

Pro Fights Slated In KF

Jim Walker, Gilman Set Ten Rounder
KF Thursday Performer

A five-bout card featuring a 10-round main event which will be staged in the old Klamath Falls Armory Thursday night, October 27, marks the first appearance locally of professional boxers in a number of years.

The show, handled by promoter Sonny Enders under the auspices of the Klamath Falls Boxing Commission, will begin at 8 p.m. Tickets priced at \$2 for ringside and \$1 general admission may be purchased now at the Klamath Billiards, Dick Reeder's Store or the Eagle Pool Hall.

The headline attraction matches a pair of 147-pounders who are meeting for the fourth time, "Roughhouse" Mickey Gilman, who fights out of Seattle, will tangle with Jimmy "Bang Bang" Walker over the 10-round distance.

In their past meetings Gilman and Walker have each won one. In their last encounter they battled to a draw, and it is said that bad blood between them assures fight-goers of their money's worth.

In the semi-main event a pair of heavyweights will mix. Ivan Johnson, a 190-pounder originally scheduled to meet Floyd Palmer here Thursday night, will clash with Jack O'Riley, Minneapolis. Johnson accepted the O'Riley bout after it was learned that Palmer had injured his back and would be unable to appear.

A four-round scrap featuring a boxer versus puncher pairs Benny Paul, 147, Vancouver, Canada, and Harold Nelson, Portland.

Joe Beimler, a Madras heavyweight neophyte making his first start as a pro, will square away against trail horse Hosea Medeiros, Texas, in one of the opening bouts. Beimler decided to turn professional after a recent free-for-all in which he was involved showed he had the equipment with which to deck a number of adversaries.

In the opener Madras middleweight Jimmy Estep will tangle with Leo Track of Pendleton.

Pirate Boss Man Of Year

NEW YORK (UPI) — Danny Murtaugh, who made it the hard way both as a player and a manager, was named National League manager of the year today for leading the Pittsburgh Pirates to their first pennant in 33 years.

Murtaugh, 43, was named by the United Press International's board of 24 National League experts. Eighteen of the experts voted for Murtaugh with the other six votes going to Solly Hemus of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Murtaugh, who climaxed the season by leading the Pirates to victory over the New York Yankees in the World Series, joined the Philadelphia Phillies in 1941. His top claims to fame during his playing career were leading the National League with 18 stolen bases in 1941 and leading second baseman in double plays in 1948.

Hemus was in danger of losing his job at the start of the season but wound up leading the Cardinals to a surprising third-place finish.

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Halimi Nabs Controversial Fight Win

LONDON (AP) — Alphonse Halimi, the newly crowned bantamweight champion of half the world, said today he's out to make himself the undisputed champion of the whole world—by taking on the winner of a Nov. 17 fight in Los Angeles.

Halimi won the European version of the world title by grabbing a controversial 15-round decision over British and European champion Freddie Gilroy Tuesday night.

The American National Boxing Commission did not recognize the fight as a world championship and said the one between Eder Jofre of Brazil and Eloy Sanchez, Mexico, in Los Angeles Nov. 17 would be for the world title.

The confusion over the world title arose by the retirement of Mexican Jose Becerra.

Belgian referee Philippe de Backer gave Halimi, the 28-year-old French-Algerian, the verdict over Gilroy, despite the views of most ringside observers that the 24-year-old Irishman had done enough to win.

The Associated Press card gave seven rounds to Gilroy, five to Halimi, with the remainder even.

Halimi, world bantamweight champion between April 1957 and July 1959, scored the only real knockdown of the fight. In the 13th round he landed a short right hook that floored Gilroy. The count reached four, then the bell saved the Irishman.

Halimi weighed 117½, Gilroy 116.

Hawk Goalie Peppered

 The Chicago Black Hawks' most decisive victory over the Montreal Canadiens in six years today posed the question of what's wrong with Vezina Trophy-winning goalie Jacques Plante.

The Black Hawks triumphed on Plante with an 8-4 unlied Tuesday night that lifted them into first place in the National Hockey League, but the really eye-opening statistic in the league is the number of goals allowed by Plante. Plante, who has won the Vezina Trophy the last five seasons, is the most scored-upon goalie in the league this season. He has been peppered with 37 tallies in 11 games.

Bert Allbritton will go at quarterback with Gary Bebbler standing by. The halfback slots will be filled by Larry Lugo, Dave Ragland, Joe DeGrande, or Ray Brown. Chuck Blofsky will handle the fullback post.

