Rev. Andrew Jarvis, pastor of Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian Church is one of three Oregon Presbyterian ministers that will attend the National Convocation on the Church in Town and Country, Louisville, Kentucky. They will represent the Synod of Oregon. Convocation dates are November 1-3.

The sessions will commemorate the 50th year of a nationally organized department on town and country work within the Presbyterian Church.

The convocation is being sponsored as a joint effort by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, the Presbyterian Church U.S. and the United Presbyterian Church USA.

The meeting will offer significant opportunity for ministers of smaller communities to evaluate the work of the church in the light of changing needs and to project themselves and their churches into the future with enthusiasm and intelligent foresight.

Reverend Jarvis will leave October 30 and return November 4.
