

Pittsburgh Pitcher Voted Cy Young Baseball Award

BOSTON (UPI) — Vern Law, who was scouted by a United States senator and signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates with the help of Bing Crosby's magic voice, was voted the Cy Young Award today as the major league pitcher of the year.

Law, who won 20 games during the National League season and added two victories over the New York Yankees in the World Series, was named on eight of the 14 ballots cast in the annual voting by the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, who pitched a no-hitter and achieved a record 11th 20-win season, was second in the voting with four votes. Ernie Broglio, a 21-game winner, and relief ace Lindy McDaniel, both of the St. Louis Cardinals, had

one vote each and two writers abstained from voting.

Previous winners of the award, named for the Hall of Famer who won a record 511 major league games, were Don Newcombe in 1956, Spahn in 1957, Bob Turley in 1958 and Early Wynn in 1959. This marked the first year in which American League pitchers were shut out in the voting.

Law, a 6-foot, 2-inch, 200-pound right-hander from Meridian, Idaho, earned the nickname "The Predictable Pirate" as his steady pitching proved a key factor in the Pirates' first NL pennant since 1927. He started 35 games, pitched 272 innings, pitched 18 complete games and had a 3.08 earned run average to go with his 20-9 mark.

Essentially a control pitcher with a good sinker and changeup, Law's strikeouts outnumbered his walks, 120-40.

The big right-hander, a Mormon elder, was recommended to the Pirates in 1947 by the late Sen. Herman Welker (R-Idaho). Crosby, a Pirate stockholder who had been a classmate of Welker at Gonzaga College at Spokane, Wash., telephoned Vern's mother and helped talk her into having him sign with the Pirates.

Ailing Star Causes Vow By Trojans

LOS ANGELES (AP) — With their star guard, Mike McKeever, recuperating from brain surgery, the Southern California Trojans have vowed to whip Washington Saturday and carry on to the Rose Bowl.

"This one will be for Mike," said halfback Jerry Traynham, who only recently recovered from a broken arm. "Mike put out 100 per cent every game. For him, we'll put out just a little bit extra. His all-out type of play will be our inspiration."

Saturday's winner in the Coliseum could be the Rose Bowl nominee, and that alone may lure 50,000 in a city surfeited with college and professional sports attractions.

Washington remains a slight favorite to win. The Huskies have won their last three starts by a total of only four points: UCLA, 10-6; Oregon State, 20-29, and Oregon, 7-6.

Washington and USC are undefeated in their own conference, the Big Five, but Navy edged Washington, and Southern California bowed to Texas Christian, Oregon State and Ohio State.

Roger Mielz will start for the Trojans at Mike McKeever's guard spot Saturday. USC Coach John McKay said Wednesday his team will have to pass much better than it has if it is to win, and much time has been devoted this week to the aerial game.

Cal Halfback Feels Sorry For McKeever

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Steve Bates, California halfback involved in one of the most controversial plays of the 1959 football season, had nothing but sympathy today for Mike McKeever, Southern California guard who is recuperating from an operation this week for a blood clot on the brain.

Bates and his 1959 head coach, Pete Elliott, were bitter last year after McKeever landed on Bates and smashed in the side of his face.

Bates underwent a 3½-hour operation after his injury at Berkeley last year.

"There were times in the weeks after that when I thought of Mike and I'm ashamed to say that sometimes I felt he was having too good a time while I was suffering," Bates said.

"But I feel differently now. I am truly sorry about this (McKeever's blood clot). I deeply hope that his recovery is speedy and he can continue football. I know he really loves to play."

Beavers Drill

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State held a 90-minute football drill Wednesday, but sophomore tailback Terry Baker, the nation's yardage leader, was not on the practice field.

Baker skips practice each Wednesday because of an engineering laboratory that takes up the entire afternoon. Don Kasso did the throwing from the tailback spot as the Staters emphasized passing. OSC meets Washington State next Saturday.

Pels Slate Practice In Boise Tonight

The Klamath Union Pelicans boarded a bus at 5 o'clock this morning headed for Boise, Idaho, and their 1960 football finale in which they meet the Borah High Lions.

The squad expected to reach its destination in time to hold a workout this evening on the Boise Junior College gridiron. The Pelican-Lion encounter will be held on the Borah High field Friday night at 8 o'clock.

In Borah the Pels meet a club rated number three in the state. The Lions, who hosted Idaho Falls 51-0 last weekend, claim a 6-1 record so far. Their loss came at the hands of Lewiston High.

Preferring to stick to a ground-game, the Lions utilize a two-platoon system which is led by a speedy 175-pound, 6-0 halfback, Ted Maness. Maness, the leading gainer, has a liking for the middle of the line. The squad averages over 200, both defensively and offensively, in the line, and about 180 in the backfield.

The contest will decide the clear-cut holder of third place behind St. Mary's and Chiloquin in B loop standings. The remainder of the league has completed its season and will take a week or so of rest before moving into basketball practice, with the exception of the SM Crusaders.

They will move on into the quarter-finals of State B title contention. On Friday, November 11, they travel to Maupin where they will meet the Wasco County High club for the right to continue to the semifinals.

Both the Huskies and the Honkers enter the Friday test with 2-3 win-loss records for league action, and the normal warm rivalry between the two should guarantee a tough game.