Weber singled out lineman O'Keefe for additional praise. O'Keefe has figured in the bulk of Hornet tackles and has been the anchorman in the Hornet forward wall. O'Keefe weighs about 185.

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NBA Yanks Old Arch's Ring Title

CLEVELAND (AP) — The National Boxing Association has stretched a long arm across the Atlantic to snatch its light-heavyweight crown from the balding brow of Archie Moore who won it in 1952.

Moore failed to meet a 30-day time limit the NBA set Sept. 6 to complete arrangements for defense of his title against Eric Schoepner of Germany, David Ott, NBA president, said.

Moore, who lists his age at 43 but whose mother lists it at 47, now is in Rome preparing to fight a nontitle 10-rounder Saturday night against Giulio Rinaldi of Italy.

Archie has defended his title eight times, the last time scoring a third-round knockout of Yvon Durelle of Canada on Aug. 12, 1959.

This is the second time this year the NBA has stripped Moore of championship recognition for failing to meet Schoepner. Now, the NBA said, elimination matches will be held to find a new light-heavyweight titleholder. Schoepner rates behind Harold Johnson of Philadelphia and John Calderwood of Scotland on the NBA's list of contenders.

The NBA took back Moore's 175-pound division crown Feb. 15, but restored it three weeks later when arrangements were completed for a Moore-Schoepner title bout in Toronto. Those plans fell through when, after a time extension to enable Archie to make the weight limit, a deal on television fizzled.

Navy Back Gets Honor

 Joe Bellino, Navy's dazzling halfback who set a modern scoring record for a Middle football player when he tallied two touchdowns against Pennsylvania, edged out New Mexico State halfback Bob Gaiters today as the Associated Press back of the week.

Gaiters and Bellino are the two leading major college scorers, the New Mexico star leading with 92 points on 15 touchdowns and two conversions.

Bellino led unbeaten Navy to its sixth straight victory, a 27-0 decision over Penn.

In scoring twice, one a 26-yard romp, the 187-pound Bellino from Winchester, Mass., boosted his season TD total to 11. This, with a 2-point conversion, gives him 66 points, eight better than the 1934 Navy record of Buzz Borries.

In 16 rushes Bellino gained 85 yards net, caught three passes for 62 yards, booted a 33-yard quick kick and brought back two punts for 35 yards.

Gaiters, also the national leader in rushing, scored three touchdowns as New Mexico State defeated Wichita—co-leader of the Missouri Valley Conference—40-0.

Mount Shasta Club Plans Pep Parade

MOUNT SHASTA — The Mount Shasta Boosters Club, not yet organized, will go into action Friday evening, October 28, when John J. Moisan will lead all loyal Mount Shastans to Dunsmuir to root the Mount Shasta boys into two wins at the railway town's home grounds. Both the varsity and junior varsity teams are scheduled for games.

Moisan said that so few people had shown an interest in school athletics the boys had become discouraged, and felt they were not appreciated. No one, he stated, could win feeling that way.

Johnny Braugh, of The Steak House, has transferred his allegiance from baseball to football until the end of the season. Showing his intentions, Braugh will give two chicken dinners to each Mount Shasta footballer who scores a touchdown—just as are given baseball players for home runs.

The parade will leave Mount Shasta en masse at 5:30 p.m. Friday. Noise, color, and enthusiasm are wanted. Then if the Dunsmuir fans want to see action, they'll get it.

Bevo's Terry Baker Number 2 In Nation

 Terry Baker of Oregon State College gained 302 yards in the Beavers' losing effort against Washington last week to move him up to second in major college football total offense.

Baker has a 1,013 yard total, compared with 1,076 to Howard Dyer of Virginia Military Institute. Mel Melin of Washington State is ranked fourth with 953 yards.

According to NCAA Service Bureau statistics, Baker is ranked only 18th among passers but has a 62.9 per cent completion record and an average gain of 8.9 yards per pass—best in both departments.

Melin ranks second in the passing department. He has attempted the week.

121 passes and completed 69 for a 57.0 percentage and 957 yards. Another WSU Cougar, Hugh Campbell, ranks high in scoring. Campbell is eighth in that category with 48 points on seven touchdowns and six extra points.

Dave Grayson of Oregon and Keith Lincoln of Washington State are ranked fifth and eighth, respectively, in rushing. Grayson, in 17 tries, has rushed 490 yards. Lincoln has 429 yards in 92 rushes.
