Technicians Study Bones

REDWOOD CITY (UPI)—Bones found in the garage of an elderly woman recluse were studied by laboratory technicians Saturday to determine whether they were the remains of a young man she claimed to have murdered 33 years ago.

Authorities reported Thursday that Olive Jean Koempel confessed the crime shortly before she died Oct. 12 at the age of 80. The bones found at her home tended to verify her story.

Mrs. Koempel was supervising head nurse at Baltimore General Hospital in the early 1920s. In her confession to a friend, she said the victim was a hitchhiker she picked up while driving near Los Angeles in 1927.

Mrs. Koempel said she ordered the man from her car when he made improper advances — and then ran him down in anger. She said she took the body to her home, dismembered it, and buried it on her property.

Neighbors said Mrs. Koempel began a life of a recluse here. She lived in a shack, without water, lights or gas — and virtually covered her property with any type of junk she could find or steal.

Several years ago, she was cited by medical authorities for keeping 31 chickens, 13 dogs, 5 cats and 30 ducks on her premises.

When authorities descended on her property to check her story of murder, they found pathways leading through the junk, newspapers, old doors, chunks of corrugated iron, and dozens of wheeled supermarket carts which were crammed into the small house.

They found that 30 dogs and cats also shared her quarters. And, they found 20 to 30 bones scattered with saw marks buried in the garage.

Deputy Coroner Joseph McPheters said one of them was apparently a human knee cap.

Stevenson Not Forgotten

By JAMES MARLOW. Associated Press News-Adlai E. Stevenson, who entranced millions with his eloquence in the presidential campaigns of 1952 and 1956, is not the completely forgotten man of 1960.

But although he is still diligent with his sentences, he is hardly more than a minor voice on the outer fringes of the campaign.

The Democrats, after twice making him their presidential choice, this year swept him into the backwater of history along with all the other also-rans when they brushed him aside none too gently for Sen. John F. Kennedy.

Now he is doing what he said he would do although, when he said it, what he thought he might be doing was running for president.

Last June, still thinking he might get a third nomination without asking for it, he said: "I will serve my country and my party whenever called upon."

He has been called upon—to stump for Kennedy. He has been pursuing that task gracefully with many fine and pleasant things to say about the man who beat him and many unpleasant things to say about Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Self-conscious Stevenson used to exasperate newsmen with his fidgety fussing over sentences and phrases and his endless writing and rewriting of his speeches on plane hops between stops.

The result used to be that newsmen often got his speeches late— which meant newspapers and the public got them late—and even then had to watch every word he spoke to check any last-minute changes.

Kennedy, like Nixon, talks off the cuff. Stevenson was a literary dancing master. Kennedy gives the impression of a young man who hardly has time to say hello.

Kennedy, like Nixon, harps on the same theme day after day with small variations until covering both men sometimes develops a painful monotony.

Listening to Stevenson often became painful for people who might admire his sentence structure but wish for more force and less gentility.

Still, Kennedy as a phrase-maker isn't in the same league with Stevenson who even at this late date, and despite his minor role, is fastidious about his adjectives.

But Stevenson, despite the prim impression he made, was rougher on President Eisenhower than Kennedy is on Nixon.

Ron Phair Paid Honor At Rally

Honored by one of the largest political gatherings ever held in Klamath County, Ron Phair, Republican candidate for Congress from Oregon's Second District, Friday night said that he has covered more than 50,000 miles in talking to people of the district.

Phair, in expressing his gratitude and appreciation to supporters from both major political parties, said that he found only friendship and courtesy at every hand since he started campaigning last June. The second district includes almost two-thirds of the state of Oregon, "and I've been running — running around this district for six months in an effort to cover all of it," Phair said.

Phair told his audience that he had not been particularly interested in accepting the GOP nomination until he "got into the voting record of my opponent — and I did not like what I saw."

"I do not imply that he (Ullman) is unfaithful to his country, but his record clearly indicates that he is 'soft' on communism and subversive elements in the nation," Phair said.

"Another part of his voting record that was unpleasant to me was that he obviously placed considerable of his personal interests above the welfare of the district and the nation," Phair added.

Phair pointed out that efforts of Senators Morse and Neuberger resulted in accomplishments that Mr. Ullman now is taking credit for. He referred to the Boardman project and the Klamath Indian Reservation termination project.

"My opponent is so anxious to appease and please pressure groups that he is at times actually irresponsible," Phair charged. At the same time Phair criticized Ullman for his down-the-line approach to voting on bills in Congress.

Pointing to his own objectives, Phair said that if he is elected to Congress, he will fight for those things which tend to preserve the freedoms and opportunities of individuals. He was critical of the trend toward more "big government."

Presiding as master of ceremonies at the dinner was Joe Smith. Speakers were introduced by Ben Adair, Klamath County GOP central committee chairman.

Republican candidates for office introduced at the dinner included Harold Sliger, sheriff; Carol Howe and George Filcraft, state representatives; Dale Crabtree, district attorney; Ralph Hill, county judge; Vac Kalina, county commissioner; Charles DeLap, county clerk; and T. C. Griggs, county assessor.

Norman Duffy, Phair-for-Congress committee chairman, was in charge of arrangements for the dinner.

Kansas Senator Lack Of Progress Refuted

Sen. Frank Carlson, Kansas veteran legislator, lashed out at statements that the United States is a "second rate nation" in a speech here Friday night.

Carlson spoke at a dinner rally for Ron Phair, Republican candidate for representative from Oregon's Second District. More than 350 persons attended the dinner at the lamah Falls Auditorium.

Carlson, a congressman for 26 years, and a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said that his years of service had given him opportunity to observe closely the progress and objectives of the United States government in foreign matters.

In refuting the charges that the United States lags in scientific effort and progress, Carlson pointed out that there are now 16 satellites orbiting of these. 14 are American and two are Russian. Seven of the 14 U.S. satellites are sending messages about weather, pressures, and other vital information, while both of the Russian satellites are "dead," Carlson said.

On the domestic front, Carlson pointed out, the advancement of the United States is even more pronounced. Production in the United States exceeds 440 billion dollars annually. In addition, the 10 NATO countries with which we are allied have a productive capacity of 307 billion dollars. Contrasted to this total productive ability of 747 billion dollars is the reported Russian total of only 148 billion dollars the senator stated.

Discussing briefly the situation between the United States and Cuba, Carlson said that he had spent considerable time studying the sugar problems and related difficulties in the Dominican Republics.

Some people believe we should use force to protect our investments and interests in Cuba," the senator said. "We cannot do this, because a fundamental policy of the United States is to preserve the peace, and any gesture suggesting aggression would place us in a position before the world much the same as Russia's. In the field of international relations, we must have patience is required. It is significant that there is no war — no bloodshed — tonight. We must bend every effort to preservation of diplomatic channels as contrasted to aggressive tactics," he said.

"I believe that Senator Kennedy (the Democratic nominee for the presidency) had made a basic mistake in his approach to the Quemoy and Matsu issue. If we give an inch, we give the Russians and Chinese Reds a nibble at the whole world."

The senator said that the United States stood firm in the Erie Canal issue against our friends, England and France. He referred to such strategic spots and Hong Kong and Berlin as "islands" in the field of foreign relations, and compared them with Quemoy and Matsu in setting basic policy.
