For eight seniors slated to start for the Pelicans, tonight's homecoming battle with the Central Point Crater Comets marks the last time they will appear wearing KU's red and white on the home field.

The game, the Southern Oregon Conference finale for the Pelicans, is slated to start at 8 p.m. Stadium gates will open at 6 p.m.

The Pelicans, who have yet to win a game from the Central Pointers since the series was inaugurated, are determined to upset what has seemed a homecoming "tradition" by collecting their first SOC triumph of 1960. One game remains on the KU slate following tonight's tussle. Next Friday they travel to Boise, Idaho, for a nonconference with the Borah High Lions.

Coach Bob Williams will call upon Sherman Allen, Greg Jones,

Dave Stippich and Larry McClure for backfield assignments tonight. Of the four only Jones is a senior.

In the line are seven departing seniors, co-captain end Wayne Dennis and end Allen Phillips, tackle Joe Cox, guards Sam Hanzel and Art Mills, and center Charlton Curran.

Co-captain Gary Hancock, who has been out with an illness, will not start tonight, Williams reported. In his place will be either junior Ricky Curran or senior

Merle Sine.

On his defensive unit Williams plans to use linebackers Stippich and Ken Lewis; linebackers Gary Buchholz, Roger Macy and Paul Noel; ends Bob Dearing and Dana Ash; tackles Charlie Rooks and either Cox or Jim Mathis; and Mills and Gene Bailo at guards.

The invaders, who boast one of the sharpest backfields in the conference, will be guided by Mike Glines, a 141-pound sophomore quarterback. Working with him will be linebackers Loyal Hig-

inbotham and John Champ, and fullback Wayne Martin.

The Comets' line includes Tom White, 175, and Harold Tweedell, 180, at ends; Bryson LaCasse, 195, and Skip Bogennoff, 180, at tackles; Willie Jones, 178, and Larry Ryerson, 173, at guards and center Dave Molloy, 200.

In other league action tonight the Ashland Grizzlies host the Medford Black Tornado, while Corvallis invades Grants Pass for a non-league clash.

UO Frosh Nip Rooks In Rain

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Freshmen won their second football game in a row Thursday night, edging the winless Oregon State Rooks 6-0 in a downpour at Multnomah Stadium.

The Frosh turned a second-period drive into the game's lone touchdown and completely dominated the contest with more than a 3-1 edge in yardage.

Oregon entrusted its scoring hopes to Mel Renfro on the key play of the scoring drive. And the fleet halfback responded, circling end for seven yards and churning into the end zone.

Heavy rain fell throughout the game and turned the face of the field to mud. Despite the rain and a howling wind, the game still managed to draw a crowd of 4,493.

Oregon came close to scoring two other touchdowns. Once the Frosh got to the seven yard line, but a penalty stopped them. Later, they drove back to the eight. But two penalties in a row moved them to the 27 and the march died.

Oregon State got no closer to a touchdown than 22 yards from the end zone.

The winners piled up a huge edge in yardage, accumulating 506 yards—187 on the ground and 119 on passing. Oregon State got only 96 yards—64 net on the ground and 32 in the air.

Bruce Williams of Oregon State was the game's leading rusher, getting 73 yards on 19 tries.

The victory gave Oregon a 2-0 record. Earlier the Frosh beat the Washington State Freshmen 32-6. It was the second straight loss for the Staters, 7-5 losers to Washington in their opener.

Pacific Stars Top League Performers

PORTLAND (AP)—The championship Willamette University team continues to lead in most team statistics but two Pacific University football players are tops in individual performances in the Northwest Conference.

Bob Wendel, Pacific end, received nine passes for 96 yards last week, two of them for touchdowns. He also booted four conversions. In six games he has caught 46 passes for 653 yards and scored five touchdowns.

Bob Light of Pacific completed 13 passes for 160 yards last week. Stan Solomon of Willamette made only 62 yards last Saturday but still is first in rushing with 700 yards with Lewis and Clark's freshman star, Mickey Hergert, second with 611 yards.

Light ranks fourth in passing in the NAIA's statistics for small colleges. He also is No. 7 in total offense.

Solomon is seventh and Hergert 14th in NAIA rushing figures. Wendel is the No. 3 pass receiver. Willamette led in team rushing with 307.3 yards per game, in pass completion percentages with .558, in total offense with 420.5 yards per game, in rushing defense with only 125.2 yards and in total defense with 218.8.

Lewis and Clark was first in pass defense, allowing only 43 per cent of its opponents' passes to be completed. Willamette was second.

Duden Putter Pays Off Big

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Bob Duden employed his arched putter to capture first money in the \$10,000 Sahara Pro-Amateur Golf Tournament Thursday.

The 40-year-old Portland, Ore., pro fashioned a 68 in the final round to finish with a 54-hole score of 207. He won \$1,000.

Duden is the inventor of the arched shaft, which is used between the feet like a croquet mallet. His unusual putting enabled him to finish four under par.

