

Smith Blasts Foe's Lack Of Program

SALEM (AP) — Republican race, Democrat Maurine Neuberger, had failed to come up with a program to serve the citizens of Oregon.

He told persons gathered at three coffee hours during the day that she has said she would not risk war to protect United States rights to be in West Berlin.

"She has failed time after time," Smith said, "to respond when questioned as to where we should finally draw a line we would defend against communist aggressors.

"On two occasions she even refused to answer whether or not she would defend against Guantanamo Bay." It is the U.S. naval base in Cuba.

Couple Tells Attendance At Postmasters Meeting

NEW PINE CREEK — Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Faris, New Pine Creek, who are attending a convention of the National Association of Postmasters in Miami, Florida, have this to say about their trip:

"We traveled what seemed forever across desert and semi-desert country of California, Nevada, Arizona and Texas before arriving at El Paso, and there pondered distances and knew for sure we were a long way from home.

"Texas changes your perspective and you begin to think of the vastness of the U.S. Everything here is much different than it is at home, but a quick trip over the Mexican border to Juarez assures you that Texas is a legitimate portion of the U.S."

"The town is glaringly superficial in its commerce at first look. But even in the carnival atmosphere of salesmanship the astute customer may find good bargains—particularly in pottery and leather and wicker merchandise.

"At LaMesa, Texas, we visited relatives, Mr. and Mrs. James McGrew, former New Pine Creek residents. They farm from 500 to 1,000 acres of cotton land.

"About 7 1/2 inches of rain had fallen the night before we arrived. McGrew estimated he lost about \$5,000 worth of cotton during the storm. Much of the crop, however, had been ginned and baled before the storm.

"The oily odors at Beaumont on the Gulf of Mexico are less than fragrant, but residents say you get used to them. The climate is mild.

"Cattle in this area are nearly all Brahmas. They fare better here than other breeds because mosquitos from this swampy area aren't able to pierce their tough hides.

"At Beaumont we visited Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Rice. She was Mrs. Faris' classmate at Kimberley, Idaho.

"We traveled through the slow-moving Deep South and through Florida to reach Miami in the southern portion of the state.

"Life and the terrain here gave the impression again that we were in another country, until we got to the Miami Beach resort area and the 3,000 postmasters who are attending the convention from all portions of the country.

"We took the scenic boat trip around the 22 man-made islands nearby where tycoons of real estate and industry, writers, artists, movie stars and publishers have fabulous estates."

