Five Bevos On Sidelines

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State College, with five of its best players sidelined with injuries, Saturday plays California, a football team that has yet to win a game this season.

Oregon State officials said they expected a crowd of 15,000 for the game — and added that it might draw more if the weather improved.

Heavy rain fell Thursday, and Weather Bureau forecasters said rain would continue through to night—with scattered showers expected Saturday.

Oregon State will be without five of its key players: wingback Art Gilmore and linemen Aaron Thomas, Norby Keolanui, John Farrell and Mike Kline. All are recovering from injuries.

However, coach Tommy Prothro said tailback Don Kasso, a starter until injured two weeks ago, is ready to play. How much he will play, however, is a question, as his understudy, sophomore Terry Baker, ran and passed for 300 yards as the Staters lost to Washington 30-29 a week ago.

The Staters worked an hour in the rain Thursday, and plan another workout today. California also scheduled a workout following its noon arrival here from Berkeley.

The California squad has yet to win a game this year, though it managed one tie. Its fifth loss came last week at the hands of Oregon, 20-0. OSC is 4-2 for the season.

He hoisted the record this year to 18-10, with a 3.62 earned run average as a sophomore to pick up 97 of 188 votes cast in the poll. Jack Fisher of Baltimore, also a right-hand pitcher, was second with 57.

Others drawing votes were outfielder Bob Allison of Washington and pitcher Jim Coates of New York, 13 each; first baseman Norm Cash, Detroit, 6; and pitcher Don Lee, Washington, and outfielder Carroll Hardy, Cleveland-Boston, 1 each.

McCovey, Alou Belt Homers In SF Win

SENDAI, Japan (UPI)—Big man Takeshi Kuwata. Willie McCovey belted two homers and Felipe Alou blasted one as the San Francisco Giants today beat the Japan All-Stars, 7-3, to forge ahead with a 3-2 record in their 16-game goodwill series.

The Giants—who snapped back Wednesday at Sapporo from their hitting slump with a 17-hit attack as they downed the All-Stars 5-3—failed to get a man to first in the first four innings against righthander Tomoo Wako of the Diamai Orions.

But right fielder Alou smashed a pitch by Wako into the left field stands to open the fifth inning and deadlock the count, 1-1. The All-Stars had scored a run off Sam Jones in the first inning on a wild throw to first by second baseman Don Blasingame on a double play attempt.

Jones, who had allowed only one hit, walked four men to force in a run in the bottom half of the fifth and the Japanese took a 2-1 lead.

A capacity crowd of 30,000 fans at Miyagi Stadium saw the Giants hit the ball hard and score five runs after Willie Mays, their great star, hit into a double play in the top half of the sixth inning.

A walk and a single off 37-year-old righthander Takeko Bessho, who had relieved Wako to start the inning, put two men on base. Alou then doubled to score a run.

Righthander Gentaro Shimada of the Taiyo Whales replaced Bessho on the mound but Alou scored on a wild throw to third. Orlando Cepeda singled and McCovey hit a homer into the right field stands. Joe Amalfitano doubled and scored on Hobie Landrith's single before the inning was over.

Southpaw Billy O'Dell relieved Jones in the sixth and allowed a run in the seventh when catcher Kiyoshi Doi tripled to right and scored on a single by third base-

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World's Richest Race Ready

Parke said both horses "have come to the race in good shape." He said Roving Minstrel has "tremendous speed" to lay off the pace and come on to take the lead when jockey Willie Shoemaker is ready.

Garwol, Parke said, "has enough speed to stay out of trouble but likes to come from far back." The trainer said he is hoping for a cloudy day because of Parke's bad habit of "jumping shadows" on the track. Ismael Valenzuela will be aboard Garwol.

Other trainers also expressed confidence. Jack Price predicted Dorchester Farm Stable's Carry Back with John Sellers aboard "will run his usual good, honest race and with any luck will be right there."

Arnold Winnick said Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Herf's Intensive field with a big run at the end."