Northwest Again Steals Show In Pacific Coast Grid Action

The Northwest steals the show for the second straight time along the Coast this Saturday when Washington and Oregon meet at Seattle in what should be a spintangler even if it also is a non-conference tilt.

Both teams sport 5-1 records and a fine battle is on tap between Bob Hyner, Washington's quarterback who has taken over for the injured Bob Schlerod, and big Dave Grosz of the Ducks. There also is a good duel coming between the halfbacks with George Fleming, Washington's steady runner and place-kicker, offsetting the spurts of Cleveland Jones, the Ducks' five foot, three inch scabbard.

In other games, Southern California invades Stanford for a Big

Five clash that should send Troy into a first place tie with the Huskies, California is at Oregon State, North Carolina State meets UCLA in a Saturday night inter-sectional, Washington State comes to hopped-up San Jose State and Idaho is at College of the Pacific.

Mike McKeever, Southern California's fierce guard, may have shaken off the sinus trouble and be able to go against Stanford. The Indians have lost all six of their games to date and this next one figures to keep their slate unblemished.

Only 69 yards and feeble California, another winless outfit, separate tailback Terry Baker of Oregon State from a new school offense record. The old mark is 1,082 which Joe Francis took 10 games to set in 1957. Baker is

heading into his seventh.

Roman Gabriel is the latest hot passer with UCLA must face when North Carolina State comes into the Los Angeles Coliseum. Coach Bill Barnes of the Bruins has warned that they are in for a tough test. Gabriel will meet a sharp passer in Bill Kilmer, the Bruins' star tailback.

Washington State, with halfback Keith Lincoln on the doubtful list, meets a San Jose team which has knocked off Stanford and Arizona State in its last two outings. The Spartans are deploying their defenses to stop the passing of Mel Melin—no Bobby Newman exactly, but still dangerous.

Idaho, now 1-5 after last week's 14-6 win at Hawaii, faces a COP team which may still be coping from a 51-12 thumping by Washington State.

Two undefeated teams risk their records in what is supposed to be a notch below the big boys. Humboldt State (6-0) is at Hawaii tonight and Fresno State (5-0) invades San Diego State Saturday night.

In Border Conference action, it's New Mexico State at Arizona State and West Texas State at Arizona.

Thrifty Favored In Races

RENO, Nev. (AP)—About 15 unlimited hydroplanes will compete for the Mapes Cup on Pyramid Lake Saturday and Sunday in the second annual Reno Regatta.

Bill Muncey, driving Willard Rhodes' Miss Thriftway, which has already clinched the national championship on points this year, is the favorite. The Seattle boat had accumulated an unbeatable 2,775 points after winning a race at Madison, Ind., earlier this month.

Four boats taking part in the regatta are still competing for second place. The issue might not be settled until the Gold Cup on Lake Mead in southern Nevada Nov. 12-13.

They are Sam DuPont's Nitrogen, with 1,473 points; DuPont's Nitrogen Too, with 1,255; O. E. Bardahl's Miss Bardahl, with 990, and Bob Giliam's KOL-Roy, with 981.

A surprise competitor will be Wahoo, driven by Miro Slovak and owned by William Boeing Jr. The Seattle boat had been beached in August by an accident in the Seafair race in Seattle.

Other boats expected in the regatta include Miss Buriem, Miss Seattle Too, Miss Spokane, Hawaii Kai of Seattle, Dollar Bill of Lompoc, Calif., Thriftway Too of Seattle and KOL-Roy of Seattle.

Considered as possible entries are Miss Detroit and Miss Buffalo. It will be the eighth running for the Mapes Cup, although only the second at Pyramid Lake, 33 miles north of here. For six years the trophy was top award for the now-defunct Mile High Regatta at La Taboe.

The boats will be battling for seven open berths in Sunday's championship heat. The first heat Saturday will be divided into three sections of equal numbers.

On Sunday, the top 14 boats from Saturday's competition will race in heat two, seven boats in each section.

KU Jayvees, Grizzly Pups Slate Saturday Grid Fest

Joe Brown Defends Title Ninth Time

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The world lightweight crown, one of the brighter baubles of boxing, will be at stake tonight when champion Joe Brown of Houston and California's Bobby (Cisco) Andrade tangle at the Olympic Auditorium.

Brown, a remarkable athlete for his 34 years, is a 2-1 betting favorite in the non-televized bout, billed for 15 rounds.

It will be the ninth defense of the title by Old Bones, establishing a record of title defenses for the 135-pound division. The late Benny Leonard successfully defended the title eight times.

The co-promoters, Cal Eaton and George Parrasnes, hope for a turnout of 8,000 and a \$70,000 gate.

Brown was guaranteed \$40,000 and his 30-year-old foe, from nearby Compton, gets 20 per cent of the gate. A rematch was guaranteed if Brown loses.

Few will be surprised if the match ends before the scheduled 15 rounds, but the longer it goes the more the younger Andrade may be favored.

Brown is noted as a one-punch artist and has knocked out 38 opponents in his 80 victories.

