

Walker Wins Decision On KF Card; Knockouts Featured In Preliminaries

"Roughhouse" Mickey Gilman of Seattle lived up to his nickname at the Klamath Auditorium Thursday night but Jimmy "Bang Bang" Walker of Portland punched out a unanimous 10-round decision in the main event of the first professional fight in Klamath Falls in four years.

Walker completely dominated the fight before a crowd of approximately 500 fans. Gilman

made occasional flurries in which he rushed at Walker with both arms flailing wildly. These outbursts resulted in some bizarre scenes.

There were rabbit punches, kidney punches, butting, misplaced shoulders, wrestling and stringing. Both fighters threw punches and words at each other after almost every round. The bell seemed to be a stimulant to further violence.

Referee Homer Amoureux had

his hands full keeping the fight under control. There were no official knockdowns in the bout although both fighters were on the canvas from shoves and pushes.

"Bang Bang" was in trouble only once, that after Gilman tagged him with a right as he came up off the canvas after a slip.

Referee Amoureux scored it 96-91 for Walker. Judges Lou Jones and Del Summers had it 99-96 and 97-92 respectively. Walker weighed 137 and Gilman, 141

in the over-the-weight lightweight match.

All five preliminaries ended in knockouts. Jack O'Reilly, a strapping 197-pounder from Gresham, was well on his way to a defeat by Billy Lanza, 180, of Bellingham, when he unloaded a crushing right and left combination to Lanza's midsection. Lanza went down to his knees, fell over on his back and was counted out in 30 seconds of the fifth round of a scheduled six-rounder.

"Big" Joe Biemer of Madras made his professional fighting debut by stopping Hosen Maderos of San Antonio in 2:32 of the second round. The two heavies showed some reluctance in the first round but Biemer started Maderos on his way at the start of round two with an uppercut. He finished the Texan off with a straight right.

A scheduled four-rounder went only one round when Jim Estep of Madras sustained a fractured collarbone. The win went to Leo Track of Portland as Estep fought most of the round with his right hand after sustaining the injury. Dr. J. Martin Adams called the fight. Track weighed 157 and Estep, 155.

Harold Nelson, 137, Portland, won the approval of the crowd in the opener by applying a convincing beating to Ken Clark, 138, Everett, Washington. Nelson recorded a technical knockout after a series of left hooks had Clark on the canvas twice.

Promoter Sonny Endres of Madras said he would schedule another light card for Klamath Falls in November. His reaction to the Pier Six brawl between Walker and Gilman in the main event was: "That's the kind of fight the people seem to want."

Oakland Raiders, NY Titans Slate Halfway Point Tilt

The Oakland Raiders, working with a 1-2 passing combination, go against the New York Titans tonight as the American Football League rolls past the halfway mark of its first season this week.

The Raiders, no better than

3-4 and third in the Western Division, have a choice of Tom Flores or Babe Parilli for their passing attack.

The host Titans, second to Houston in the Eastern Division with a 4-3 record, lead the league in passing.

Tonight's only other game sends the Los Angeles Chargers to Boston against the Patriots. Boston already has put away a 35-0 victory over the Chargers, who have lost two since.

Both division leaders play Sunday. Houston, tops in offense but last in defense, is at Buffalo against the Bills, who are first in defense, last in offense. The Denver Broncos, 4-2 in the Western Division, play at home against the Dallas Texans, who have lost three in a row.

SF 49ers, Chicago Matched

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — San Francisco and the Chicago Bears square off in Kezar Stadium here Sunday and coaches of both clubs today played checkers with their lineups in an effort to find the winning combination.

A look at the team's statistics indicates the Forty Niners' trouble. The Prospectors have moved the ball well but pushed across 70 measly points in five games. Moreover, Y. A. Tittle's per pass average is one of the league's worst.

Lack of team speed is the answer. The Forty Niners have been unable to come up with the big-gainer. Their longest run from scrimmage to date this year has been only 28 yards.

Coach Red Hickey has been trying to figure out how to get Ray Norton and Abe Woodson—a pair of quicksilver speedsters—into the offense once in a while. Norton has been working out at flanker and end, but is still green. He is expected to see action against the Bears, however. Woodson has been working with the offense, but is expected to be in his normal defensive halfback spot Sunday because the injured defensive back Jim Ridlon is now not expected to return for another week.

