STOCKS WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market settled downward late this afternoon as turnover dried up. Volume for the day was estimated at 2.3 million shares compared with 2.4 million on Friday. Key stocks fell from fractions to more than a point. A few scattered issues bucked the downward trend. Steels, autos, rails, coppers, chemicals and electrical equipments took losses. Gold shares, some aircrafts and selected issues posted gain. The market was lower from the start and continued at a lower level with no particular selling pressure. Prospects for steel output remained drab and there was nothing much to inspire enthusiasm. Corporate bonds were narrowly mixed. U.S. governments were slightly changed.

TULELAKE—A Tulelake rancher and resident for 15 years, Alwyn G. Boyd, died in his sleep sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning while hunting elk with seven companions 70 miles northwest of Elko, Nevada. He was 57. Word of his death was telephoned by a brother, Floyd A. Boyd of Fresno, former resident of Tulelake, associated with the branch at Fresno who was in camp at the time. Death was assumed to have followed a heart attack. Mr. Boyd was born September 24, 1903, in Alturas. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and of Hillah Temple. Survivors include the widow, Holis, Tulelake; a daughter, Mrs. Bob Adams, Rupert, Idaho; brothers, O. W. Boyd, Alturas, Floyd A. Boyd, Fresno, Bernard Boyd, Redding; one sister, Mrs. H. M. Faulkner, Klamath Falls, and four grandchildren. Masonic rites will be held from O'Hair's Memorial Chapel at 2 p.m. Friday, November 4, with interment in Klamath Memorial Park.

Adlai Charges Nixon Dangerously Reckless

PORTLAND (AP) - Adlai E. Stevenson Sunday night said that Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the Republican candidate for president, is reckless to the point where he might do anything that might appear popular at the moment. "That is the danger," said Stevenson, "in electing a man who adjusts principle to power, who is concerned not with truth but an image. "This election is more than a choice between two kinds of leadership," Stevenson, twice the Democratic candidate for president, told 3,000 persons at a party rally. "It is a choice between a real man talking about the real world which is in revolution, and a make-believe world where all is well." Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the Democratic candidate for president, "has placed before the country a clear, hard-headed businesslike inventory of its present position," the former Illinois governor said. "He has listed its assets—and noted plainly its unmet needs." Stevenson said Kennedy has "the courage to take a clear stand on controversial issues, to face the realities at home and abroad, to draw from the hard chilling facts of the changing world, new and creative programs for the country's security, for its growth, for its restored leadership in the world. "When Sen. Kennedy sets out the details of the nation's unfinished business—in housing, in education, in health, in defense, in employment, in resource development, and when he talks about the decline in America's influence and prestige in the world—Mr. Nixon's reply is that he is 'downgrading America,' 'selling the country short' and giving aid and comfort to the enemy." Stevenson said "we have had enough of a foreign policy for America that can't stand discussion...enough of a Republican prosperity so fragile that it can't stand being talked about."

Mrs. Elliott was a member of Sacred Heart Church and attended meetings of the Ladies Aid at Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian Church. She had not been seriously ill prior to her death. Survivors include the widower, J. Russell, Henley; one son, William R. Elliott, Portland; two granddaughters, Kathryn and Susan Elliott, also of Portland.
