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Top Tester Says Students' Failing English

NEW YORK (UPI)—The head of the nation's top testing service charged today that America is losing the services of many talented youngsters because they can't say what they mean. Specifically, they have trouble with English, the language they are supposed to use in communicating their ideas. To put it another way, Johnny can't read, write or talk properly.

Edward S. Noyes, acting president of the nation-wide College Entrance Examination Board, said that his group is taking steps to correct the glaring inadequacies in English instruction.

"Many bright students either fail to get into college or fail to stay the course" because they cannot write English, Noyes said. Education has become a weapon of the cold war and this has been recognized by the National Defense Education Act, which gives financial aid to further the study of the sciences and mathematics. But the study of English has not received aid under the act as yet.

Helps Transmit Theories

"The act is intended to help more able students get into college," Noyes said. "Since they can't get in unless they do well in English, they should get this aid."

And more broadly, national defense won't be served if a student is another Albert Einstein but is incapable of transmitting his new theories into language others can understand.

Noyes blamed the inadequacies in English instruction on the shortage of teachers, the teaching of this subject by people not specifically trained in it, and the tendency to make the English teacher a maid-of-all-work.

The College Entrance Examination Board program will bring 60 teachers together next summer to prepare training courses in English teaching.

This task force will pass the word to 900 more high school teachers across the country.

The board will also make available free films that show good English teachers in action and suggest sample curricula.

Work for Everybody

The new program is directed specifically at college-preparatory schools, but the board hopes its program will be infectious and spread to other institutions.

While teachers are the primary target, the ultimate purpose is to reach the student.

The board recommends that all high-school students be required to write a 350-500 word composition each week. It condemns the use of re-hashes and extracts from literature and suggests that students use complete, original texts.

Principal and interest on the additional \$47,500,000 would be approximately \$2,600,000 per annum over a 30 year period. Payments by students and other users of higher education facilities are expected to be adequate for the payment of the interest and the retirement of any bonds issued under this proposed authorization.) VOTER QUALIFICATION AMENDMENT—Purpose: Amends Constitution to permit voters otherwise qualified to vote for United States President although they do not meet requirement of six months residency in the state. YES ☐ NO ☐

AUTHORIZING BONDS FOR STATE BUILDING PROGRAM—Purpose: To amend Constitution to permit issuance of state bonds to construct buildings for state institutions, office buildings and for higher education.

(ESTIMATE OF INCREASED INDEBTEDNESS: This constitutional amendment would authorize the borrowing on the credit of the State of \$7,500,000 per annum to the limit of \$40,000,000 during the next ten years for the purpose of construction, improvement, repair, equipping and furnishing state buildings designated by the Legislative Assembly. This amendment would increase the total authorized to approximately \$225,000,000. Interest on the additional \$35,000,000 would be approximately \$34,000 per annum on each \$1,000,000 needed. 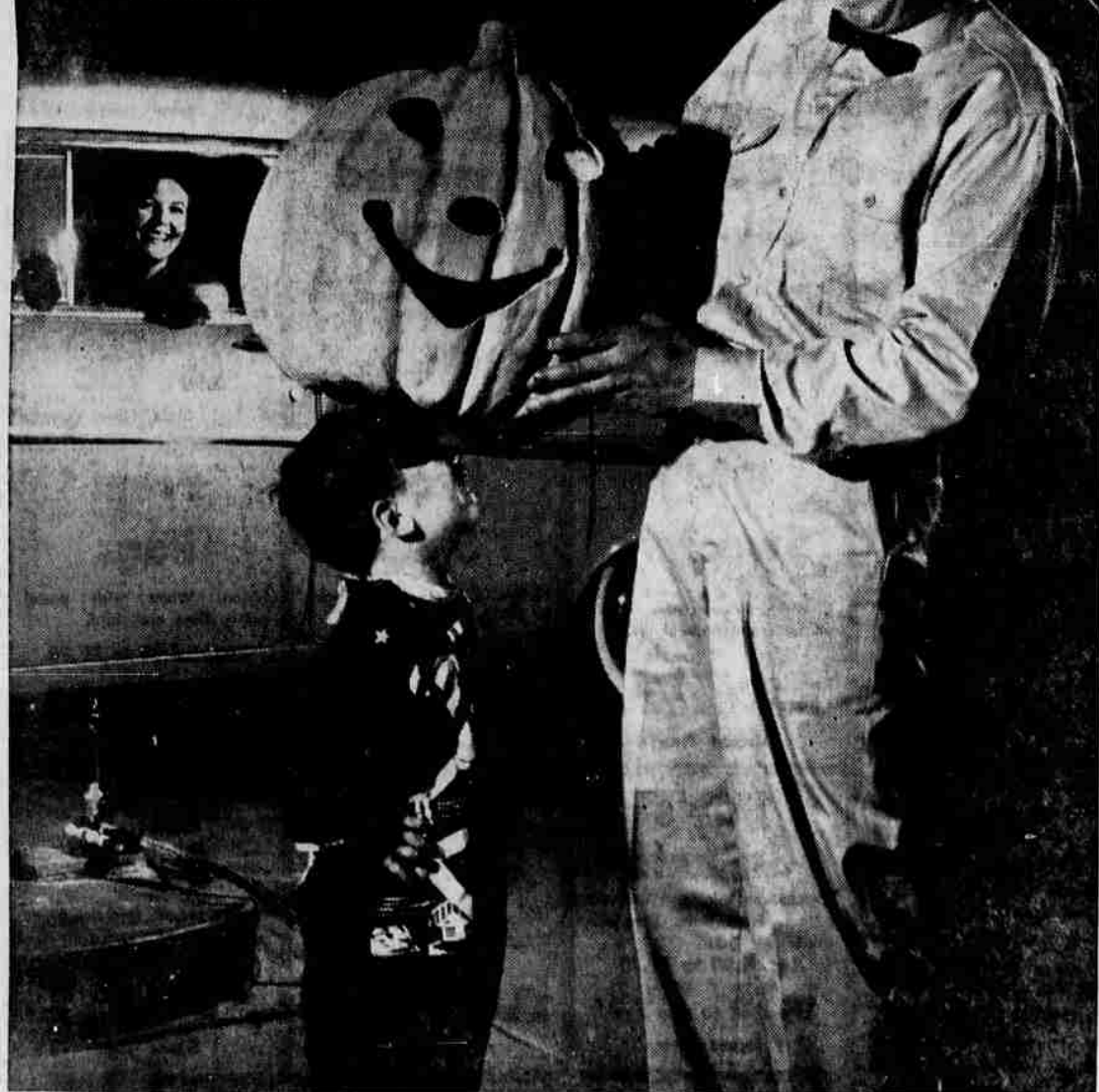
PERSONAL INCOME TAX BILL—Purpose: To increase state revenues. Lowers personal income tax rates. Abolishes federal tax deduction. Applicable to all tax years beginning after December 31, 1958. (ESTIMATE OF COST: If Ballot Measure 14 (HB 670) is approved by the electorate the increase in state revenue from personal income tax will be approximately \$6,400,000 per annum, based on present level of personal income.) BILLBOARD CONTROL MEASURE—Purpose: Prohibiting certain advertising signs with in 660 feet of interstate highways and thoroughways. Regulates permissible on premise and business signs. Existing signs allowable for 5 years. YES ☐ NO ☐
