

### Work Starts On Gas Line

Work has started in the Dairy and Sprague River areas which will eventually result in a 1,404-mile natural gas pipeline from Alberta, Canada, to Antioch, California.

Crews are clearing right of way at Dairy under the direction of Oscar Murray of Bend. Seventy-two miles of pipe have been delivered to a storage yard at Sprague River. Next week, "double ending" operations will begin—this occurs when two 40-foot sections of pipe are welded together.

Spokesmen for Western - Nell Inc. of Texas, in charge of laying the pipe, said this is the first area in the United States in which pipe will be laid. They explained that they wanted to start in the high plateau area before winter sets in.

The pipeline is a joint project undertaken by five gas companies in the United States and Canada. The Pacific Gas Transmission Company, with headquarters in San Francisco, will carry gas through Idaho, Oregon and Washington. PGT will install 614 miles of pipe in the three states, 358 miles of which is in Oregon.

The clearing crews are working north from Malin to Bonanza. Two more crews are operating in the Chemult area. Other storage yards in the area are located at Gilchrist and Madras, Oregon, and at Burney, California.

### Trick-Treat Perils Told

Halloween will present special dangers to motorists, Vern L. Hill, director of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles warned today.

"Countless youngsters will be out that night, and they'll be garbed in white goblin sheets, black witches' cloaks and costumes of all sorts—many of them with masks which prevent seeing clearly," Hill advised.

"These youngsters will be so absorbed in the fun of 'trick or treat' that they may forget to exercise the caution they ordinarily use when going to or from school," he added.

"Motorists must be alert for these fun-makers and be prepared to stop, if need be," he added. "What disturbs state officials even more is the inclination of a comparatively small percentage of older youths to make Halloween the excuse for pranks which can prove dangerous to drivers, Hill pointed out.

He urged would-be vandals to resist the temptation to deface highway warning signs, to twist stop signs or remove them, or to place obstructions of any sort in a roadway.

"When lives are at stake, those who gamble with the safety of the driving public are setting the stage for tragedy. These occurrences are rare, but even just a few—even one—could have tragic consequences," he added.

Hill also urged motorists to place themselves on the "trick team" rather than the "trick team" of drivers.

Tricksters of the road, he said, are those who merely slow down for stop signs, run traffic lights, follow others too closely, refuse to dim for approaching cars at night, weave from lane to lane, or dare others to race them on the road.
