Medford Maintains Top Spot

State champion Medford, after clipping Reno, Nev., 47-6, for its seventh victory of the season, is again the No. 1 team this week in the Associated Press' Oregon High School Football Poll.

The 13 sports writers and broadcasters who participated unanimously picked Medford for the sixth straight week.

Benson, its seven-game record marred only by a tie, moved up from No. 6 to second place after downing Madison, 6-0, in a Portland League game. Madison, in turn, dropped from second to sixth.

South Eugene, a 20-0 victor over North Bend, advanced from seventh to No. 3. North Bend, No. 6 last week, dropped out of the top 10.

Jefferson of Portland, which recovered from an upset loss to Grant by decisioning Lincoln, 19-6, moved up a notch to fourth spot. Jefferson displaced David Douglas of Portland, which fell one rung to No. 5 despite a 28-12 triumph over Sunset of Beaverton.

Roseburg moved into the top 10 again after its 6-0 defeat of Marshfield. Roseburg was voted seventh placed while Marshfield dropped from third last week to No. 9.

Grants Pass, still tied with Medford for the lead in the Southern Oregon Conference race, held onto tenth place after a 26-7 decision over Crater of Central Point.

AL Owners Slate Meet

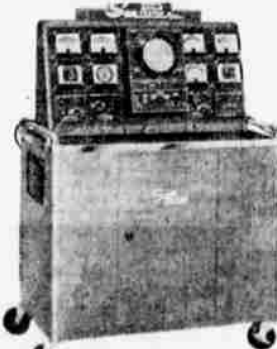
NEW YORK (AP)—American League club owners meet here Wednesday to consider expansion to 16 teams by 1962, but the problem of possible franchise shifts could postpone an announcement on which two cities will be added.

The key problem is Kansas City, where the As are about to be sold. The new owners may want to move the club to Los Angeles, a prime target for the AL after the National's three years of success in California.

There also may be a relish of a possible shift of the Washington Senators and perhaps of the Cleveland Indians as well.

If, as AL owners insist publicly, there are no problems over existing franchises, then Minneapolis-St. Paul and Dallas-Fort Worth probably will become the American's ninth and 10th teams. Several cities have applied for AL franchises, including Oakland and Toronto, but Minneapolis-St. Paul has a new stadium—long a lure for the Senators—and Dallas-Fort Worth offers the AL a chance to avoid a shutout in Texas such as the NL accomplished in California.

Pirates, Yanks Split World Series Loot

NEW YORK (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates, baseball's latest team of destiny, finally have reached the point where they can pocket the profit of the World Series monies. One full share of destiny was worth \$8,417.94, before taxes.

That was the figure announced Monday by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick. A full share of the losers' pool amounted to \$5,214.64 for the New York Yankees.

The Bucs' bucks totaled \$286,500.82 that was split into 33 1/3 full shares divided among 38 persons — Manager Danny Murtagh, players, coaches, their trainer and clubhouse attendant — and 12 cash awards totaling \$4,500, divided among the bat boy, clubhouse assistants, the groundkeeper part-time players and batting practice pitcher Virgil Trucks.

The Yankees split their over-all take of \$191,000.95 into 35 1/3 full shares, divided 41 ways and 11 cash awards totaling \$6,750.

Both the winning and losing shares were far short of the records set a year ago when the Los Angeles Dodgers and Chicago White Sox played two payoff games in the 100,000-seat Los Angeles Coliseum. The Dodgers' re-

ceived \$1,327.75 for the Milwaukee Braves, \$991.39 for the St. Louis Cardinals and \$501.58 for the Dodgers, who placed two-three-four behind the Pirates in the National League. In the American, the Baltimore Orioles' full share was \$1,564.68, the White Sox' \$935.00 and the Cleveland Indians' \$494.31.

Thirty Pirates received full shares, including Hall of Famer George Sisler, the batting instructor, outfielder Joe Christoph, who was not with the club all season; trainer Danny Whalen and clubhouse attendant John Hallahan. There were six full shares of \$4,208.97, and two quarter shares of \$2,104.48.

The Yankees voted 39 full shares, two three-quarter shares of \$3,910.98, a pair of two-third shares, six half shares and two quarter shares.

AP, UPI Pollsters Agree On Top Three

Iowa continued as the No. 1 football team in the country for the second straight week in The Associated Press ratings today — and this time the Hawkeyes won going away.

When they took over as top kick last week, they nosed out Mississippi by just two points.

This week, they compiled 438 points to 395 for the Rebels. Thirty-four members of the 48-man voting board placed the Hawkeyes first. Nine others had Mississippi in first place and five

awarded the No. 1 spot to Syracuse, which finished back in third place with 355 points.

The points were figured in the usual order of 10 for a first place vote, 9 for second place and so on down the line. All told, only 19 teams received votes.

There was little change from last week's ratings because only one team in that first 10 lost. Purdue, which had held down the 10th spot, fell before Iowa, 21-14, and as a result bounced out of the select company.

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SL Cardinal Great Chosen Year's NL Comeback Star

ST. LOUIS (AP)—If Stan Musial has his wish, he'll make an even bigger comeback in 1961 than the one that earned him The Associated Press' National League Comeback Player of the Year award for 1960.

"I'd like to hit over .300 next season," the St. Louis Cardinals' all-time great said today, "and possibly play a little more. I wasn't a bit tired at the end of the season."

Musial, who will be 40 on Nov. 21, beat out teammate Curt Simmons by 11 votes Monday in the AP poll of baseball writers. Musial received 55 ballots, Simmons 44, Bob Friend of Pittsburgh was third with 39 and Richie Ashburn of Chicago fourth with 11. Another Cardinal, Ernie Broglio, rounded out the top five with 7 votes.

Musial got the nod for a mid-season spurt that carried him and the Redbirds into the higher echelons of the NL. Many thought Stan was washed up following the 1959 campaign when he fell off to 255-35 points below his previous career low. Big Fivers Honor Beaver

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—In a unique honor, the Big Five has chosen Terry Baker of non-member Oregon State as the conference's "back of the week."

Balloting for the award includes players on non-Big Five foes of league teams, director Tom Hamilton explained Monday.

Baker rolled up a fantastic 302 yards Saturday against rugged Washington as he scored two touchdowns and set up two more while completing 16 out of 23 tosses. He passed for 215 yards and ran for 87 more as the Beavers lost to the Huskies, 30-29.

Baker's performance left him only 67 yards short of the all-time Beaver total offense mark set by Joe Francis in 1957. Baker, who is only a sophomore, has four more games to crack Francis' record.

Earl Smith, UCLA end, received the lineman of the week award.

He consistently turned in Stanford's wide stiff and made several key tackles Saturday night as the Bruins manhandled Stanford, 26-8. He also intercepted one of Dick Norman's tosses to start UCLA off on its second touchdown.

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