Nevertheless, Hickey said he planned to use Woodson on offense for at least a few plays—indicating the ex-Illinois speedster may see some two-way duty Sunday.

Good news for San Francisco is the return of offensive tackle John Thomas which will help the team at four positions. Thomas' return shifts Monte Clark back to the offensive line spot. This in turn moves Frank Morse back to defensive center, which enables Karl Rubke to help out at linebacker.

Meanwhile, over at nearby Solana, Papa Bear George Halas has made a surprise move.

He says John Adams will replace veteran Rick Cesares at the starting fullback spot Sunday. Cesares, in his sixth season with the club, is the team's all-time leading ground gainer and top runner this year.

Cesares had a bad game against Los Angeles last Sunday, but Halas said this had nothing to do with the move.

Golden Gophers 5 TD Favorites

Call it luck, call it fate, call it anything you want but Minnesota's Golden Gophers have the easiest pickings of any of the nation's top 10 teams on Saturday's college football schedule.

Unbeaten and ranked sixth with a 5-0 record, the Gophers are a five-touchdown favorite over Kansas State (1-5) as they look ahead to next week's battle for the Big Ten lead with Iowa, the nation's top-ranked team.

Iowa (5-0) will have two first-

string linemen back for its game with a tough Kansas team. Kansas will be without halfback Bert Coan.

In a Big Ten battle Ohio State (No. 8) plays Michigan State (No. 10) in a battle of survival for both. Each has one conference loss and an Ohio State victory would finish the Spartans in championship conference play. The game is televised regionally (ABC) in the Midwest and East.

Second-ranked Mississippi (6-0) goes after Louisiana State, the last team the Rebels lost to. LSU beat them 7-3 last season and Ole Miss has won 10 straight since, including a 21-0 victory over the Tigers in the Sugar Bowl. This one is also on regional TV (ABC). Ole Miss also tries to protect a share of its Southeastern Conference lead with Florida. Both are 3-0 and the Gators meet tough Auburn.

There are two big ones in the East. Third-ranked Syracuse meets Pitt while Navy (No. 4) takes on Notre Dame in Philadelphia.

Missouri (No. 5) still has an eye toward the Big Eight title as it plays so-so-Nebraska. Colorado and Missouri are tied for the lead with 3-0 marks while the Jay-

hawks are 3-0-1. Colorado has aal games, big one against defending champion Oklahoma. Baylor, ranked seventh with a 5-0 mark, also tries to keep its Southwest Conference lead when it plays Texas Christian, which has tied its last two games.

Washington is out of the big five to play Oregon.

The other regional television game pits California at Oregon State, while Atlantic Coast Conference member North Carolina State visits UCLA Saturday night and George Washington is at Air Force in a couple of interconfer-

Duck, UW Tiff Sellout

SEATTLE (AP) — The versatile and vengeful Oregon Webfoots have a score to settle Saturday when they clash with the Huskies of Washington before an anticipated capacity crowd of 55,000.

Washington athletic officials said today this will be the third straight sell-out for the university stadium. Navy and UCLA played here to capacity houses.

Last year the Webfoots lost by a single point to the Rose-Bowl-bound Huskies after taking a first-half 12-6 lead. And it took a last-gasp pass interception at the finish to halt an Oregon touchdown drive.

Still quarterbacked by the talented Dave Grosz, the Ducks have vowed there will be no repetition of the near-miss. Their record is the same as Washington's to date, at five victories and one defeat. Washington lost by a point to Navy, Oregon by three touchdowns to Michigan.

With All America quarterback Bob Schloer on the bench with a broken collarbone—a memento of the UCLA game—the veteran Washington team will be piloted by Bob Hivner. The Huskies, who use the forward pass rarely, may avoid the air lanes even more than usual and rely on the running ability of their numerous capable backs.

Damp weather could slow both clubs. Rainstorms have been chasing each other across the area this week and the teams—and the crowd—hope for a dry interval when the whistle blows for the kickoff at 2 p.m.