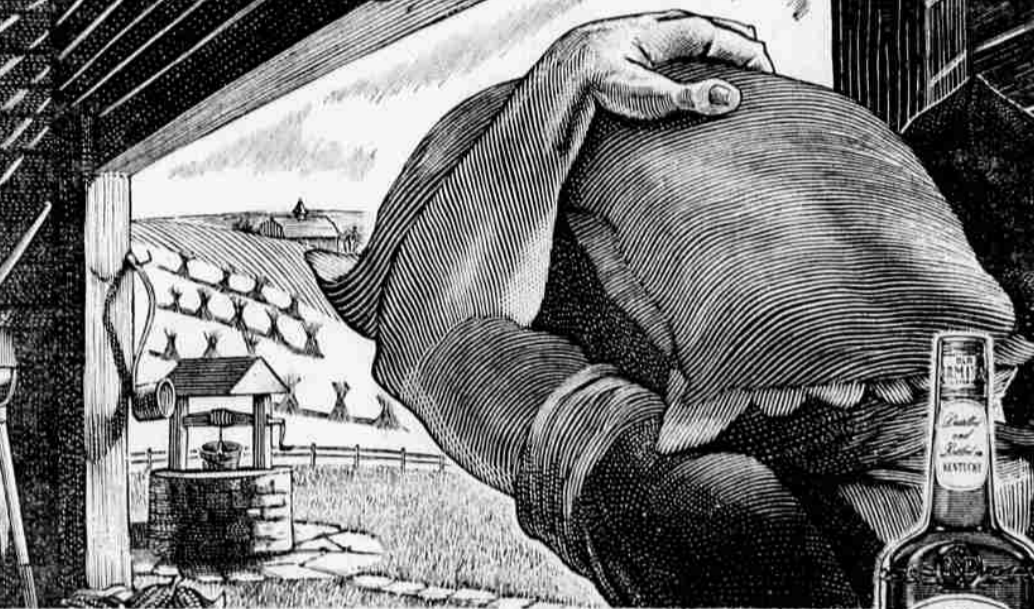

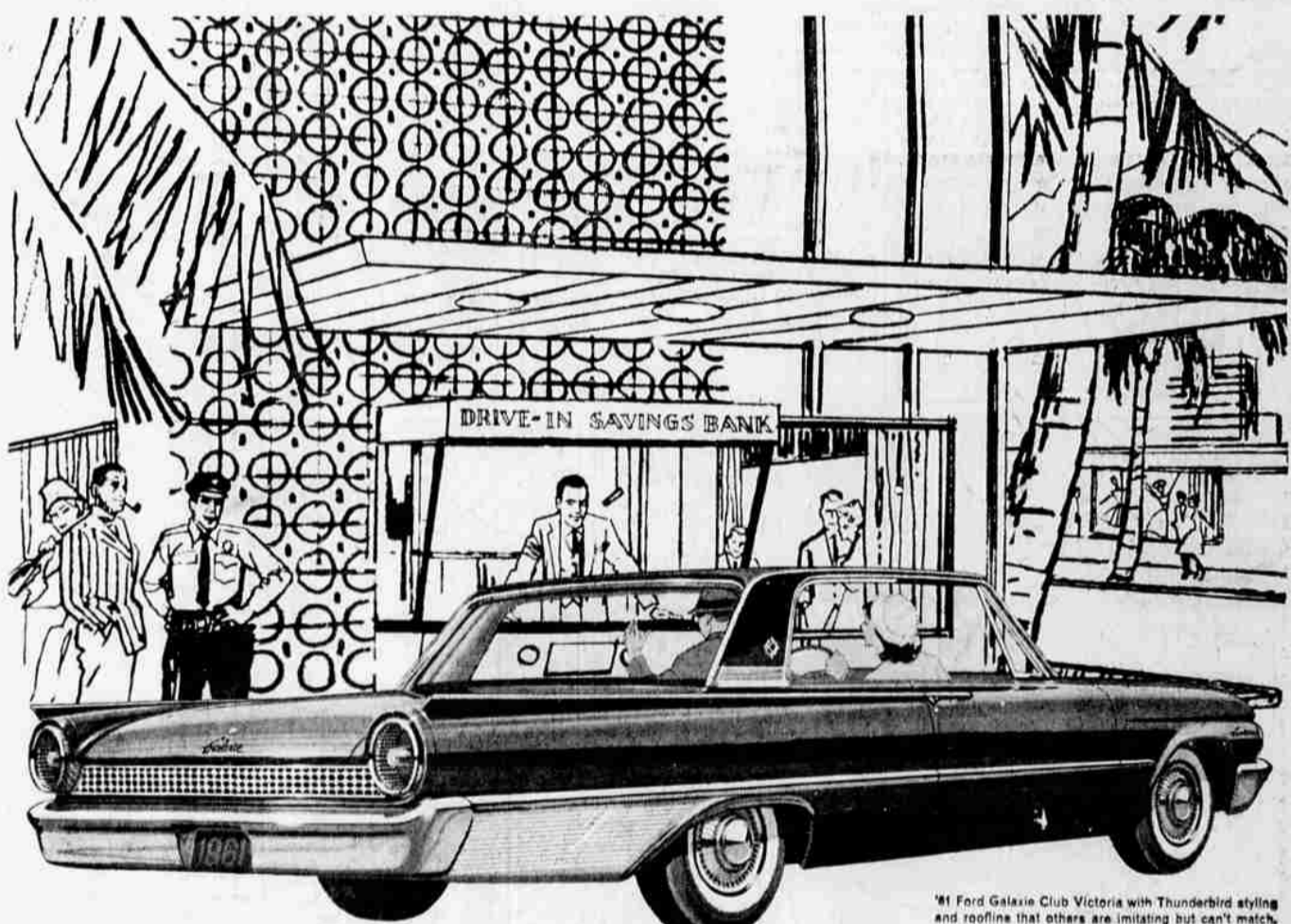
