Road Toll Claims 3 In Oregon

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Three more traffic fatalities were reported in Oregon Monday. The October toll went on record as the third highest in the state this year. The latest victims included two persons who died in a head-on crash near Medford and a man who died of injuries suffered five days earlier in an Eastern Oregon accident. The Associated Press tabulation showed today that 48 persons died on the state's highways in October. That toll was exceeded only by 49 deaths in July and 58 in September. So far this year, 374 persons have been killed in Oregon auto accidents. At a comparable period a year ago, there had been 402 highway fatalities. The head-on crash of a logging truck and a car killed two persons 40 miles northeast of Medford Monday. State police said the victims were identified tentatively as Leo Lester Jones, 54, of Lancaster, Calif., and his wife. Police said the crash occurred moments after Jack Wesley Brophy, 50, of Eagle Point, swerved his truck to avoid birds that suddenly darted into his path. He was not injured. An accident that occurred last Wednesday took the life of Edward Benjamin Freauff, 40, of Portland, in a Richland, Wash., hospital Monday. State police said Freauff was injured when his pickup truck overturned on state Highway 730, near Irrigon, and rolled over several times.

Lonesome Uncle Deserves Attention

On Thanksgiving I have a big family dinner and I always invite this uncle as he is released on holidays. His clothes don't fit very well and he looks out of place with his institutional-type haircut, but he's mannerly and pleasant. Sometimes he becomes a little restless when there's a lot of conversation around him, and he moves from chair to chair. My husband told me last night I should not invite my uncle this year because his "queer ways" make him uncomfortable. He says I don't owe this uncle anything, and I do owe him the courtesy of selecting Thanksgiving dinner guests. Who is right?—AUSTIN Dear Austin: Your uncle probably looks forward to this dinner as one of the highlights of his lonesome, wretched existence. It would be unspeakably cruel to exclude him. He's not just an ordinary guest. There are many aspects of this situation that make him a very special guest, indeed. Keep inviting him. Honey, and tell your husband if he becomes too uncomfortable, he can take himself for a walk around the block.

Dear Ann Landers: I've been going with Wilfred for nine years. I bought a wedding dress when he first asked me to marry him, back in 1951. It was a size 10. She is 38 and nothing is in sight. What do you suggest?—GERT Dear Gert: A double set of apron strings is strangling your hopes for a life together. Moth Balls Given Tots

PORTLAND AP) — Poisonous moth crystals were dropped with candy into the sacks of children trick-or-treating on Halloween Monday night. Police said some of the children tasted the crystals but none apparently ate them. Several children remembered where they got the crystals, and authorities arrested a 17-year-old boy a short time later. Deputy Frank Gilbert said the teenager admitted giving the crystals to six or eight children. "He said he did it for a joke, he thought it would be funny," the deputy added. The teenager was being held by juvenile authorities. Gilbert said the teenager told the children to open their trick-or-treat sacks "and then dropped in candy and a few crystals with them. Some realized they weren't candy and threw them away. Several tasted them and spit them out." A doctor at the University of Oregon Medical School Poison Center reported the crystals contained formaldehyde, Gilbert said.

Vote At Home Set By Nixon

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon today left the definite indication that he plans to wind up his grueling home stretch campaign swing with a flying trip to California Tuesday, Nov. 8, to vote in person. Nixon's schedule earlier called for him to be back in Washington next Monday night for a wind-up campaign telecast with President Eisenhower and to remain in the capital city Tuesday after having cast a California absentee ballot.

Coors Suspect Taken To Denver

DENVER (UPI) — Joseph Corbett Jr., charged with kidnaping and slaying Colorado millionaire Adolph Coors III, was flown here early today in the custody of U.S. deputy marshals. Corbett was whisked away from Seattle, Wash., aboard a commercial airliner Monday night. There was no advance notice. Immediately upon his arrival here, the much-sought suspect in the Coors kidnaping and murder was taken to Denver city jail. Coors was kidnaped in February of this year and a ransom note demanding \$500,000 was sent to his family. Negotiations with the Coors family were not carried through by the kidnaper.

Queen Opens Parliament

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II opened a new session of Parliament today with a promise to keep the pubs open later at night. The queen's speech from the throne, written by Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's government, also promised to work toward the political and economic unity of Western countries and reaffirmed Britain's allegiance to her alliance with the United States and the other North Atlantic nations. But it was the pledge to reform the licensing laws that the bulk of the British public was interested in. The queen gave no details. But Home Secretary Richard A. Butler, whose department will prepare the new legislation, has promised later closing hours and also to make them uniform over the country. Pubs now must close at 10:30 or 11 p.m. in London, depending on what part of the city they are in. Outside the capital the traditional "time please, gentlemen" comes at 10 p.m. With the tourist trade in mind, Butler also hopes to make it possible to buy drinks with supper up to 2 a.m. all over the country instead of just in London as at present. The queen read her message sitting erect on her golden throne in the red and gold chamber of the House of Lords. Her full-skirted dress was of brocaded silk and she wore a glittering crown. The lords, robed in scarlet with ermine collars, and the diamond-tiaraed peeresses filled the benches of the chamber. Members of the House of Commons in their dark morning suits stood at the back. The queen stressed that Britain will continue to cooperate "in consolidating the European Free Trade Association," the seven-nation West European trade group Britain heads. The government will work toward the political and economic unity of Western Europe, on a basis satisfactory to all the governments concerned, the queen said. This statement was an expression of the Macmillan government's desire to build a bridge between the free trade group and the rival, six-nation European Common Market group. As she does in every throne speech, the queen spoke of "the friendship which links us with our great ally, the United States of America." She called this relationship a powerful element for the defense of peace.