Neither coach Al Fairchild of Merrill nor Hank Smith, who is completing his first season at Tulalake, would venture a comment on the probable result.

The Huskies, who claim the number four scorer in the league in the person of Bucky Wilson, and the number three passer in Denny Salvadori, rate at least a statistical edge.

Tulalake's Joe Rogers, however, has no mean reputation as a passer and a runner.

In the county scoring to date Chiloquin's Mike Ochoa holds the number one spot with 47 points off seven TDs and five PATs. Teammate Benny Nygren is close on his heels with 45, the difference showing in conversions.

Mallie's Lee Bailey has counted six touchdowns and three conversions for 39 and third place while Wilson is next with five and two for 32.

Crusaders Alex Mete and Jim Calhoun are next with 30 and 29 respectively.

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Techmen Conquer Raiders

The Oregon Tech Owl cross-country team defeated the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders 25-31 over the rugged Mile High course Wednesday afternoon to rack up its second win over SOC this season.

The event was won by OT's Bill Kirby who covered the mountainous three-mile course in 16:55.0. Tech's Larry Brown was second and Southern Oregon's Ed Susee was third.

Kirby also won the previous meet which was run over the Oak Knoll Golf course in Ashland.

The Oregon Tech course was laid out by coach Wally Palmberg and it covered a tortuous trail up Plum Ridge. The runners finished on the cinder track which encircles the Owl football practice field.

Brown, who with Kirby, led the pack the entire distance, finished with a time of 17:31.0. Susee came in at 18:04.0. The fourth place finisher, SOC's Ken Coffman, formerly of Klamath Union High, closed at 18:18.0 ahead of Glen Doherty, OTI, who finished at 18:49.0.

Other entrants in the race were Doug Shattuck, Van Zitek, Norm Johns and Hewlett Nash, all of Oregon Tech; and Dick Lehnert, Don Coffman, John Dickerson, and Larry Wagner, of Southern Oregon.

The Wednesday competition closed out the Owl season with the exception of possible entrants in the Oregon Collegiate Conference meet slated at Portland in mid-November.

Death Takes Ex-Ballplayer

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (UPI) — Everett (Deacon) Scott, 67, who played with five baseball clubs in his major league career, died here Wednesday after a long illness.

Scott broke into the majors with the Boston Red Sox in 1914. He later played with the Washington Senators, the Chicago Cubs and Chicago White Sox, and the New York Yankees.

As an infielder, mostly a shortstop, Scott spent four years with the Yankees and played in two World Series with the club.

Scott had a lifetime batting average of .248 for his 13-year career. He also played in 1,307 consecutive games, a record that later was eclipsed by the Yankees' famed first baseman, Lou Gehrig, with 2,130.

Top Elevens Slate Battle

NCAA Service Bureau statistics released today show that Wyoming, though beaten once in seven games, has limited its opponents to an average of 140.4 yards a game—tops in the nation. Syracuse is second with a 148.2 average yield.

Utah State, which has an average gain of 402.3 yards a game, including 352.6 yards by rushing, has held its opponents to an average of 74.3 yards on the ground. Missouri is second with a 75.3-yard yield.

Yank GM Quits Position; Roy Hamey May Get Job

NEW YORK (AP) — Roy Hamey, with 35 years of baseball front-office service to recommend him, was expected to be named today to succeed George Weiss as general manager of the New York Yankees.

Weiss resigned Wednesday after 29 years in the Yankee organization, the last 13 years as general manager. He will serve out the last five years of his seven-year contract in an advisory capacity in the newly created position of "consultant." He was 66 last June.

Hamey, 58, was Weiss' assistant for the past two years. He is in his second term with the Yankees. He joined them back in 1934 as business manager of their Binghamton farm club. He left the Yankees to take over the American Association presidency in 1946, but returned 13 years later. In between, he served as general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Philadelphia Phillies.

Hamey will be in charge of personnel and have the final say on all trades. In fact, during the past few weeks, he has been engaged actively in trade negotiations with other clubs.

Only Wednesday Hamey rejected a five-player deal proposed by Vice President Club Feeney of the San Francisco Giants. Feeney, in a visit here last Friday, offered southpaw pitcher Johnny Antonelli and catcher Hobie Land.

Hamey, after consulting with Manager Ralph Houk, who succeeded Casey Stengel two weeks ago, turned down the deal.

Brave, Bums Dodge Tour, Get Rapped

NEW YORK (AP) — When Hank Aaron of Milwaukee gets through paying his fine for running out on a contract to barnstorm, he will have \$327.75 left from his second-place share of the World Series spoils.

Maury Wills and Charley Neal of Los Angeles will have \$1.58 remaining from their fourth-place cut.

All three were fined by baseball Commissioner Ford Frick Wednesday for failure to play for a touring all-star team. Aaron, the Braves' slugging outfielder, was assessed \$1,000 and the Dodger infielders were tagged for \$500 apiece. Aaron and the other Milwaukee regulars received \$501.58.

"The fine is tough to take," said Aaron. "I've had a bad back for a long while and just couldn't play. I turned in a medical report (to Frick) and that's all I could do."

In explaining why Aaron's fine was double that of Neal's and Wills', Frank Slocum, an aide to the commissioner, said, "This is Aaron's second offense. The commissioner fined him \$500 last year for quitting a post-season barnstorming tour."

The tour involves two Negro teams traveling in the South.
