 23.

Larceny—Billy Joe Hodges, 31, Worden, accused of stealing some tires and wheels from Tulana Farms on October 6. A not-true bill was returned in the case of George Edwin Trollope, 35, also of Worden, in connection with the same case.

One secret true bill was returned. District Attorney Dale Crabtree reported. Defendants indicted by the grand jury were being arraigned in circuit court Monday by Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Pistol Shot Kills Hunter

LAKEVIEW—A freak gunshot accident killed Robert Lewis Burnett Jr., 41, Portland, at the Bernard Murphy ranch seven miles north of Paisley Saturday evening, said state police.

Burnett died at Lakeview Hospital at 11:40 p.m., officers said. They said Burnett and his wife, Iyla, had been hunting in the area for several days with another couple, Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Amundson, and their son, Lowell Jr., all of Portland.

The hunters told officers they had been living in a camp trailer. Saturday evening, while preparing to retire, Burnett stepped to his pickup to get a coat to use for a pillow.

When he yanked the coat from the seat, officers said, a .22 caliber automatic pistol under the coat, its safety mechanism released, slipped to the ground and discharged.

The shot caught Burnett low in the abdomen, police added. His wife and companions took the injured man part way to Lakeview. They were met in transit by the Lake County disaster car that transported Burnett to the hospital. The accident occurred about 9 p.m.

The body was taken to Portland Sunday. Funeral arrangements will be announced from Chapel of the Chimes.

Burnett was born in Eugene December 6, 1918. He was a junior engineer for the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, Portland.

Other survivors are two sons, Robert, who is in the Navy, and Norwin; a daughter, Jayne, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Burnett Sr., all of Portland.
