

Oregon Tourist Industry Provides Whopping Sum

The tourist industry in Oregon provided a record \$178,000 in come in 1959, members of the Chiloquin Chamber of Commerce were told at their monthly meeting Monday night.

Speaker was William Sweetland, publisher of the Herald and News. Sweetland told the group that

Chiloquin boosters and Klamath County residents will have to make a determined bid for tourists if the area is to hold its own in the fierce competition for additional revenue from that source.

The speaker pointed out that surveys of the Highway Department show that for each day a car of tourists is kept in the state, \$21.10 is added to tourist expenditure.

Discussing factors leading to industrial and economic development in the Klamath area, Sweetland pointed out that the recently completed treaty between the United States and Canada regarding the Columbia River would be a potent influence in Oregon's future development.

The speaker cautioned against any hasty action regarding exchange of power between Oregon and California as advocated by California interests. "We should maintain a rather selfish, provincial attitude toward the interstate until all political, as well as all engineering and economic aspects of the situation are resolved," Sweetland said.

He pointed out that California's huge congressional delegation would be in a position to sweep aside any recommendations or desires of Oregon in event of a conflict of interest. Development of water resources in the 17 western states is a major topic in a report recently completed by the Senate Select Committee on Water Resources, Sweetland said.

The plan, under the Bureau of Reclamation, calls for a total outlay of \$22 billion for full utilization of the nation's water.

At a business session, the chamber authorized president Dwight Kirchner to appoint a special industrial development committee, and voted to continue study for construction and erection of signboards directing traffic through Chiloquin to Crater Lake Park. Further development of the city airport site was urged. Included in the project would be bituminous surfacing of the runway, and installation of adequate lights.

Another accelerated chamber project discussed was the possibility of furnishing decals and stickers to business places and chamber members for sale to tourists and visitors to the Chiloquin area.

Ex-BLM Employee Honored

CHILQUIN — Cyril R. (Cy) Schiffbauer received the Commendable Service Award presented by the U.S. Department of the Interior recently, following his retirement earlier this year from service with the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Schiffbauer began his service with the bureau in 1917 as a painter at Wyandotte School in Oklahoma.

Though he was classified a painter, he worked primarily with the school farm. He built up a dairy herd from a few cows to a number that provided the school with dairy products adequate for its sustenance.

He also developed pasture land to provide feed for the herd. He resigned after serving there for six years. He returned to work with the bureau in 1933 at Klamath Agency near here and worked intermittently as painter and carpenter until June, 1950.

He served in the same capacity here continuously from May, 1951, until his retirement March 31. Glenn Emmons, commissioner of Indian Affairs, cited Schiffbauer for performing duties efficiently and for using initiative in keeping buildings at Klamath Agency in good repair and renovating furniture during slack periods.

"In recognition of his faithful and efficient service and his contribution to the maintenance program of the bureau, Mr. Schiffbauer is granted the Commendable Service Award of the Department of the Interior," the citation concluded.

Schiffbauer also received a lifetime pass from the department, entitling him to admission without charge to areas under jurisdiction of the department, including national parks.

Schiffbauer said he plans "to keep right on working." During the summer he built a new two-car garage at the Chiloquin residence of Deputy Sheriff Alvie Youngblood.

He is a highly-experienced carpenter and a member of the Carpenters Union. He plans to continue working in the Chiloquin area. Schiffbauer also plans to construct a garage-shop combination at his home.

His wife, Ethel, also a retired BIA employee, holds a lifetime Department of Interior pass, too. She spent 27 years as a matron at Indian boarding schools in Wyandotte and Pierre, South Dakota.

Bonanza PO About Complete

BONANZA — Bonanza Post Office, being built by Postmaster LeRoy Fernlund, is nearing completion.

A dedication date will be set by the regional office in Portland soon.

Personnel from the regional office will be present for the occasion.

The 26-foot by 32-foot building is made of green pumice with a pink catalina facing.

A roofing company of Klamath Falls put on the grey roof and a Klamath Falls contractor is doing the wiring. The building will have a cement floor covered with asphalt tile. Fernlund is doing most of the work himself.

Three large trees will shade the post office and he will have several benches for public use.

The grounds will be landscaped with shrubs, flowers and other plants.

CONGER SEWER LINE PORTIONS BECOME REALITY

The sewer line for portions of plans for the Shippington area Conger Avenue not previously served by the sewer became a virtual reality Monday night when the city council gave first and second readings to an ordinance authorizing the call for bids.

Such a sewer project has been under discussion for a number of years, and final plans for the line were recently approved by the council after careful consultation.

Early indications were that the line would cost approximately \$18,000, but the final estimates, presented a week ago to the council, listed the cost at \$12,883, with the city absorbing \$4,000 of that amount and the balance of \$8,883 plus engineering costs and bonds for a total of \$10,523.50 being paid by property owners.

Plans for this sewer link had been carefully studied because of the water level of Link River and after an engineering firm had given an opinion on the proposal, the plans were approved by the State Sanitary Authority.

While the Conger project was moving toward construction, the

permit construction of a drive-in, permission to erect billboards in C-2 zones, and amending the zoning ordinance to permit carports to come within two feet of side property lines in the cases of residences existing prior to the zoning law.

Councilman Walter Fleet was the only one to object to the bill-board measure. He did not agree that billboards should be permitted in the C-2 zone.

At present there are a number of billboards in this zone, but they would gradually be zoned

out of existence under the new zoning law.

Councilman Floyd Wynne moved to change the language of the amendment so that it gave the council complete control over where such billboards should be erected.

Previously, the measure only specified that it could not be erected within 100 feet of any public building, or could not obstruct a view or injure an architecturally-designed structure.

A request by the Seventh Day Adventist Church to conduct a community Christmas Carol sing combined with door-to-door solicitation of funds was turned down by the council when it was disapproved by the council's Green River Ordinance screening committee.

The church had said the funds collected would be for "World Wide Fund Distribution."

The council did approve a request for door-to-door collecting on Halloween by children for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Emergency Fund.
