Quixie emphasizes to the children several preventive measures to preserve their hearing. These statements have been approved by the medical profession and the state board of health. The audiometer testings bring to light at an early age any hearing loss a child might have. Office calls and minor treatments of needy children are referred to the Quota Club.

Cuernavaca, Town Rich In Mexican History

Along the fabulous route from Mexico City to Acapulco, Cuernavaca is a stop few travelers want to miss. It is a town that colorfully merges Mexican merrymaking, history and customs.

Once the playground of Aztec kings, Cuernavaca today is a favorite holiday site for residents of Mexico City. It's less than 50 miles away from the Mexican capital, and possesses a semitropical climate that lures thousands of pleasure seekers to it every weekend.

The scene then becomes a kaleidoscopic carnival. Swarms of people jam the plazas flaunting dazzling colors in dress, basket and toy. There are Mexicans wearing business suits and peasant blouses, Indians wrapped in serapes and American tourists sporting blue jeans, huaraches and woven belts. The streets reverberate with mechanical music, which is intensified in the evening when serenading musicians wander the town.

All this commotion doesn't seem to bother the many retired business and professional men, generals, politicians, writers and artists who make Cuernavaca their year-round home. Often called the "St. Petersburg of Mexico," Cuernavaca has been a retreat for many important characters in that nation's history. Cortes resided there and built a palace bearing his name that today houses government offices. The palace's chief attraction is a Diego Rivera mural highlighting the rich tapestry of Mexican history from the Spanish conquest to the social revolution of the 1930s.

Emperor Maximilian and his

wife Carlotta spent many days at the Borda mansion, whose fabulous gardens have been compared to Versailles. Their mirror-like pools and narrow walks are shaded by Mexican cedars and mango trees. Magnolia, mimosa, orange and lime blossoms scent the air, and there are luxuriant clusters of bougainvillea, hibiscus, oleander and orchids.

From the Borda mansion, Cuernavacans point to the sumptuous former homes of Dwight Morrow and King Carol of Rumania and also to the hotel which served as an occasional hiding place for Emiliano Zapata. The great Indian revolutionary leader recruited many followers from the serfs who worked the large sugar plantations around the Cuernavaca area. These estates have been divided by a reforming government, but sugar remains the Cuernavaca area's most important product.

Cortes introduced sugar to Mexico. He built a huge sugar mill, known today as Vista Hermosa (beautiful view), 15 miles south of Cuernavaca which is now a resort. Tourists now going there swim in a pool under the mill's ancient arches, dine in a vast storeroom and enjoy huge colonial chambers.
