Buying Antiques Can Be Gratifying Investment

NEW YORK (UPI)—Buying antiques is like buying stocks and bonds, says one authority in the antiques field. Wisely chosen for a long-range investment and not for speculation, they're bound to pay off.

"And you get the additional return of looking at and using the antiques," said Walter du Verrier. "Stocks you've got to keep locked in a safety deposit box."

The market value of antiques, like the market value of art, keeps going up, said du Verrier during an interview at the New York antiques fair this week. He gave two reasons. One, all the money around apparently just waiting to be spent. And two, the increase in the number of collectors.

"I can show item by item various things which are bringing two to 10 times what they cost 30 years ago," said du Verrier. "That is, if you can find them now. Thirty years ago, one out of say every 1,000 persons might have been interested in antiques either as a collector or a dealer. Today, it's more nearly one out of every 100."

He listed two examples of rising prices in the antiques field. One, biscuit tins with a "trompe l'oeil" design—that is, shaped like books, furniture or a globe, instead of like a plain old biscuit tin.

These are vintage 1900 to 1910, he said, and originally were used by commercial food packagers. A few years ago, the nominal price on one would be \$5 to \$10. Today, he said, they're snapped up by private collectors or food companies at \$30 to \$40 each.

And the other, American pewter, which now is worth three to four times what it cost a collector 30 or 40 years ago.

I asked du Verrier to list some "blue chip" antiques—those which he considered sound investments rather than gambles. "French, American, or English furniture of the 18th and early 19th century," he answered. "American silver, especially Georgian. Pewter. Good patterned pressed glass. Lowestoft porcelain, Oriental lacquer. Any porcelain made prior to 1840 and in good condition. Grandfather clocks."

"Of course," he said, "antiques like fashions have their fads. Right now, the biggest fad of all—the one with the most impact—is art nouveau."

Art nouveau, he explained, includes colored leaded glass lampshades which hung from ceilings during the late Victorian era, leaded glass panes, art glass and bronze figures.

Du Verrier, 40, a native New Yorker, has been in antiques since 1947—first under the tutelage of the late Alfred Farber, one of New York's most respected dealers, then for six years with his shop in Canaan, Conn., and now in the heart of the antiques shopping district in Manhattan.

If you have a yen to be a collector, Du Verrier offered this advice:

"Read every article, every book you can find on antiques. Never miss an antiques show. Hunt antiques shops and museums. Collect what truly interests you, and don't scatter your interests. Don't overbuild your collection, so that it becomes a bore to you, and to your friends."
