

2 Programs Considered By Students

Students in this area who desire an opportunity to participate in the American Field Service program, have two programs to consider. Applicants under the student exchange plan must be high school juniors or seniors and meet qualifications of the sponsoring agency.

Applications are now being received by principals of the various high schools.

The plan permits students of the United States to live and study in homes and schools of other countries and for foreign boys and girls to come here.

Those who want a chance to study for five months during the summer of 1961 or to stay abroad one term or one year, must be screened and their information be in New York headquarters of American Field Service not later than November 10.

Qualifications include U.S. citizenship, junior in high school, an excellent academic record and ex-

cellent health, ability to get along with people of all ages, and to adapt quickly to many situations and a sense of responsibility for the purposes of the American abroad.

This year homes will be open to AFS summer school programs in several countries of South and Central America, Europe, the Far East, and the Middle East. The school program will take place in several countries of Europe, New Zealand and South America.

Consideration of the student's background, interests, language training are taken into consideration in placements. Candidates must not express preference for a particular country.

Homes abroad where students live are as carefully screened by the AFS as are the applicants.

Cost of the programs is kept at a minimum. All costs must be provided by the applicant or his family, by a local school or com-

munity sponsor. Students who now have applications should return them as soon as possible to principals of the high school they attend. Applications will also be given to interested persons.

Opening Of Pacific Freeway—Salem To Eugene—To Take Place

SALEM (AP)—The Pacific Freeway will be opened into Eugene in a week or 10 days, Forrest Cooper, deputy state highway engineer, announced today.

But, he added, the southbound lanes won't be completed by then, so that there will be two-lane traffic for six miles immediately south of the Halsey interchange.

Cooper said that if the weather doesn't improve, it may be spring before four lanes are completed. He also said the new route will carry unlimited traffic. If rain damages the sub-grade this winter, it might be necessary to ban truck traffic later on, he added.

When the route is opened, there will be continuous four-lane freeway, except for the two-way traffic between Portland and Eugene south of Halsey Road.