Andrade also boasts a knock. Of his 44 wins, 24 were by punches. The Cisco Kid, who twice retired in the past two years, stopped all four of his 1960 opponents.

Brown, a native of Baton Rouge, La., won the title from Wallace (Bud) Smith in 1956.

Fat Price Sought For Franchises

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Something near half a million dollars apparently is the price American Association directors are thinking of asking for giving up the Minneapolis and St. Paul franchises to major league baseball.

Directors are inclined to feel the \$450,000 which the National League paid for the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas set a precedent. Ed Doherty, president of the American Association, said Thursday night.

So far, he said, the league hasn't been officially notified that the Washington Senators are moving to Minneapolis-St. Paul next season in an expansion of the American League to 10 teams. After notification is received, association directors will meet to determine an asking price for the territory.

Scheduled for defensive duties are Leroy Paulsen, Brian Routh, Bob Burnett and Daryl Metcalf.

Frick Becomes 'Peacemaker'; Seeks 'Orderly' Expansion

NEW YORK (UPI)—Commissioner Fard Frick cast himself in the role of peacemaker between the National and American leagues today in an effort to insure the orderly expansion of baseball.

Frick, long a champion of expansion, began to cast some soothing oil on baseball's troubled waters with an announcement that he will meet with league presidents Warren Giles and Joe Cronin before the scheduled Nov. 17 expansion meeting of the AL.

"My main concern is to be sure we're all on the same track," said Frick. "We must not lose sight of the fact that orderly expansion is our goal and we must see what can be worked out."

Frick also denied that the American League was guilty of a "low blow," as charged by Continental League founder William Shea, when it expanded to Los Angeles. Shea charged the league "reneged" on a promise to expand only by adding groups that represented Continental League franchises.

Big O Hits 39 Counters

It looks as if Jack Twyman, last year's second high scorer in the National Basketball Association, is going to take a back seat to rookie Oscar (Big O) Robertson this season.

Robertson, looking none the worse in switching to the pro game, paced the Cincinnati Royals to a 143-140 overtime victory over the Syracuse Nationals Thursday night by scoring 39 points, on 13 field goals and 13 of 15 from the foul line.

The triumph was the fifth in six games for the new-look Royals, who finished in last place in the Western Division last year. Veteran Twyman, runner-up to Will Chamberlain in 1959-60, and Phil Jordan added 26 points apiece for the Royals.

Reserve Win Wilfong tied the game 130-all at the end of regulation time and then combined with Robertson to pull out the victory for the Royals.

Dick Barnett with 30 points, 21 in the first half, led Syracuse scorers.

In tonight's action, New York hosts Boston and Los Angeles plays at Philadelphia.

Cougar Ace Out Of Play

PULLMAN, W.Wash. (AP)—Triple-threat halfback Keith Lincoln won't be on hand when Washington State University's football team takes the field against San Jose Saturday.

Lincoln's injured ankle hasn't healed as fast as had been hoped. Coach Jim Sutherland said Thursday, and he will not make the trip to California.

AF General A Probable New Owner

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gen. Edward R. (Pete) Quesada, friend of President Eisenhower and boss of the Federal Aviation Agency, has the backing of a majority of the American League owners for the new Washington baseball franchise.

This was disclosed today by an informed source, who said the famed World War II flyer had the "inside track" for the franchise that will replace the team that is being shifted to Minneapolis under newly approved expansion plans.

The source said Quesada, who is independently wealthy, already has the backing of five American League club owners.

Quesada conferred with American League president Joe Cronin and with league club owners Wednesday—the day the league voted to expand to 10 teams by switching the Washington Senators to Minneapolis and creating new franchises in Washington and Los Angeles.

He was known to have discussed with them a number of problems involved in establishing a new team here, including the purchase of players and player-pension plans.

At one time, Quesada was interested in buying the Washington Redskins of the National Football League.

A native of Washington, the 56-year-old former Air Force general attended the University of Maryland and Georgetown University. He was a star quarterback in high school and won a football scholarship to Maryland.

Two other individuals were understood to be interested in the new Washington franchise. But it was reported they had only an outside chance, if any, of getting it.

NY Goalie On The Spot

The Boston Bruins are "off the Schneider" today but goalie Gump Worsley of the New York Rangers is back on the spot.

It all came about Thursday night when the Bruins whipped the Rangers, 6-4, scoring their first victory of the National Hockey League season and once again posing the question of why rivals score more heavily against the Rangers when Worsley is in the nets than when they're manned by U.S. Olympic hero Jack McCartan.

The Bruins, who had scored five ties and lost three games in their previous tries, scored their first NHL win of the season with a bombardment that included two goals each by Jerry Toppazzini and Bronco Horvath. Worsley made 22 saves compared to 32 by Don Simmons of the Bruins.

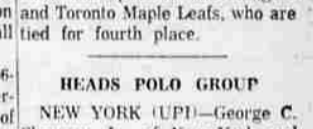
The victory moved the Bruins to within one point of the Rangers and Toronto Maple Leafs, who are tied for fourth place.
