SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—In Western states it's a brave political pundit who tries to pick a winner in the Nov. 8 presidential election.

to claim victory.
Sen. Henry M. (Scoop) Jackson, D-Wash., Democratic chairman, went this far:
"It could go either way right now, but I think we'll take Washington when the time comes."
Republican observers say much the same thing. All agree it will be a close contest for the Evergreen State's nine votes.
Oregon (6 votes) also is generally pegged as a tossup.

More Question Marks
In Nevada, Democrats enjoy a 2-1 voter lead, but they by no means are claiming victory. Like its southern neighbor Arizona, Nevada has a strong conservative outlook.
Nevada has three electoral votes.
Idaho is another state where the Kennedy-Nixon outcome is hard to predict. With four electoral votes, Idaho went Repu-

can until 1958 when Democrats captured all major posts except the governorship and one of two seats in the U.S. House of Representatives.
Alaska and Hawaii will cast their first electoral votes—three each—since being admitted to the union as the 49th and 50th states.
Alaska traditionally has been counted in the Democratic camp, and no reversal of trend is seen in this election.

Sometime later, you find to your surprise, you are the one being taught. Your pet teaches you more than you teach it.
Our household tabby, known as Lady Dottie, appears to our visitors no more than an ordinary black and white alley cat of large size.
Everyone in our family—my wife, Frances; my 7-year-old daughter, Tracy Ann, and myself—has learned something from her. What can a mere cat teach a human being? Why, many things.
First of all perhaps, she can teach the value of a life of dignity without self-pity.
Lady Dottie, like all cats, is a four-footed island of self-respect. She may compromise, but she never surrenders. She allows no outsider to violate her dignity, and she never violates it herself by feeling sorry for herself.
Lady Dottie teaches the value of getting joy in life from small delights.
She yearns for no expensive toys. A box from the department store will keep her happy for two full days. She loves to lie in the crinkly tissue paper and pull the lid over her head. This is her castle in Spain on the living room floor.
Watching her play in this manner one day, I observed aloud: "You know, I really envy Lady Dottie."
"Oh, don't feel that way about it, Rover," said my wife. "If you want a paper box, I can get you one, too."
By nature, Lady Dottie was probably meant to roam the woodland as a wild thing. She is now a kind of a prisoner in a four-room eighth-floor city apartment where she spends all her nights

Oil Import Cut Asked

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Interior Department said today it had proposed that foreign oil imports, except residual fuel oil, be cut by 60,000 barrels a day, effective Jan. 1, in the area east of the Rocky Mountains.
Covered would be both crude oil and finished and unfinished products.
Undersecretary Elmer Bennett said the cut would require a presidential proclamation before it could become effective. This is expected in the near future.
Independent oil producers in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and other big producing states have been pleading for the cut on grounds cheaper foreign oil has continued to undermine the domestic market.
Bennett said that "while we cannot precisely predict the exact reduction because demand data and other pertinent information are not available, the import level could be cut by 60,000 barrels below the level which would prevail if the proposal were not adopted."
The West Coast, which does not produce enough oil to meet its demands, will not be affected by the proclamation.
