

Owls Make Final Home Stand

Whitman College Saturday Foe On Modoc

The 1960 football season should close locally on a definite upbeat Saturday night on Modoc Field when the unbeaten Oregon Collegiate Conference champion Oregon Tech Owls clash with the Whitman College Missionaries. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Seeking their eighth straight victory, the Techmen figure to have their work cut out for them. The Missionaries are noted for a tremendous passing potential, and, although they are the bottom club on the Northwest Conference ladder presently, the league company they keep belies their true power.

In an earlier invasion of this area the Owls were edged 26-23 by the aggressive Southern Oregon College Red Raiders. Because of injuries that plagued them during their conference action they were blanked in the 5-game league slate.

They opened the season with a pair of convincing wins but have since been unable to keep the squad intact and now possess a 2-5 record.

Quarterback Robin Beck is responsible for pulling the trigger in the Whitman aerial attack.

Since the Owls, who are not exactly slouches in the passing department themselves, have quarterbacks Roy Johnson and Dick Olivas both back in harness, the Saturday night air should be filled with football.

The Whitman squad is expected to arrive in Klamath Falls

this afternoon. It was not learned whether they would try to get in a practice prior to the game.

The Missionaries are led by coach Bob Thomsen who is in his ninth year.

His probable starting unit will include Beck; captain and Little All-America candidate end Jerry

Hillis, 185; end Bob Brown, 195; tackles Jim Stutz, 215, and Jim Hutchinson, 219; guards Steve Johnson, 185, and Rock Allen, 190; center Ed Paget, 195; halfbacks Tim Smith, 170, and Bill Turpie, 165, and fullback Bruce Hilger, 180.

Adding to the Whitman power are a pair of freshmen, quarterback Mike Monahan and fullback Solly Davis.

The Techmen are at full strength for the game, according to coach Rex Hunsaker, who is recovered from an illness that has sidelined him for a part of the week.

Owl practices in the bitter cold on the Mile High campus this week have been aimed primarily at defensive measures designed to halt the Whitman air attack.

However, there was also work on offensive patterns which may cause the invaders some trouble, Hunsaker said.

Probable Owl starters include Johnson, halfbacks Charlie Wilson and Ken Lewers, fullback Bud Maupin, ends Ardel Hamilton and Arties Palmore, tackles Ed Anderson and Jim Madden, guards Andy Cook and Mel Smith and center Don Anderson. Olivas, L. T. Tennerson, Dan Behnke, and Dennis Farster are also slated for offensive action.

Roger Hooper, Windell Winterbottom, Bob Skinner and Johnson will spearhead the Owl defensive unit.

OTI Players Making Bid For Honors

A trio of Oregon Tech football players who are making their final appearance, Saturday before hometown fans are again in line for All-Conference honors. All three are rated highly in conference statistics.

Seniors, quarterback Roy Johnson, halfback Charlie Wilson and end Ardel Hamilton, will shed the Owl blue and white forever following a trip to Aberdeen a week from tomorrow.

However, before they do they will make one last stand for their local rooters. Saturday at 8 p.m. the Owls host Whitman College on Modoc Field.

Johnson, who earned All-Conference acclaim as a linebacker in 1958, repeated the honor as a quarterback in 1959. To date in 1960 he has completed 26 of 50 passes for a 320 percentage and an average of 18.0 yards per throw.

Hamilton, also an A-C winner, leads the Owl scorers and pass receivers.

Wilson was named All-Conference defensive halfback in 1959 and is currently the number two scorer and the number two ground gainer on the Oregon Collegiate championship Owl squad.

NCAA Gets Grid Benefit Suggestion

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A small college "dream game" between Fresno State and Bowling Green to benefit the families of Cal Poly football players killed or injured in last Saturday's Toledo, Ohio, plane crash, has been proposed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The proposal came from Dr. Ferron Losee, athletic director at Los Angeles State College. Fresno State and Bowling Green are undefeated and are rated among the best small college teams in the country.

