Jack Benny Defendant In TV Suit

NEW YORK (UPI) — Comedian Jack Benny was charged today with copyright infringement in the use of Charlie Chan material without permission on a television program last November.

The action was brought by Eleanor Biggers Cole, widow of Earl Derr Biggers, creator of the fictional detective character, Charlie Chan.

The suit alleges that the copyright infringement took place over the CBS TV network in a sketch entitled "Dragon-Net," or "Charlie Chan Strikes Back" with Jack Benny, Jack Webb and Don Wilson in the leading roles.

The widow seeks an accounting of profits and asked the court to get damages as well as restraining the defendants from the continuing use of this material without proper authority.

Named in the suit with Benny are Jack Webb, CBS, Lever Brothers and the advertising firm of J. Walter Thompson Co.

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The Federal Board of Parole said Greenglass will complete the minimum term of his 15-year sentence, with time off for good behavior, on that date. He is in the Lewisburg, Pa., federal prison.

The Rosenbergs were executed in 1953 as atomic spies for the Soviet Union. Mrs. Rosenberg was Greenglass' sister.

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"Many of these problems got better treatment after the loan," Pearson said. "Whether the improvement was connected with the loan is not known."
