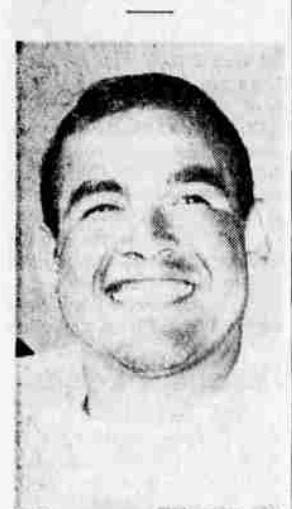


Owls Top Whitman In 14-7 Squeaker

'Big Blue' Scores 8th Straight Win

14-7 but it was an uphill struggle all the way.

The Owls punched over a touchdown just six plays after the opening gun but it didn't prove a thing, as the Whitman crew bounced right back just five plays later with a score of their own. Both clubs booted conversion points and the battle was on.

The clincher came for the Owls with 2:35 left in the third period when end Arties Palmore pulled in a 35 yard pass from quarterback Dick Olivas.

The play, although it stuck, created no little consternation, especially on the Whitman bench. A fraction of a second after Palmore snagged the long toss and dipped into the end zone, a Missionary defender slapped the ball out of his hands. The officials, however, maintained that he had possession when he crossed the goal line and that was all that mattered.

A penalty flag on the try-for-point ended in a virtual eruption of players from both benches.

Although very few punches were thrown, the situation was obviously red-hot. The coaches stopped the melee before damage was done, and Olivas stepped up and booted his second point-after.

From the early moments of the ball game the battle was waged primarily in midfield. Terrific defensive stands on the parts of both teams are reflected in the game statistics. Each club garnered 10 first downs, OTI collecting 74 yards on the ground and 94 in the air to 149 on the god and 31 via the airplanes for the visitors.

The Owls turned the tales on the Whits with a passing attack that stole some of the losers' thunder. The Washington team is noted for its aerial success. During the contest the Owls attempted on eight of 18 pass attempts while limiting the Whitman squad to only two completions in 29 tries.

The first Owl TD, with 12:42 left in the first stanza, was set up on a 31 yard blitz by halfback Charlie Wilson. Ken Lewers punched over from the two.

The Missionary counter came as the visitors moved from their own 45 into the end zone in five plays. Halfback Tim Smith slanted off right tackle for 34 yards and the score.

Quarterback Mike Monahan, a Whit frosh whiz, kicked the extra point.

Monahan gained 7 yards on the ground in addition to tossing all of the Whit passes. On two of these, long ones destined for end Bob Brown, were written TDs, but they were just a step or so too long.

Grizzlies Roar

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — The Montana Grizzlies tucked away a touchdown and field goal in the second period Saturday and stood off Montana State in the last half for a 10-6 football victory before 6,000, the season's largest crowd.

It was Montana's first triumph over Montana State since 1935. The Grizzlies had a shutout in this 60th encounter between the schools until an 18-yard pass play from quarterback Harry Lopezinski to end Bert Emery gave the Bobcats a touchdown with two minutes left.

The speed of sophomore halfbacks Terry Dillon and Pat Dodson, strong downfield blocking and a stout defense won for the Grizzlies.

end Jerry Hillis was credited with 36 yards but Smith was the big gainer with 79 in 11 carries.

Halfback Ken Lewers, with 39 yards on the ground, and fullback Bud Maupin, with 37, were the big producers for the Tech-men.

Beavers Overtake Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Little Gene Hilliard sped 53 yards to a touchdown sparking a second half comeback that gave pass tight Oregon State a 20-10 win over Washington State Saturday.

After breaking the Cougar line apart with a bruising ground attack Oregon's Beavers turned into ball stealing demons on pass defense and never gave WSU a chance to get back into the game.

Trailing 10-6 when the second half started the Beavers slashed 51 yards on 13 ground plays and just one pass to go ahead to stay the first time they gained possession.

That one pass, from dodging Terry Baker on fourth down to standing-still Marne Palmateer on the WSU 14 was a key play and gave John Marshall a chance to plunge over later from the one.

Baker, the nation's total offense leader, was held to only 88 yards, 60 from passing and 28 from rushing.

WSU's Mel Melin, third in total offense, got a total of 180 yards of which 174 came from passing.

OSU gained 294 yards rushing compared to WSU's 75, but trailed in passing yardage 60 yards to 174.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Michigan won the battle of the coaching brothers Saturday, beating Illinois 8-7 on Dave Glinka's two-point pass conversion to halfback Dennis Fitzgerald.

A sometimes-slumbering Michigan defense rallied for tremendous efforts that crushed Illinois threats in every period and gave Chalmers (Bump) Elliott a squeaky victory in the coaching duel with his younger brother, Pete.

Illinois' Jerry Wood, whose kicking provided the victory margin in two triumphs this season, missed three field goals—the last one in the fourth period from the Michigan 14 yard line.

Purdue Toppled

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP) — Michigan State quarterback Tom Wilson scored a touchdown, passed for one, and tossed a conversion pass for a 17-13 victory over Purdue today.

Art Brandstatter caught the 13-yard touchdown pass and kicked a 28-yard field goal. Fred Arbanas rounded out the miscellaneous Spartan scoring by catching a conversion pass.

Webfeet Bedazzle Stanford

PORTLAND (AP) — Quarterback Dave Grosz bedazzled Stanford with his passing and running and led Oregon to a 27-6 non-conference football victory Saturday.

Grosz threw two touchdown passes and set up another score with his running and passing. A fourth Oregon score was practically a gift as a Stanford pitchout went wild on the Stanford 10, Oregon recovering and plunging to a touchdown in three plays.

Stanford, which has failed to win a game this season, was in the running only in the first quarter when quarterback Dick Norman led his team on a 60-yard touchdown drive the first time the Indians got the ball. Halfback Gil Dowd scored the Stanford touchdown on a one-yard plunge.

Grosz, who accounted for 245 yards gained, took Oregon to a touchdown the first time Oregon had the ball. That was after the opening kickoff.

When Stanford came back with its scoring drive Oregon led 7-6, thanks to halfback Cleveland Jones' conversion kick.

Then in the second quarter Grosz put Oregon out of danger. He climaxed two drives with touchdown passes to the 5-foot, 4-inch Jones. One went 25 yards and the other, 15.

Falcons Soar

DENVER (AP) — Halfback Bob McDonough's 76-yard punt return for a touchdown featured Air Force's 22-point burst in the second quarter on the way to a 36-6 football victory over Denver Saturday.

WACO, Tex. (AP) — The Texas Longhorns, who have had a mediocre season, rose up to tear down Baylor, a national football power, 12-7 Saturday.

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — The Utah State Aggies, the nation's No. 1 rushing team, turned to a surprising rout of the Aggies 20-0.

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Huskies Floor USC; Rose Bowl Beckons

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Washington's Huskies floor USC on the heels of a 34-0 football victory.

Fullback Ray Jackson scored the first touchdown in 2:21 after the Huskies had jarred the ball loose from Trojan Nick McLean on the kickoff. It took five plays to score.

Less than two minutes later flashy George Fleming fielded a punt by Marlin McKeever and blazed 65 yards for the second touchdown.

That was more than enough to give the defending Rose Bowl champions the victory, with the largest score they ever earned against Southern Cal. and all but sew up the assignment as the representative of the Big Five Conference in the big bowl next January.

Modocs Belt KU Jayvees In Rematch
