KU students returned to school Monday after a successful weekend of their third annual homecoming festivities, which was highlighted with a 27-6 victory over Central Point Friday night.

The festivities were touched off last Thursday evening after the traditional bonfire where senior Ginger Learning was crowned homecoming queen by K Club president, Sam Henzel.

After a pep rally on Monday Field Friday afternoon, the many clubs and organizations staged a parade down Main Street with 11 float entries, some 20 decorated cars, Pep Peppers and Pelicanettes, and the school marching band.

Girls Recreation Association nabbed the \$25 first prize with its float entry in the parade, Art Club won second, and the senior class was awarded third place.

The events came to a close after the game Friday night with a dance in the school cafeteria.

One of the highlights of the half-time activities last Friday night was the illumination with flares of the "K" on K Hill by members of the school's newly organized Key Club.

Key Club is a service organization for Klamath Union and is sponsored by the local chapter of the Kiwanis.

The lighting of the "K" was the first in the active program of service planned for KU this year by the club, according to president, Bill Sweetland Jr.

The second in the series of National School assemblies was presented to KU students last week, featuring Duke Gordon and his wife Ellen with a program on archery.

Added enjoyment came when several members of the student body and Principal Willard McKinny shot various weapons.

Bids will be called in November on airman's dormitories and group headquarters buildings at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, expected to cost about \$1 million.

Bids Slated
On Projects

PORTLAND (AP) — Bids will be called in the remaining months of this year and early next year on 127 Army and Air Force projects in the Pacific Northwest costing \$100 million.

The regional Army Engineers office said the largest single project in the five - state area is a Minuteman ballistic missile base in the Great Falls, Mont., area.

Other projects range in cost from a few thousand to \$5 million in the area that includes Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Alaska and Montana. They include dormitories, runways, airfield lighting, electrical distribution systems, fuel storage facilities, family housing and others.