Both schools enthusiastically agreed to the game and the Coliseum commission agreed to rent the huge stadium for Dec. 2 for \$1.

Dr. William Terry of San Diego State gave his approval and contacted Paul Becher, chairman of the NCAA Special Events Committee, for approval.

Fresno State meets Long Beach State Saturday night to decide the championship of the California Collegiate Athletic Association. Long Beach State has agreed to replace Fresno State in the event it wins.

Five of the Cal Poly football players who died in the crash were married. Dr. Losee said aid for their families was needed.

In addition, many of the injured players will be in the hospital for a long time.

COACH MUST GO ON
IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Iowa Football Coach Forest Evashevski, whose Hawkeye teams won Rose Bowl games twice in three years in the late 50s, had a date to address a doctors' meeting. He also had a cold and a temperature of 102 degrees. He made the speech anyhow. He could have had medical attention promptly if he had needed it. But he urged the doctors to work with high school coaches in spotting athletic injuries which could be serious while appearing to be minor.

KF Fans To Honor '60 Pel Gridders

The Klamath Union Pelican football team, now in Boise for the final game of the 1960 season, will be the honored guests at a big football banquet to be held at Reames Country Club Tuesday, Nov. 8, at 7 p.m.

Featured as guest speakers on the program planned are a pair of nationally known figures, University of Wisconsin baseball coach Art "Dyne" Mansfield, and Otis Davis, of the University of Oregon, the Olympic track star.

The dinner, which is sponsored annually by the Pelican Booster Club, assisted by the KU Letterman's Club and members of the rally squad, will also feature the presentation of awards and trophies won by the individual players.

Also scheduled for brief talks are the Pelican coaches, Bob Williams, Jack Petersen and Al Keck.

All Klamath Basin football fans are urged to attend the banquet. Tickets, \$2 per head, may be purchased now from members of the booster club or at the usual downtown outlets.

Mansfield, who has guided the Wisconsin baseball fortunes for the past twenty years, is expected to bring the movies of the 1959 Rose Bowl football game, according to Harold Howard, booster club president.

Mansfield, whose son, Bill, is the baseball coach at KU, has coached a number of eventual American and National League players. He came by the nickname "Dyne" through his prowess in the fight ring. It is a contraction of the word dynamite.

Davis, a 28-year-old Webfoot track star, is a native of Los Angeles.

He holds the National AAU 400 meter mark of :45.8 which he set in Bakersfield last summer.

In the Rome Olympics Davis set a new world mark for the event when he nosed out Carl Kaufmann of Germany with a winning time of :44.9. He was the only American athlete to win a "flat" running event during the Olympics.

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Mile High Club Among Undeclared

With the exception of bowl and post-season All-Star games, etc., the 1960 college football season is rapidly nearing a close.

Across the United States only 34 teams can lay claim to undefeated records in 1960 action thus far.

Among the 34 is Oregon Tech, the 1960 Oregon Collegiate Conference champions. The Techmen, who have legal claim to a pair of consecutive crowns, have two games left on their slate.

Of the 34, 13 have played six games and two have played only five. The Techmen are in the group that have seven straight victories to their credit.

Among the unbeaten teams are only two Oregon colleges, OTI and Willamette, of the Northwest Conference. Whitworth, in Washington, Humboldt State and Fresno, California, are the other undefeated clubs in the Northwest area.

The best defensive mark of all is shown by Florida A&M, a five-game entrant which has allowed only six points. Ohio U. and Montclair State, with 21 against them, are next.

The Owls have scored 193 points while allowing their opponents 91. The undefeated teams are:

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W'worth Star Tops Gainers

The leading ground gainer among the nation's small college football players is a passing whiz from Whitworth who has gained exactly eight yards by running with the ball.
Still atop the heap in total offense in NCAA statistics released Thursday is Denny Spurlock. He has gained 1,391 yards in seven games and 194 plays.
Spurlock remained in first place also in yardage gained by passing — 1,383 yards. He's fourth in number of completions, having completed 87 of 166 attempts for a .524 percentage mark.
